## W. E. Penney Dies Suddenly.

The sad intelligence reached Tahoka last Saturday morning of the sudden death of Mr. W. E. Penney of Lubbock. The news was a shock to his daughter, Mrs. J. E. Stokes, of this place. Mr. Penney was 65 years old at the time of his death, and was in his usual health, though he had been troubled with a weak heart for several years.

He was born in Lawrence District, North Carolina, Oct. 27,1843 and was married to Miss Martha Barrett Feb. 181864 at Wharlee, Ga . They came to Texas in 1876 and made their home in Washing. ton county until their removal to Lubbock ten years ago.
Mr. and Mrs. Penney raised II children to he grown, two of whom died about four years ago. He has been a member of the Methodist church since he was a boy and his life was an example of what a Ciristian gentleman should be: a devoted husband, an affectionate father and a kind and obliging neighbor. Mr. Penney was one of the prominent men of Lubbock and his loss will be keenly felt by his town as well as by the loved ones who are left to mourn his loss.

He wa; a great lover of flowers and when death came to claim him ne was in the yard among his beloved plants.. His last moments were spent under a little shade tree which he had raised from a tiny slip.
His wite reached his side in time to hear his sigh of content, as his spirit winged its flight to the bosom of the God who gave it.
The thought should le very sweet to the bereaved ones that he went to his rest without the sickness and suffering which comes to most, but passed peacefully away surrounded by the things so dear to his heart.
All the children were at home to attend the funeral, which was one of the largest ever held in Lubbock.

## THE HALL OF FAME.

Emperor William has conferred tho Order of the Crown of Prussia upon William Charles Reick of the New York Times.
Baron Albert A. Schlippenbach, for thirteen years Russian consul general in Chicago, has been appointed consul general in New York city.
Louis Klein, formerly contracting freight agent for the Illinois Central, has been appointed commercial agent in Philndelphia for the Missouri Pa-cfic-Iron Mountain system.
Admiral Richard Moorman, the "father of the fleet," recently celebrated his ninety-eighth birthday. He joined the British navy in 1823, elghty-five years ago, and retired in 1866.
Thomas Kalends, a bootblack in an Alton (III.) barber shop, has been appointed critic of the Greek classes at Shurtleff college. The boy is eighteen und a graduate of the Athens Greek high school and is a student of anclent and modern Greek.
President Roosevelt in a formal letter has notified Secretary Straus of the department of commerce and labor that he has reappointed him for another term of six years as one of the American members of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague.
William R. Smith, superintendent of the national botanical garden. Washington, is credited with owning the richest and rarest collection of Burnsiana in the world. He was born in Scotland, and the first book he ever purchased was a copy of Burns' poems. General Porfirio Diaz has been president of Mexico for twenty-seven years. There was an interruption between the years 1880 and 1884, but after the latter year the repeated re-election of the chief executive ceased to be repugnant to the Mexican constitution. At the end of his present term General Diaz means to retire, as he will then be eighty years old.
