The Bank and Hotel Buildings

Work on The First National Bank New Brick Building is Well Under Way, And the Addition to The Tahoka Hotel Showing Up.

Work on the concrete foundation for the First National Bank brick building is about half done at this writing, Friday, and Mr. Morgan, the contractor, tells us that he expects to begin laying brick Tuesday.

The foundation is two feet below the surface and the first foot of the wall is 24 inches thick. The second foot is 15 inches thick. The floor is to be of concrete and will be raised 18 inches above the ground level. It will require 20 or 25 wagon loads of dirt to do this besides the dirt taken out of the foundation trenches.

The brick is all on the ground and it will be a question of only a few weeks until the first brick building in Tahoka will be completed. However this will not long remain the only brick building in Tahoka for the Ketner building will be well under way some time before the bank building is finished.

The walls to the addition to the Tahoka Hotel building are nearly ready for the door and window frames to be put in and it begins to look considerably like a house.

Greenville has voted an \$85,000 bond issue for the improvement of the city water works.

Clay county will vote on a \$200,000 bond issue for good roads August 5th.

Charters representing over \$7,000,000 worth of newly organized Texas Capital was filled with the secretary of state one day this week.

\$91,000 worth of new buildings are under construction at Pecos.

Sweetwater will soon lay 11 blocks of asphalt paving in the heart of the business.

The Denton Traction Company is extending its lines for a distance of a mile and a half which will be completed in the next three months.

The total number of cases of mineral water shipped from Mineral Wells to various places was 12,330 or 153,996 bottles.

Thompson Lumber Company of Houston, has filed an amendment with the secretary of state increasing its capital stock from \$800,000 to \$1,300,000.

The new concrete mixing machine is doing its work in great shape, mixing the gravel, water and cement in the right proportions and much more rapidly than it can be done by hand and with a minimum expenditure of labor.

The door and window frames were all made in Amarillo and shipped down, and are stacked on the grounds ready to be put right in as the walls are built.

Tahoka is to be congratulated on the fact that she waited to build until she is able to build a house that will be a thing of beauty and a joy for several years to come.

VALUE OF COTTON CROPS

Uncle Sam has just issued a Bulletin No. 111, on cotton productions, and he is proud of the showing made by Texas. The Bulletin is a large 70 page pamphlet, and Texas leads in every phase of all the subjects.

The report gives a comparison of the crops in the United States, by States, since 1903. The 1910 crop is the most valuable one on record, aggregating \$963,180,000, and the billion dollar mark is easily in sight for 1911.

The Texas crop of 1910, is valued at \$247,880,000, and of this amount, \$214,520,000 represents lint, and \$33,360,000, the value of the seed. The 1910 crop is the most valuable crop ever produced in Texas, surpassing the 1906 crop crop, its nearest rival by \$24,330,000.

Of these ginneries 3,892 are run by steam power, 34 are run by water, 89 by gasoline, 12 by animals and 13 by electricity. Texas has the extremes in power from the oxen to electricity and we have a complete variety.

Plaintiff alleges that the acknowledgment in the deed from Alexander Thompson to Anna B. Cating is defective, that "known to me" are left out of same. That the claims of the defendants, if any, are cloud upon the title of plaintiff to said lands and that the claims of all of the defendants come through the claim of Alexander Thompson, and that Alex. Thompson and Alexander Thompson is one and the same person.

He had with him a sample of the fruit in his orchard, which was very fine specimens of the peach variety.
