School Board Met October 10

The Tahoka Board of Education met October 10 in regular session to discuss and approve business at hand.

Items approved included the substitute teacher list for 1968-69 school year and lengthening Junior and Senior High School lunch periods five minutes. The change becomes effective at the end of October.

The current enrollment report shows 1,076 students at October 10. This compares to 1,068 at September 12.

Receipts for the Hale Center game shows \$936.65 with a total expense of \$110.00. Tahoka's share was \$433.82. Receipts at the Plains game were \$904.75 with \$100.80 expense. Tahoka's share of the net was \$750.95.

Winners Named In Bike Rodeo

Tahoka Jaycees held their first Bike Rodeo Saturday afternoon and considered it a huge success, totaling 46 entries in the various age divisions. Nineteen winners were presented ribbons in first, second and third place showings.

Several entries had to be turned down for failure to comply with the contest rules. All contestants had to attend a safety program that morning to be eligible to enter. Contestants entered in boys and girls divisions, classified according to ages. They vied for prizes in a 100-yard dash, half-mile run and an obstacle course. Each contestant was scored on individual time in

Cotton Estimate Up 3,000 Bales

The Lynn County cotton production estimate is up 3,000 bales from the September 1 estimate, by the Plains Cotton Growers of Lubbock.

Estimate of September 1 showed the county with 127,000 bales and this was revised October 1, with a 130,000 bale estimate.

The 23 county area estimate of October 1 was 1,578,000 compared to September 1, showing 1,589,000.

Gerald Huffaker, local fund drive chairman opened the meeting, explaining the function of the drive, and assigned the men to solicit and complete certain phases of the campaign.

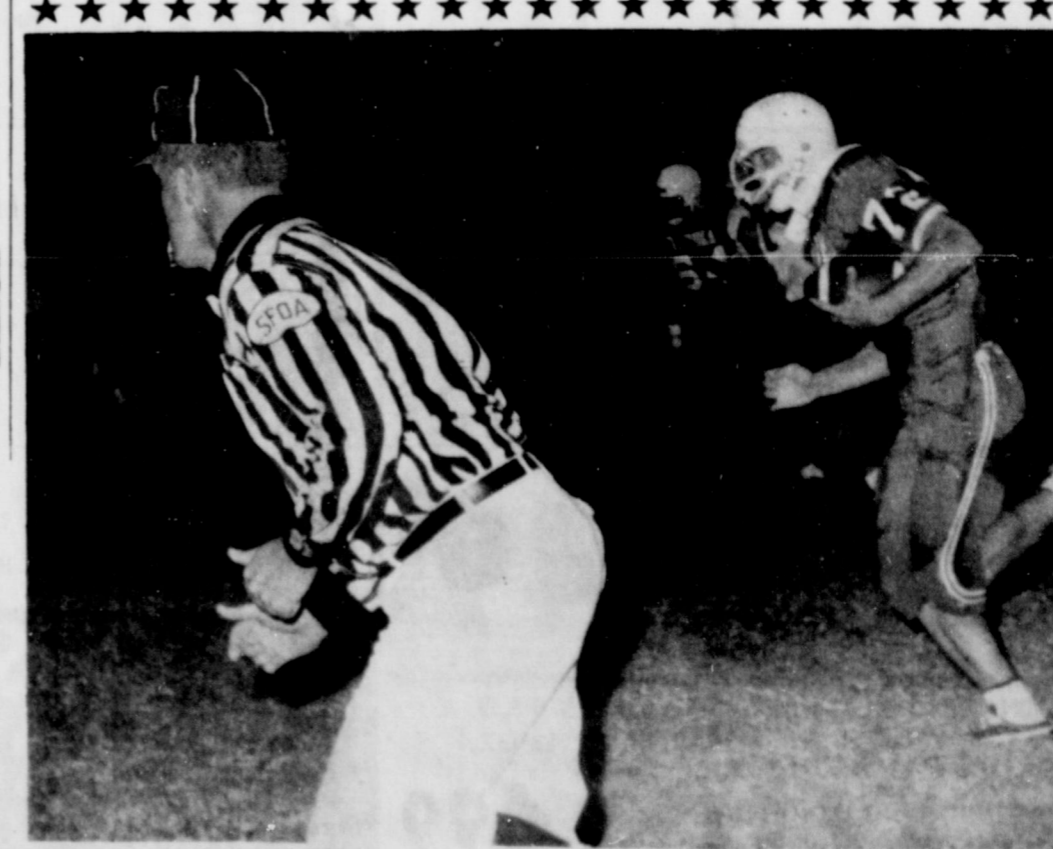
Drive workers began contacting businesses and individuals Tuesday, hoping to complete the fund goal of \$1,800 by the end of the week.

