Bank Deposits At All-Time High

Lynn County bank deposits time high at the close of business December 30, with two of the three banks reporting the highest deposit level for that respective call date in their history.

Cumulative total for all three banks, First National of Tahoka, Wilson State, and First National of O'Donnell, was \$18,332,743.20 on the call date, and all were even higher after the first week of 1968.

At Tahoka, total deposits on December 30 were \$11,253,654.24, compared to \$9,948,965.00 a year ago. Total deposits at the close of business on Monday were \$12,218,478.88.

are down at Tahoka from \$5,078,480.25 in 1966 to \$4,608,401.86 on December 30, 1967. Total assets are presently at \$12,182,939.79, compared to \$11,038,757.13.

At Wilson, total deposits on December 30 were \$2,301,899.37, up from \$2,256,369.10 a year ago. Total deposits at the close of business on Monday were \$2,491,424.55.

To complete the overall trend, loans are also down at O'Donnell, from \$632,594.99 in 1966 to \$614,964.35 on December 30. Total assets are up from \$2,642,309.30 to \$2,714,643.38.

All three banks have reported healthy gains in deposits during the past quarter. Tahoka up about \$800,000; Wilson increased by \$750,000; and O'Donnell up \$250,000.

County Shows Voter Increase Over Last Year

Voter registration for Lynn County during the past four months shows an increase over the same period during 1966.

Registration for October 1967 were 988; November, 433; December, 470 and January 1968, up to January 9, 199.

1966 registration was considerably less with October showing 292; November, 134; December, 230 and January 1967, 1,773.

Applications for voter registration are available at several places throughout the county. These include: New Home Co-op Gin, Lakeview Gin, Wilson Co-op Gin, Wilson Post Office; O'Donnell, Moore Insurance Agency, New Moore store and Grassland Butzoe.

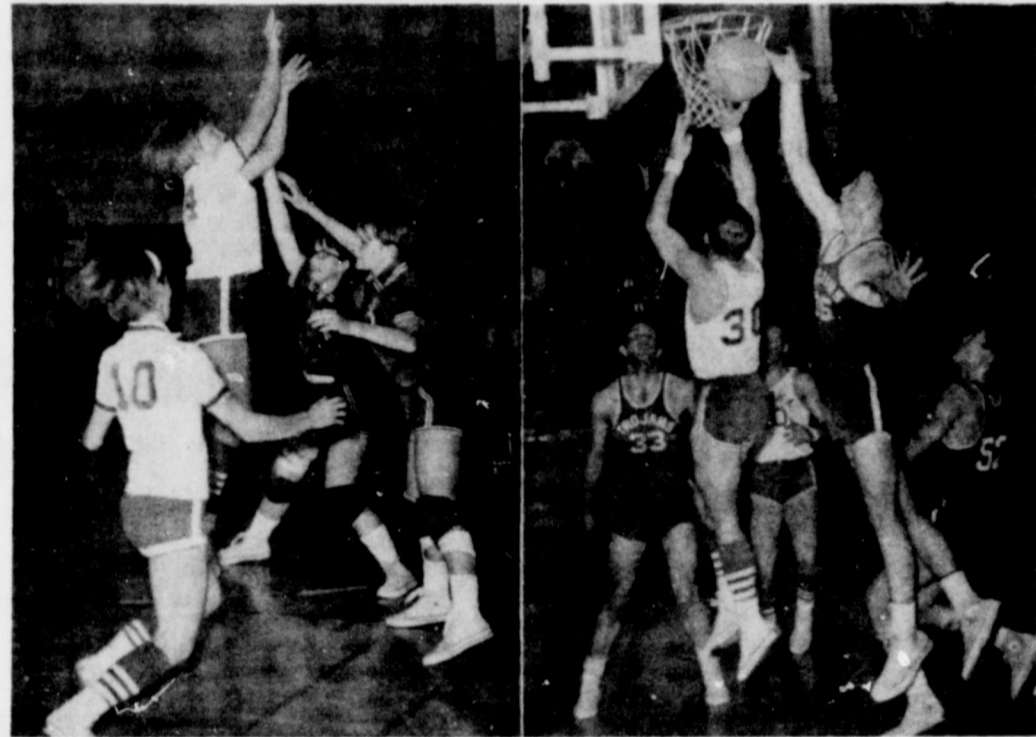
Dist. Scouters Will Meet Here Next Tuesday

Clarence Church Seeking New Term As Commissioner

Clarence Church, Wilson, has announced that he is a candidate for re-election as Commissioner of Lynn County Precinct 1, subject to the May 4 Democratic Primary.

