believe there is entirely ton much confidence on the part of our people that we have the war about won，and need not put put forth any extra effort．Such reasoning is not borne out by the facts at all．Germany is still fighting $n n$ enemy soil，and when we compare the line where they are fighting now with where they were two years ago，they have lost very little territory in France，and hardly any in Bel－ gium，while on the Eastern front they have gained whole provisces．＂