There is the explanation of answer to a question that has been asked of me.

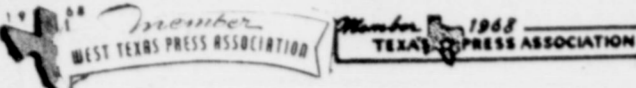

Colorado Seasons Open Saturday
Colorado will note a substantial population increase Saturday as thousands of out-of-state hunters converge on the Rockies in search of Mule Deer and Elk. Texans will out-number the other visiting hunters by a wide margin according to statistics released by the Colorado Fish and Game Commission. Some hunters will travel from as far as the Gulf Coast to reach prime hunting in the pine and aspen forests. Several local men plan to make the opening day hunt. R. H. "Hick" Gibson and party will be hunting in the Chromo area while a second party of Tahokans will hunt west of Pagosa Springs. Most will hunt the stately Mule Deer and others will try

their skill for Elk. Results of the Colorado hunts will be published in this column at a future date.
Hill Country Deer in Good Shape
Hill Country hunters will have no trouble with White-tail populations this year according to reports published in the "Outdoor Times" news.
Deer are fat and plentiful after good summer rains and browse crops on the Edwards Plateau. Good antler development has been noted and an exceptional crop of fawns are in evidence.
The general season in most counties will open November 9th and hunters will be allowed two bucks and a doe where permits are available.
Congress Passes Strong Gun Bill
The strongest gun control bill ever to pass Congress is awaiting the signature of President Johnson, who had sought an even tougher measure.
The bill before the President is a compromise product of a House-Senate conference committee and bans the mail order sale of rifles, shotguns and ammunition.
Although it lacks provisions for registration of owners and licensing of firearms which Johnson pleaded for, he is expected to sign it. It is not certain when.

The bill will make it illegal to buy through the mail outside the state in which you live, and bans sales of firearms or ammunition to juveniles, fugitives, mental incompetents, drug addicts, or persons under criminal indictment.

It forbids over-the-counter sales of pistols to anyone under 21 and rifles and shotguns to those under 18. Similar age limits would apply to the sale of ammunition.