Church, a resident and taxpayer of Precinct 1 for 25 years, moved to Lynn County from Jones County in 1942.

He served as commissioner from 1951-1956 and began his present term in 1965.

Immunization Program Is Rescheduled

The countrywide immunization program scheduled for January 6 was postponed and will be held January 27. Dr. Skiles Thomas, County Health Officer will supervise the program, to be held in the Lyntegar Meeting Room.

Measles, Polio and DPT shots will be available, as well as booster shots for Polio and DPT. Booster shots are advisable after a four year period.

Tahoka's participation in the program includes the purchase of syringes, alcohol and cotton and a volunteer staff to compile the necessary records, and is under the auspices of the Tahoka Parent-Teacher Association.

Postal Rate Change Noted

When the postage rate increase went into effect last Sunday, January 7, raising the postage on regular mail from 5c to 6c, air mail from 8c to 10c and post cards from 4c to 5c, other changes were made which are of particular interest to all residents of Lynn County.

The special rate for "drop" letters (for city boxes) was discontinued, which means that all letter mail now requires 6c per ounce postage.

Also, 6c postage is now required on all greeting cards, get-well cards, thank you notes, invitations, announcements, form letters, Christmas cards and all other postal communications.

Under the present regulations, a post card is the only piece of mail which will be transmitted for 5c, except for 2nd and 3rd class matter mailed under bulk mailing permits.

Voter Registration Deadline Near

Registration period for voting in the 1968 elections will expire January 31. Registration will be through the County Tax Assessor & Collector's office of the persons residence.

The new voter registration laws require all persons to register regardless of age. Any person 68 years or over must register to qualify to vote in any election held after February 1, 1968.

Any person becoming 21 years of age anytime during the voting year, may register during the regular period of registration, or may register anytime during the year; but must do so at least 30 days prior to any election at which they wish to vote.

Military personnel and re-

lated services, serving outside Texas may vote through regular registration procedures. The official Federal Post Card Application for absentee ballot for each election is treated as an application for registration for that election, and the County Clerk attends to details of the registration which is effective for that election only. However persons within this category may still register by ordinary procedures through the assessor and collector if they wish to do so.

Registration may be in person or by mail to the assessor and collector. The proper form for registration must be used and completely filled out, if registration is being made by mail.

STILL MAY REACH 100,000 BALES

County Ginnings Over 85,000

If present indications hold true during the next few weeks, Lynn County will in all probability reach the "magic" 100,000 bale output for the 1967 crop.

On Monday, county ginnings reported 85,274 bales and estimated almost 13,000 bales remained unharvested.

The weather, of course, has been the common denomina-

tor for this year's crop, hail and other factors causing experts to lower the expected output from the 100,000 figure which had been forecast.

Much of the county's crop is in or at the 99 percent stage, but especially in the southern part, a fourth or more remains in the fields according to ginnings in the respective areas.

Tahoka's four gins report a total of 15,933 bales as of Monday, the ginnings estimating that nearly 2,000 bales remain to be brought to this city.

At Wilson (including Way-side plant), 7,975 bales are reported with only about 350 more to go, according to the estimates.

A cumulative total of 21,

217 bales are reported at New Home and Pettv, with only about 175 bales expected in the next couple of weeks.

O'Donnell reports 15,967 and shows a projected estimate of almost 5,000 bales remaining in the fields.

In the Grassland Draw area, a little more than 8,000 bales were reported with perhaps an additional 1,750 bales yet

to go.

Our hometown is a small farm community in the midst of wheat and cattle country. After living in Northwest Oklahoma and the Panhandle, we are accustomed to hot summers and cold winters, moderate rainfall, dust, ice and snow. Yes, our hometown is the friendliest in Oklahoma and we look forward to living in the friendliest town in Texas, Tahoka.

