The Bank and Hotel Buildings

Work on The First National Bank New Brick Building is Well Under Way, And the Addition to The Tahoka Hotel Showing Up.

Work on the concrete foundation for the First National Bank brick building is about half done at this writing, Friday, and Mr. Morgan, the contractor, tells us that he expects to begin laying brick Tuesday.

The foundation is two feet below the surface and the first foot of the wall is 24 inches thick. The Second foot is 15 inches thick. The floor is to be of concrete and will be raised 18 inches above the ground level. It will require 20 or 25 wagon loads of dirt to do this besides the dirt taken out of the foundation trenches.

The brick is all on the ground and it will be a qustion of only a few weeks until the first brick building in Tahoka will be completed. However this will not long remain the only brick building in Tahoka for the Ketner building will be well under way some time before the bank building is finished.

The walls to the addition to the Tahoka Hotel building are wind and hail which struck here nearly ready for the door and window frames to be put in and it begins to look considerably like a house


SHORT CROPS CURTAIL U. C. V. REUNION CROWN