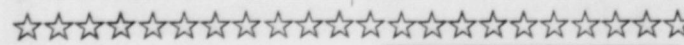

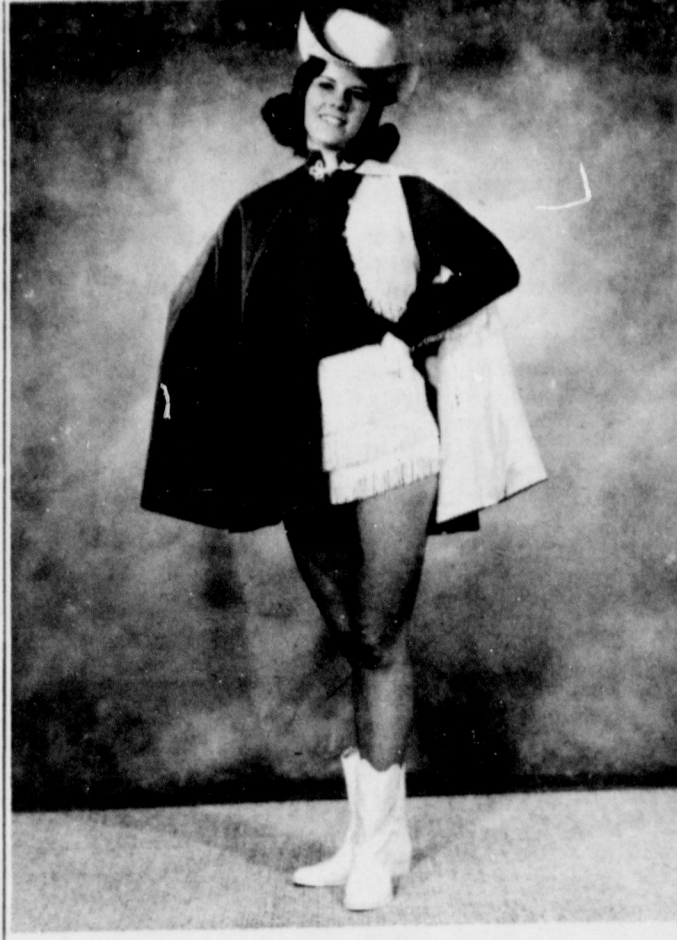

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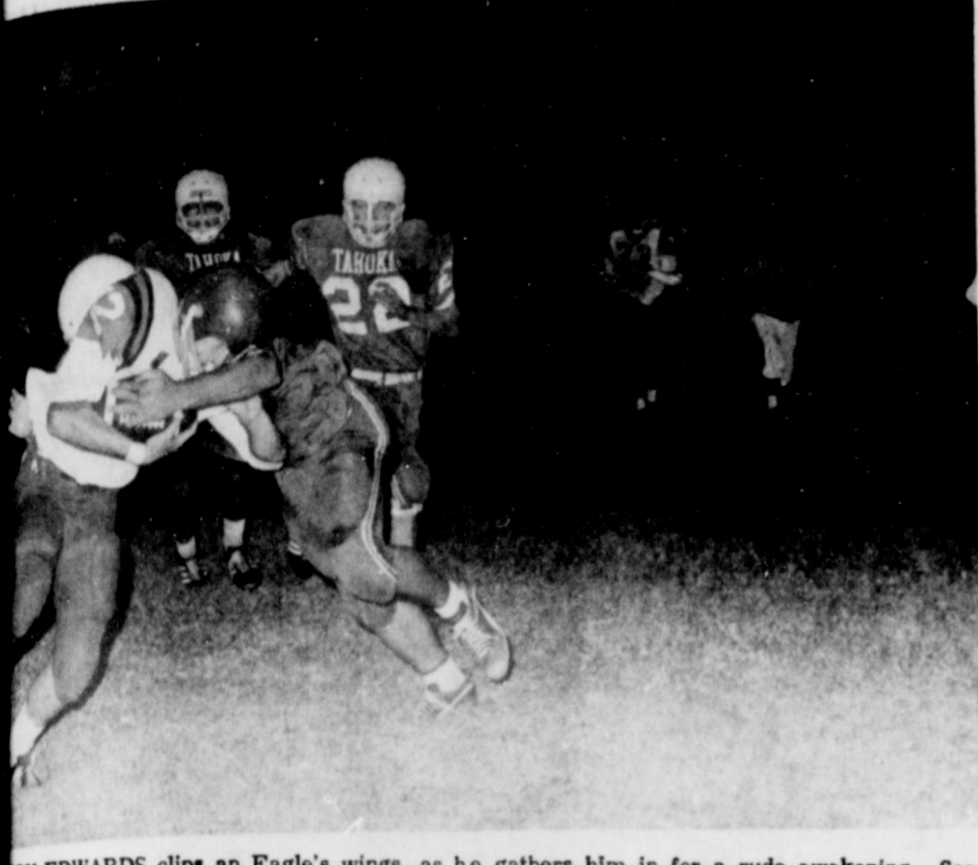


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EDWARDS clips an Eagle's wings, as he gathers him in for a rude awakening. Seavers dominated the yards rushing column throughout the game. Redwine Photo