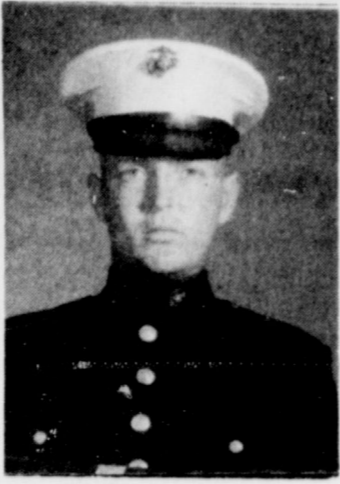

Bulldogs Scare Trojans, Lose In Overtime

Tahoka's Bulldogs put a scare into Christ the King's Trojans Friday night at the local gym, forcing the Lubbock school into an overtime and putting their 20-straight win streak in jeopardy before a 54-51 final outcome.

At the end of regulation time, the tilt was knotted at 45-45, despite the fact that the Bulldogs led by as much as 15 points in the second quarter.

In fact, the local squad jumped to a 6-0 lead at the halfway mark of the opening quarter before allowing the Trojans to light the scoreboard.

At the end of the first quarter, the hustling Bulldogs led by 15-6 and held a 29-16 margin at the half. Eight minutes later, at the final break, Tahoka still led 38-30 before the game tightened in the final minutes.

With 5:04 left in the game, the Trojans tied the game at 40-40, then pulled ahead by two points at the 3:37 mark.

With 1:34 to go, a shot by Cliff Thomas gave the Bulldogs a one point lead, but a free throw 16 seconds la-

ter knotted the game at 45-45. With 12 seconds remaining, Tahoka owned the ball and called time out to set up one play. With play resuming, the Bulldogs worked for the single shot, Doyle Schneider putting the ball in the air with 0:01 left.

In the air as the horn sounded, the ball hit the rim, spinning in for what would have been the winning basket, then flipping out to send the game into an overtime.

In the overtime period, the Trojans jumped to a quick four-point lead on the basis of a field goal and two free throws coming as the result of starter Charlie Brown's fifth foul.

With the quick lead, the Trojans were able to stall the ball with a deliberate offense to eat up the three-minute overtime period, giving them the win and extending their win streak record to 21, coupled with two losses in their opening games.

Leading the Tahoka scoring punch was Sherry Schneider with 16 and Connie Gardner with 14. Brosch scored 20 for

Christ the King.

Turning in good performances at guard for the locals were Brenda Foster, Nellene Chandler, Alta Hale and Lana Grogan.

The win for the varsity girls advanced their record to 4-11 while the boys are now 10-7 over the season.

Both teams will be pitted in a return engagement against the CTK teams Friday night at Lubbock. Both varsity teams and the b-team boys are slated to play beginning at 5:30 p.m.



Vehicle Registration Changes Adopted By Highway Department

The Texas Highway Department has adopted a new method of computer filing, in handling vehicle registration receipts. The vehicle identification number, title numbers and license plate numbers will be the primary means of accessing the master computer file.

In order for the Highway Department in Austin to have this file correct, each vehicle owner should bring his certificate of title when registering for license plates. This will insure a correct title number and vehicle identification will be correct on the registration receipts.

Tax collectors have been requested by the Highway Department to withhold issuance of 1968 license plates unless the applicant presents his certificate of title and previous year's registration receipt, as required in Section 63b of the Certificate of Title Act VPC 1436-1.

George McCracken, Lynn County Tax Collector advises this type of registration will insure correct information in Austin and feels sure that vehicle owners will benefit in this program.

Lynn County will have six prefixes in 1968 including CHY-800, CHZ-10, CJB-10, CHC-10, and CJE-10, with numbers not exceeding 999 and 349 on the CJE prefix. Commercial vehicles will be prefixed IP 1675-2974 and farm vehicles carrying 8F 3775-5274.

The registration fees for passenger cars and all other types of vehicles registered with passenger car license plates will be prorated on a quarterly basis. The fees for all other classes of vehicles, except motorcycles and motor-scooters, will continue to be prorated on a monthly basis.

