





New Gun Laws in Effect The Federal Firearms revision act became law Monday and many sportsmen will find a slight change in the process used to buy guns and

Probably the foremost change in the procedure is in the sale of ammunition. No ammunition will be sold to anyone under 18 years of age and the buyer must "sign" for his purchase. Dealers and stores selling ammunition will be required to keep a set

of books on all ammo sold

listing pertinent information

about the purchaser. In buying firearms, the main part of the law deals with the interstate shipment and sale of guns incostate shipment will be made only to dealers or collectors, however, provisions have been made to allow sportsment to ship guns out of state for repairs. The new law will also allow a traveling sportsman to buy a gun out of state d his become lost, stolen or inoperative. Provisions were also made to allow for the rental of guns to out of

state hunters or sportsmen. Hunters or competitive shooters will not be affected when carring firearms over state lines for the purpose of hunting or trap shooting and other competitive events.

Mainly this section of the law was designed to cut down on the interstate shipment of gun and ammunition to undersirable persons through sales from so called 'bargain' gun stores. The law is also designed to stop minors from ordering guns through mail order etablish-

.Interest continues to develop in kleingrass, and Selection 75 has been approved for seed certification.

The warm-season perennial bunchgrass appears to be adapted to a wide range of soil and climatic conditions. It is influenced somewhat, however, by available moisture, but seems to be tolerant of a rather wide range of moisture conditions. It is being grown successfully in trial plantings from the high rainfall areas of East Texas and the Gulf Coast, to the limited rainfall areas of the Rio Grande Plain and the

Grand Prairie Active growth begins early in the spring, and the leaves of kleingrass remains green in the fall until temperatures drop below 25 degrees.

Kleingrass is extremely attractive to livestock as either green forage or cured hay. but does not have the potential for extremely high levels of production of such grasses as Coastal Bermuda. However, it may equal or outperform these grasses under moderate production conditions, especially in terms of

For best animal performance, kleingrass should be utilized before it is mature. It appears to tolerate rather close grazing, but may be damaged and animal performance reduced by extended periods of close grazing.

Many people are working with complex problems aimed at increasing agricultural production to put more dollars into the farmer's pocket. Yet, in many instances, a relatively simple practice can turn the trick! All the farmer has to add to his present practices is the use of the right amount of the right kind of fertilizer as recommended by a soil test.

This may sound like an over simplification but it bears a lot of truth, according to a survey conducted by personnel of the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory. Texas A and M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. Included in the survey are the 20 South Plains counties in Extension District 2.

The survey indicates that income for the district could be increased by an astounding \$25.4 million through the use of adequate rates of the right kind of fertilizer. County Agent Bill Griffin states that for Lynn County alone the potential increase in farm income from proper fertilization amount to \$1,774. 240. This income is based on the assumption of a two dollar return above each dollar spent on fertilizer.

Plant nutrients that must be stepped up to bring about this increase are primarily nitrogen and phosphorus. For Lynn County 754 tons of nitrogen (N) and 300 tons of phosphorus (P2O5) were used last year, according to the Texas Feed and Fertilizer Control Service. The survey shows a county need for 4406 tons of nitrogen and 1810 tons of phosphorus.