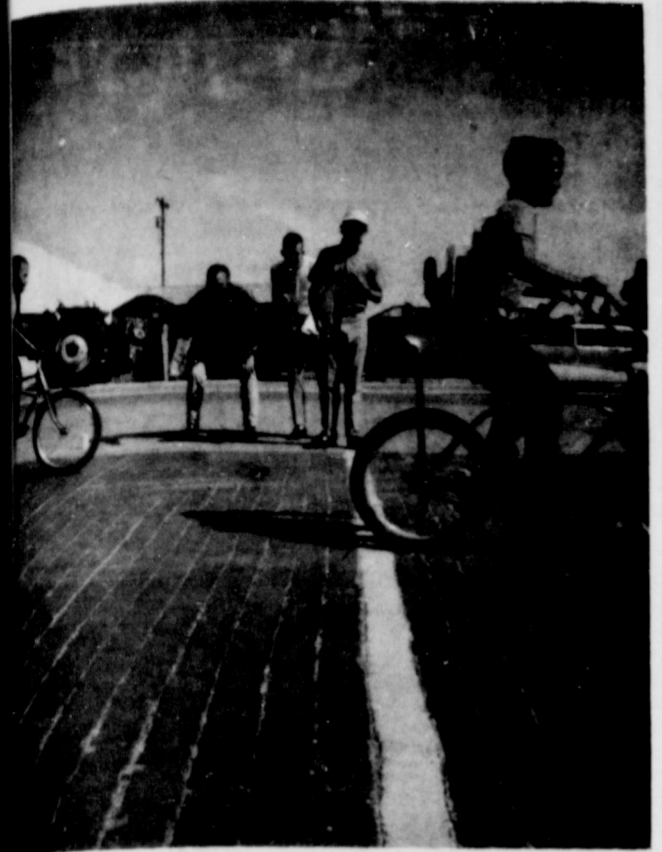

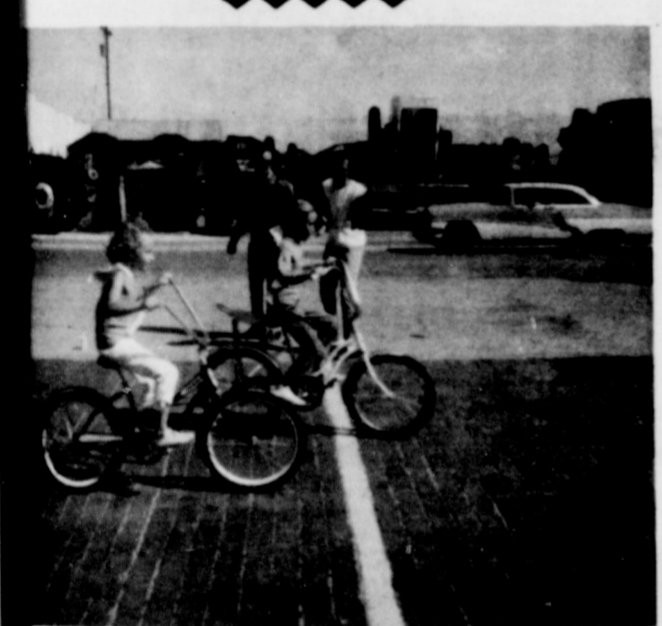

WHAT'S NEW IN SCIENCE?

In another area of advanced work, scientists have succeeded, at least in part, in their quest to outdo Nature. They have developed "pure" iron. Found only in the laboratory, the tiny iron crystals have a strength up to two million pounds per square inch. They are being used to strengthen alloys in much the same way steel reinforces concrete.

Moving from the laboratory to the factory, an industrial process control system has been developed—with a computer as its central component. The system can operate machines with accuracy and efficiency equal to nine hands controlled by a single brain. Advanced computer systems are also being developed that could control entire manufacturing facilities.

Parcel Post Rate Increase Effective This Saturday

Postmaster Charles Townes reminded postal customers today that higher parcel post and catalog rates will go into effect Saturday (October 19).