No license, regardless of the class of vehicle and the month or quarter in which the license is purchased, may be issued for or reduced to a fee less than \$5.30.

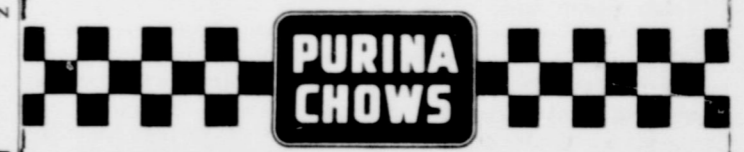

According to an article I read in a copy of a newspaper last night while two television newscasters were taking time telling what they thought instead of just reporting the news, the economic experts in Washington have mapped out a plan to bolster the American dollar and its relation to the international balance of payments, a matter I do not understand now and which I have no intentions of understanding any time in the future.

One of the points in the plan is to restrict Americans' travels abroad for the next two years.

I can ratify this, in fact any time I get off this Johnson grass farm, except maybe for an occasional trip into Littlefield when the traffic is light, I feel uncomfortable and begin to notice a definite dollar drain, but what I'd like to know is what is this going to do to candidates for President?

How can a man run for President if he can't

first travel through half a dozen countries improve his standing as an expert on foreign affairs and get his name in the papers? Everybody knows you can't enter the Presidential Primaries in New Hampshire without first paying by Moscow, Paris and South Viet Nam, never have seen one who thought he ought come by my farm out here.

And also, the economic experts have suggested, if just asking Americans not to travel abroad won't work, a tourist tax should be voted. There'd be a special tax for leaving the country, one for returning.

This sounds like a good idea to me, one of the genuinely new sources of tax revenue thought up in a long time.

After all, if a man is going to be taxed even while staying at home minding his own business, why shouldn't he be taxed also when he's leaving?

This way the government would have money rolling in, coming or going.

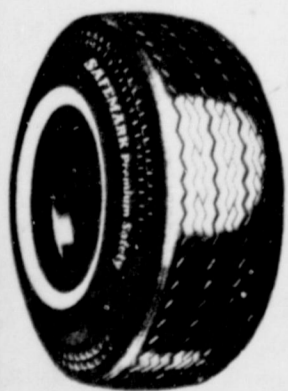

Parcels For Servicemen Now Go At Lower Rates

Packages up to 30 pounds for American military personnel served by Army and Fleet Post Offices overseas now can be sent by air transportation at special low rates. Postmaster Charles Townes pointed out today.

Area residents using this new airlift service will get much faster delivery on parcels to military personnel overseas. The airlift is available on a space-available basis upon payment of the domestic parcel post surface rate plus a flat \$1 fee.

Packages weighing up to 30 pounds and not more than 60 inches in combined length

and girth qualify for the new special airlift rate. Postal patrons can get the airlift service on packages mailed to all military personnel at APO and FPO addresses overseas, and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. The new airlift also applies to parcels mailed back to the States by servicemen from these military post offices.

Parcels on which the \$1 fee is paid get air transportation all the way -- from here to the port of embarkation, and from there to the overseas base. Postal patrons formerly had to pay air parcel post rates to get similar service.

In many instances the new airlift rates are considerably below comparable air parcel post charges such as these examples:
* A mother here sending a 15-pound package to her son in Vietnam pays \$3.35 for the new airlift service. The air parcel post rate for the same package is \$9.79.
* An eight-pound package going from here to Frankfurt, Germany, costs \$2.75 under the airlift service. The air parcel rate is \$5.87.

The Postmaster pointed out, however, that it is not always to the mailer's advantage to use the airlift service. On some light packages air parcel post rates may be lower than the airlift charges; therefore, postal patrons should check with the Post Office for information on the best way to mail parcels to servicemen overseas.

The new airlift service went into effect January 7. It was authorized under the postal rate bill signed into law December 16 by President Johnson. Postmaster Townes explained that the regular postage on parcels mailed to servicemen overseas is based on the distance the package is hauled within the United States. No charge is made for carrying the package between the U. S. port and the overseas base.

Until January 7 airlift for parcels to servicemen overseas was restricted to packages weighing up to five pounds. and girth qualify for the new special airlift rate.

