

Not so, says the Texas State munity remains effective for Department of Health.

The childhood diseases are a highly contagious diseasethat myth. The fact is that these is especially dangerous and oftdiseases are so contagious among children that most people have had them by adutlhood and thereby have developed immunity. But adults can and do catch Health Department, should plan them, and when they do they an immunization program beare sometimes much sicker than children.

Two of these so-called child- and smallpox. Booster shots to hood diseases -- mumps and Ger- maintain complete portection man measles (rubella) .. have special dangers for the adult both adult men and women. And German measles, when occuring in the early part of pregnancy, can result in damage to the unborn child. A new vaccine may eventually lead to the eradication of German measles, but there is a danger until all women in the child-bearing years have been immunized a. gainst it.

So, if you are exposed to any "childhood" disease and believe you have never had it, ask you doctor what you can do to protect yourself.

It is extremely important that you and your children keep protection against smallpox up to date. True, the absence of smallpox in this country has led to a lack of public concern about this serious disease, and large segments of the adult population are unvaccinated or require boosters. In some parts of the world smallpox continues to be a serious problem. If just one single undetected smallpox case should be introduced into a U.S. Community, it could touch off a serious epidemic.

Is it true that a baby is protected by his "natural immunity" acquired from his mother? Some of a mother's natural or acquired immunities, if any, can





These are the major reasons that over five million, five hundred thousand feet of parallel terraces have been built in Lynn County. Another very important benefit not previously mentioned is the fact that water distribution on more than 32,000 acres in Lynn County is much better as a result of this conservation prac-

Many people believe that terraces are not needed on flat ground. This is not true. It is easy to understand by looking at it in this way. If you take a garden sprinkler can, which is like rain, and pour water on a level table top what happen to the water?

It will spread out and run off. But if you will pour the same amount of water in the same manner in a loaf pan or ice tray, something with dividers and sides on it, you can hold the water where it falls.

The expenses of parallel terraces are slight when you realize that they will entirely pay for themselves in 12 years from the money saved in the cost of operation alone. This cost is offset more by the insurance that you will miss a crop less often if you hold all the water

What Your Iris Needs Now

Feb. is a month of anticipation, looking forward to the coming of spring bloom, but it is also a time of some anxiety and work.

Late last fall the good gardener groomed his iris plot before putting it to bed for winter; that is -- cleared away the dead iris leaves, putting these in a bag to be burned. If left on the ground, they will scatter disease or insects. The spores from any diseased plant or leaf spot would be blown to healthy plants. You buried or composited the tree leaves for later use. Next you checked each rhizome clump to be sure it was not too much out of the ground. If so, you threw a shovel of dirt (about an inch) on the naked rhizome to protect the flower that had already formed for the 1970 spring

bloom. Now for your Feb. work: you again go over the iris garden and examine for signs of winter damage. So far we have not had too much freezing and thawing of the earth but you may find some rhizomes that have leaved out of the ground from the thawing, if so throw another shovel of soil over the rhizome before more freezes, for the iris bud is getting ready to come out to see and be seen. This recovering may insure you a beautiful iris season of blooms.

While looking for winter damage be sure you take from off the clumps all the dead foliage and debris of the winter accumulation. If this is left around the irises harmful insects will harbor and come up when warm weather comes and give you trouble.

The last of Feb. or first of March spray your whole iris plot with the spray you think best, Captian is recommended for leaf spot, aphid and leaf spot fungus. Then if your soil needs a fertelizer give it a side-dressing of super-sulphate of 3-12-12 or 12-24-12. If the soil is rich and loamy give it nothing. In using the fertilizer, keep it off the iris leaves (fan) and the rhizome about six inches away from the clump. For a clump of 6 or more rhizomes use approx. 1/2 cup, for 2 to 4 rhizomes use two tablespoons. I use potassium permanguate of potash for myspraying. This may sound like a lot of work, but it pays off wonderfully in gorgeous blooms.

We are hoping for a more uniform bloom season this spring.