The rate increase will average 10.5 percent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

The new rates apply only to parcels weighing one pound and over.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined for outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50

cents to 60 cents. Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more

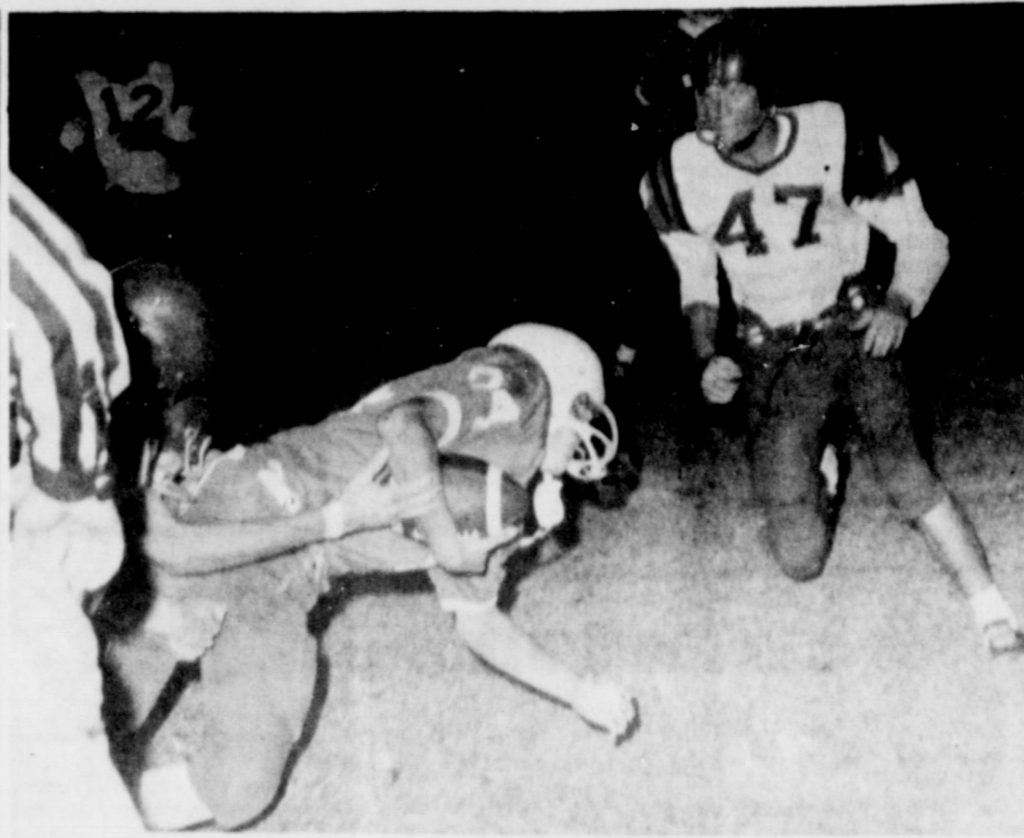

than 80 percent of all parcel post, the postmaster pointed out.

There will be a 15-cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4.00 and a 20 cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.00.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four percent of operating costs, as required by law, the postmaster explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail, on a break-even basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.

Special Schedule Set For Overseas Christmas Mail

The following periods have been designated for mailing Christmas parcels to members of the armed forces overseas:

1. Surface Transportation - October 14 to November 9.

2. SAM (Space Available Parcel Airlift) - October 21 to November 23.

3. P.A.L. - October 28 to November 30.

4. Airmail - November 30 to December 11.

The term "Armed Forces Overseas" includes personnel of the armed forces, members of their families, and U. S. civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO or FPO, New York, San Francisco, or Seattle.

It is necessary that all articles should be packaged in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper which materially

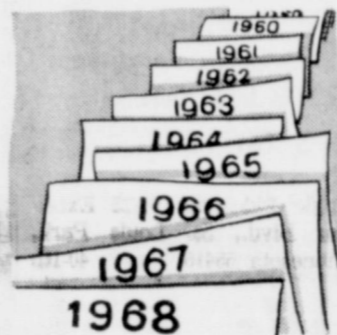
strengthens the package. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. Unless tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. A slip showing

list of contents, and name and address of sender and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel.