Postal patrons can get the airlift service on packages mailed to all military personnel at APO and FPO addresses overseas, and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. The new airlift also applies to parcels mailed back to the States by servicemen from these military post offices.

Parcels on which the \$1 fee is paid get air transportation all the way -- from here to the port of embarkation, and from there to the overseas base. Postal patrons formerly had to pay air parcel post rates to get similar service.

In many instances the new airlift rates are considerably below comparable air parcel post charges such as these examples:

* A mother here sending a 15-pound package to her son in Vietnam pays \$3.35 for the new airlift service. The air parcel post rate for the same package is \$9.79.

* An eight-pound package going from here to Frankfurt, Germany, costs \$2.75 under the airlift service. The air parcel rate is \$5.87.

The Postmaster pointed out, however, that it is not always to the mailer's advantage to use the airlift service. On some light packages air parcel post rates may be lower

than the airlift charges; therefore, postal patrons should check with the Post Office for information on the best way to mail parcels to servicemen overseas.

The new airlift service went into effect January 7. It was authorized under the postal rate bill signed into law December 16 by President Johnson. Postmaster Townes explained that the regular postage on parcels mailed to servicemen overseas is based on the distance the package is hauled within the United States. No charge is made for carrying the package between the U. S. port and the overseas base.

Until January 7 airlift for parcels to servicemen overseas was restricted to packages weighing up to five pounds. Upon payment of the regular parcel post rates, these packages get surface transportation to the port of embarkation and are airlifted from there to the overseas posts on a space available basis. There is no charge for this airlift.

