He called attention to the fact that owing to the long drouth the roads of the county are getting in bad condition. Roads have been granted and opened up that have never been worked. All the roads will make a soon as it rains. Yet the county has not a cent in the road and bridge fund. This fund was practically exhausted in advance by Jeanneds made upon it last year. In other words, the deficiency existing in this fund at the beginning of the year virtually consumed the tax morey that has been collected and paid into this fund since, leaving the c cuty absolutely without funds with which to maintain the roads. 

YOUR INCOME TAX

No. 11

Where by reason of illiness or absence form home addittional time for filing an income tax return is required, the taxpayer should address to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C., a request for an extension. Collectors of internal revenue are not, as under preceeding acts permitted to grant such extensions. The request must be made before the return is due—on or before March 15, 1925, if made on the calendar year basis—and must contain a full recital for the causes of the delay.

a full recital for the call delay.

An extension of time for filing the return does not extend the time of payment of tax unless os specified in the extension. As a condition of granting an extension, the commissioner may require the submission of the tax, and the payment of at least one fourth of the estimated amount.

Under the revenue act of 1924, thousands of persons are required to file returns of income although the incomes are not taxable. The act pro-vides that returns shall be filed by

every single person whose net income for 1924 was \$1,000 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more, or more, and by married couples living together, whose laggregate net income was \$2,500 or more, or whose aggregate gross income was 50,000 or more. The exemptions are \$1,000 for single persons and \$2,500 for married persons living together, plus a \$400 credit for each development. A person may have a gross income of \$5,000 and, by reason of deductions for business expense, bad debts, lossification of \$2,500 and, by reason of deductions for business expense, bad debts, lossification of \$2,500 as the head of a family. Nevertheless, returns are required in both instances.

Heavy penalties are provided by the act for failure to file a return and pay at least one-fourth of the amount of tax due within the time prescribed on or before March 15, 1925.