Slow Motion Divorce



Not long ago a man filed suit for divorce on the ground that his wife had committed adultery—20 years earlier. But his case was dismissed because of too much procrastination. The court, noting the difficulties of finding out what really happened that long ago, commented:

"A husband cannot wait to make his charges until the years dim the proofs to the contrary."

Like most lawsuits, a divorce suit too long delayed may be

barred automatically by a state's statute of limitations. But even if there is no automatic bar, courts are usually skeptical of divorce suits in which the complaining spouse has postponed action for an excessive period of time.

One reason, mentioned above, is the problem of evidence—of dredging facts out of a distant past. Another reason is the feeling that a grievance, if acted upon so slowly, could not have been too serious in the first place.

Thus a woman failed to convince the court that two blows by her husband, inflicted 40 years before, had ruined her marriage.

"There must be some limit to judicial credulity," said the judge. "We think it has been reached here."

Nevertheless, there may well be a legitimate reason for delay. For example, a man who put off a divorce suit for a number of years, after learning of his wife's infidelity, gave an excuse that satisfied the court: he wanted to spare his young children from scandal as long as he could.

In another case a husband was held justified in waiting gallantly, before suing for divorce, while his

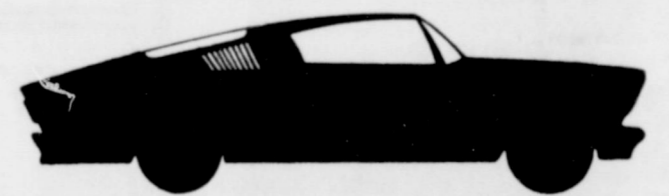

New regulations on special diet foods have been established by the Food and Drug Administration. They are aimed at providing the consumer with more facts about the food he buys for weight control and for special diet needs.

Foods for special dietary use are intended to fill a particular physical or physiological need. These may be for persons who are overweight, underweight, diabetic, allergic to certain foods or on a salt free diet. A special food may fit needs of infants or children.

New regulations require the manufacturer to support his claim that the food is intended for special dietary use. A list of dietary properties that support the claim must be printed on the label.

Foods which are sold for special dietary use in reducing or maintaining body weight must be labeled "for calorie-restricted diets." In order to be labeled such: calories must be reduced at least 50 percent. The term "lower in calorie" may be used by manufacturers on the label. However, the declaration "Low Calorie" may be made only if the foods contain not more than 15 calories in a serving and not more than 30 calories in the average total daily consumption of the food.

The manufacturers of artificial sweetener and foods which contain artificial sweeteners have been required to state the amount of artificial sweetener in a specified serving (table, capsule, teaspoonful) and a description of its sweetening effect in comparison to a quantity of sugar.

Foods for diabetics must be labeled: "For the diets of diabetics." The manufacturer is required to state on the label the protein, fat, carbohydrate and calorie content in 100 grams of such food.

These new regulations also require the manufacturer to provide information if non nutritive ingredients have been added. Sometime cellulose and other bulk which have no nutritive value are added to foods.

**Bill Griffin,
County Agent,
Says.....**

Whether we like it or not, frost and freezing weather are just around the corner. The change in weather will affect plant growth. When the growth of all members of the sorghums and all hybrids, is stopped by frost, they sometimes develop a high prussic acid content and become hazardous to grazing livestock, points out County Agent Bill Griffin.

Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants and are responsible for the prussic acid development, explains the county agent. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how soon a veterinarian can get to it, says Griffin.

Frosted Johnsongrass or sorghum should not be grazed until the damaged plants are as dry as good quality hay or for at least a week after the frost, warns the county agent. If it is ready to cut for hay before the frost, it may be cut immediately, provided adequate cutting time is allowed. Silage made from frost-damaged plants is safe as soon as the ensiling process is complete.

Young plants or second growth suckers are more likely to cause trouble than older plants nearing maturity, explains Griffin. Too, the more luxuriant the growth, the more likely the plants will be dangerous when their growth is interrupted.

Additional information is available from veterinarians and county agents on questions relating to the grazing and/or harvesting and storing of frost wilted plants.