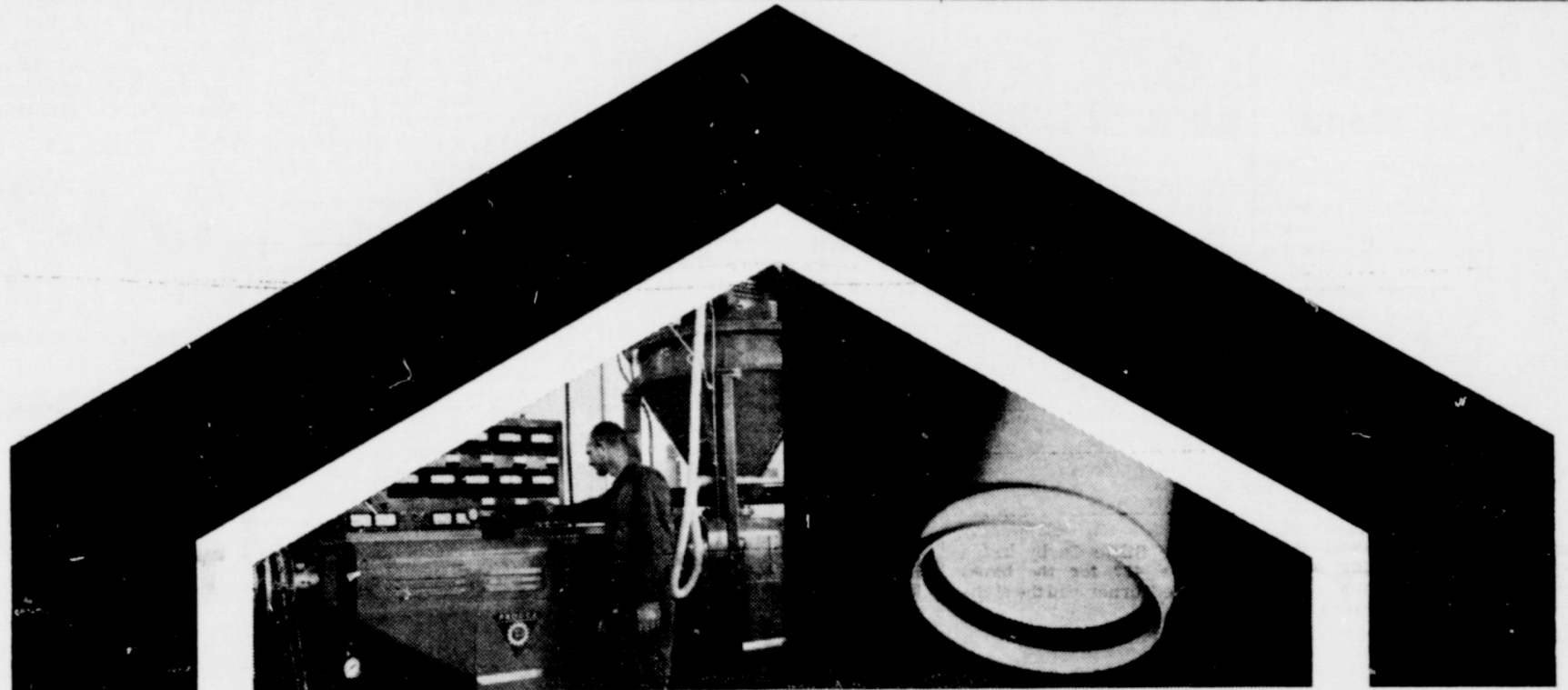

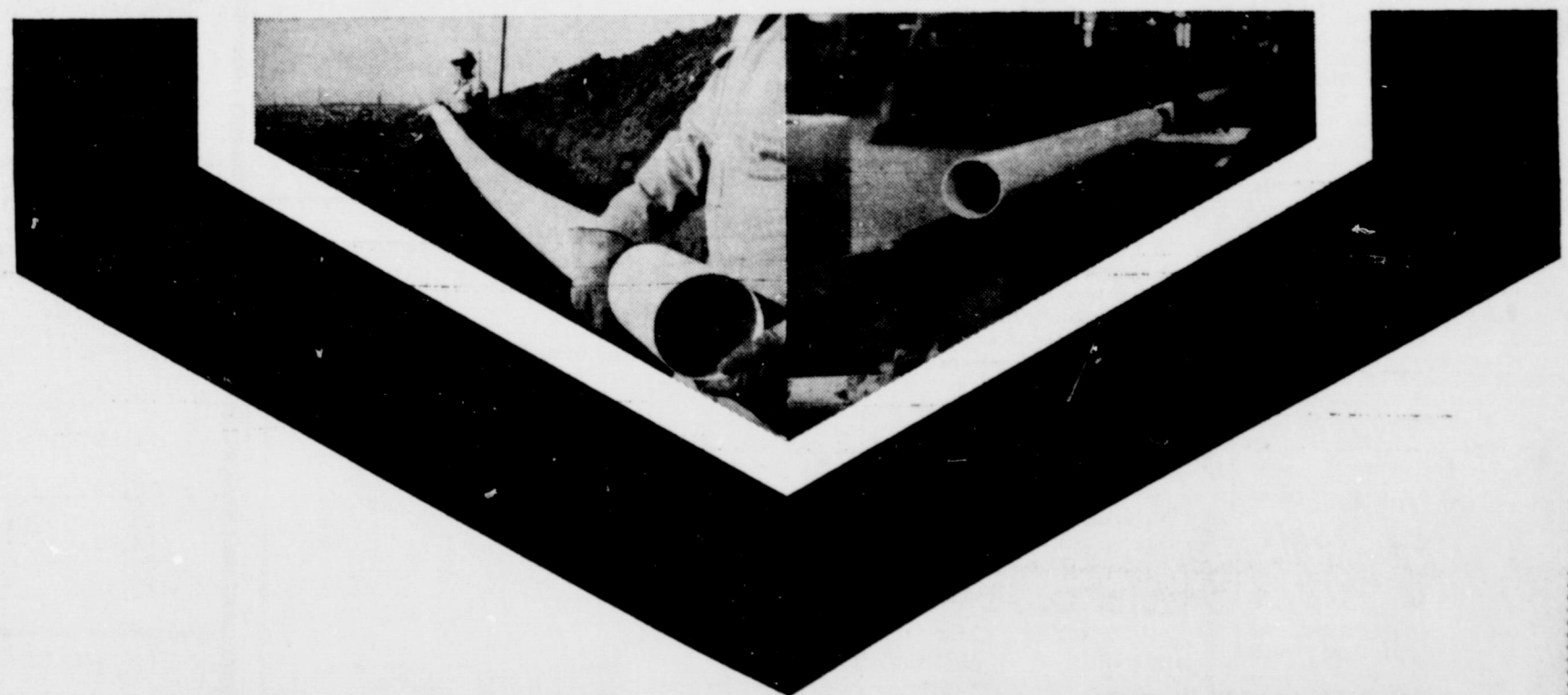

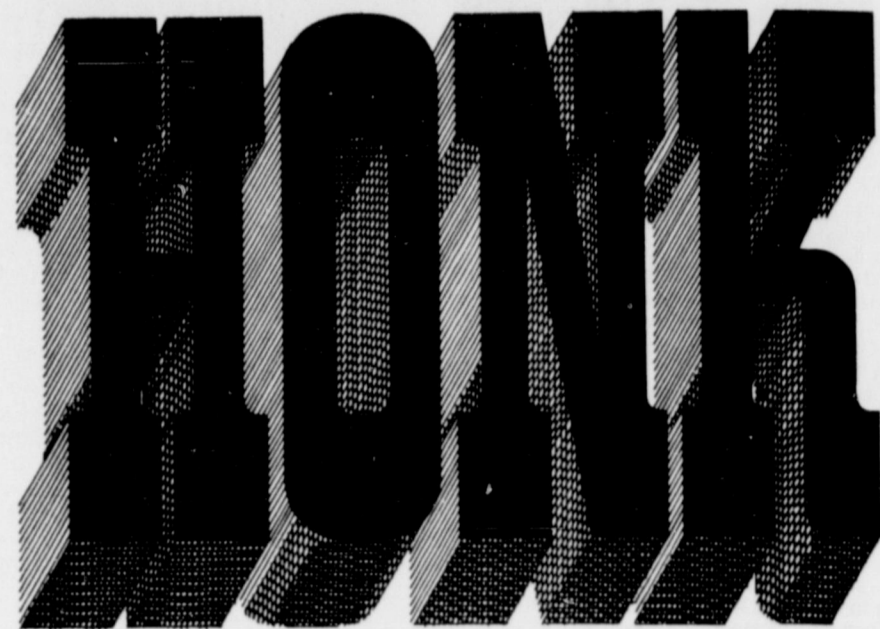

High condition, or overfatness, can cause temporary or permanent sterility in both cows and bulls. This occurs frequently in purebred heifers fitted for shows.

Excess condition also affects the longevity of the cow. In addition to reproduction problems, overfeeding can also result in wastage of large amounts of feed not needed by the animal to meet growth requirement. Stockmen must know the nutritional requirements of his animals and feed them accordingly, says the county agent.

