Joplin and little shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided, that in any precinct in which there may be a city of eight thousand or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two jus-Maxwell of Austin, who are visit- tices of the peace. Each county shall in like manner and in the first instance. he divided into four precincts, in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters there-

Ernest Reed has purchased a of one county commissioner, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. Subsequent divisions of a county Mr. Reed sold his other machine into commissioners' precincts shall be made as is now or hereafter may provided by law. The county commissioners so chosen, with the county judge as presiding officer, shall compose the county commissioners' court. which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business as is conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed.

Sec. 2. That the sum of one thousand (\$1.000) dollars is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not etherwise appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary expense of submitting the above proposed amendment to the people of the State, at the next general or special election in the manner required by law, by the Governor of the State.






