Where The Difference Is.

We heard one of our extensive land owners say only a short time since that he was going to have his entire ranch, except possibly two sections, cut up into 160 acre tracts and sell it to people who want it for farming purposes. When he does this it will make fine homes for a number of good families—just what we need—and it would be big money to a number of other ranchers to follow the example this man talks of setting.—Avalanche.

That is good advice even for our land owners. As long as a man must buy a section or more or go without land, there will be very small inducement for the actual farmers to come and settle. Oklahoma City and Plainview were at one time about the same size, while Lawton is but two years older than Tahoka and much younger than Lubbock. That territory is no better farming country than this right here, but they have encouraged the small farmer to come there more than we have; hence the difference in the growth of the towns named.

Big Springs paid less than \$100 in price and premium for the first bale of cotton sold there. Tahoka should easily raise that much or more. A town loses nothing by donations of this kind. The gin will be ready soon and then the cotton premium will be a live issue.

Enterprise Extracts.

J. E. Porter of Lynn county was here Tuesday and loaded out with building material.

Sidney Garrett was here this week from Gail. He informed us that he is going to locate in Tahoka and go into the real estate business.

The Bud Brown ranch of eight and a half sections, which was cut into quarter sections a short time ago, has all been sold but five quarters.

R. W. Lane and Master James Crie of Tahoka were here Wednesday with a bunch of horses, which the former was taking to Kinney county.

Big Springs don't need any road leading to the Southeast. That town has the T. & P. railroad shops there and depends on them for sustenance. She is happy and contented with this state of affairs and would not kill a snake, much less meet Sterling with a good straight road at her borders.—Sterling News-Record.

You are mistaken, brother, Big Springs needs good roads in every direction and will have them, but it takes time to make good roads.—Enterprise.

The News-Record need not worry about the road to Big Springs, as both Colorado and San Angelo are nearer to Sterling. Soon as the railroad builds to Plainview—about next spring—Tahoka will be just as well fixed, and then we won't worry about the road to Big Springs, one bit.

No liquor license can be issued in Oklahoma unless the application for same is published in the two newspapers in the county having the largest circulation therein. The Advance-Advocate of Payne county refused to print license applications, and as a consequence, that county will soon be "dry." The liquor men cried on the courts to compel the newspaper to print the application, but the courts say they have no authority for any such action. This is a decidedly unique case in temperance reform.

The paper this week may be disappointing to our readers; at least it is to us. On account of sickness the News is rather shorthanded. Next week we will do a great deal better if things don't get worse.



THE DEVIL'S ADVENTURE.

Mr. R. W. Lane and family, some of our Floyd county acquaintances arrived in Tahoka Friday 2 weeks ago with 103 head of horses besides their work horses on their way to Kinney county where Mr. Lane intends to start a horse ranch. Being as Mr. Lane met several of his old friends he decided to stay all night, so he put his horses in the Simmons & Reed wagon yard pasture so he could get an early start next morning. The horses broke over the fence in the night and were scattered over a four section pasture next morning, he saddled a horse for himself and his son Wilson and one for me and we began rounding up. As we passed Mr. R. R. Napier's place Otis Napier came galloping up with the news that one of the Lane horse was cut all to pieces and was over by their lot. Mr. Lane told Wilson and I to go get it and take over to a bunch about a half a mile away while he and Mr. Simmons gathered up the rest. By dinner time we had the 103 in the Simmons & Reed wagon yard lot. We came to the house and ate dinner and arrangements were made for me to go to Big Springs with them, at 1:30 we started for Big Springs.

We got along nicely the rest of the evening and we camped about seven miles south of town by a windmill. After the wagons stopped we caught one of the old bell mares, that always leads the bunch off, and staked her. Then Wilson and I unsaddled the saddle horses and fed them while Mr. Lane and Mack unharnessed the work team and fed them. By that time supper was ready and we proceeded to dine. After supper was over and the camp in order for the night we retired. Sunday about 4 a. m. Mr. Lane came to the front of the wagon where Mack and I slept and said "crawl out boys", Mack and I got up and Mack fed while Mr. Lane and I saddled our horses and rounded up. By that time breakfast was ready and we fed our horses and ate ourselves. After breakfast Wilson and I counted the horses while Mrs. Lane and Ward cleaned up and Mr. Lane and Mack harnessed the work teams. We got started about Sunup. During the day when there wasn't any body to sass Wilson and I would amuse our selves by hopping off and trotting along by our horses and picking up clods

and jumping on and throwing them at the horses in the bunch. We camped 7 miles north of Sparingberg that night.

Next mornig when Mr. Lane and I were rounding up I went down in a basin after a few of the horses, my horse kept looking a head and snorting and finally I spied a Coyote slinking off in the bushes and I suppose he had been through the bunch in search of prey. We passed through Sparingburg about 10 a. m. and Mrs. Lane did her shopping. Mr. Lane told Mrs. Lane to drive on about a half a mile and wait till we caught up with the bunch. Mrs. Lane drove on and stopped and Old Red one of the horses to her wagon dropped in the harness. We caught up and Mr. Lane and Mack pulled the harness off and made him get up and get out of the way so they could hitch in another horse. We worried along with him until 2 p. m. when we stopped at Buzzard Mills to noon. When we started on after dinner he seem to be better and improved the rest of the evening. About 5 o'clock Mr. Lane left Wilson and I to drive the bunch while he rode ahead and scoured pasture from a man by the name of Wallace. About a mile from Mr. Wallace's Old Red lay down and Wilson and I could not get him up; we took the bunch on and put them in the pasture and Mr. Lane went back after Old Red while Wilson and I helped Mack feed.