On the other hand, some cattlemen may neglect their animals by failing to recognize the existence of ration deficiencies. As a result, animals may not receive sufficient amounts of calcium, phosphorus, salt, vitamin A, protein supplement and energy.

The county agent invites stockmen to visit his office for copies of publications dealing with livestock nutrition and other subjects relating to beef production.

Farmers Tax Guides are available in our office. These guides are 1968 Editors of income and self employment taxes.

Total Listed**

During the month of November United States Savings Bond sales in Lynn County totaled \$5,005 according to a report received today from F. B. 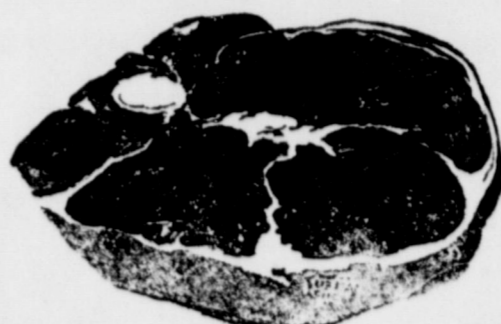

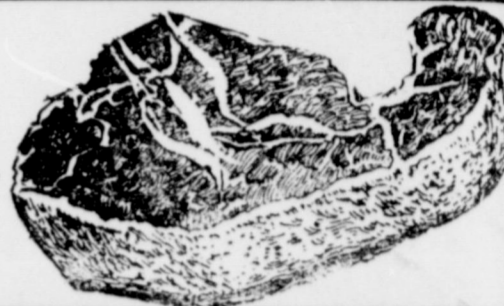
