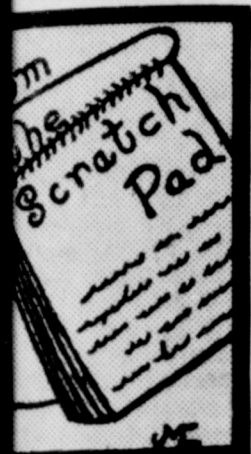

Highway Patrol Unit Begins Operations In Lynn County

A two-car rear-end collision Saturday night, resulted in injuries for three persons and serious damage to both vehicles. The accident occurred about 7:30, five miles north of Tahoka on U. S. 87.

Cases Are Reviewed In Court Last Week

District court convened last week with nine cases being heard. Included were two jury trials and seven pleas of guilty.

One jury trial of local interest was for Teofilo S. Gonzales, charged with burglary with intent to commit theft. He was found guilty and assessed nine years in the penitentiary. Sentencing is pending.

The following cases were reviewed March 24, with all entering pleas of guilty.

George Earl Miller, illegal transportation of copper wire. Sentenced not less than one year nor more than 2 years in penitentiary.

Roy Morris Hawks, driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense. Sentenced 120 days

in county jail.

Nino Honesto, defrauding by worthless check, value over \$50.00. Three year sentence, on probation for term of sentence.

Joe Longoria, burglary with intent to commit theft. Three year sentence, on probation for term of sentence.

Bond Sales

Total \$3,755

During the month of February the sale of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares totaled \$3,755, according to Mr. F. B. Hegi, Chairman of the Lynn County Savings Bonds Committee. The January-February sales totaled \$10,754 and this is 8 percent of the 1969 goal of \$130,000.

Sales in Texas during February totaled \$14,369,901. Year-to-date sales totaled \$33,071,780 which is an increase of 3.9 percent over sales during 1968.

Nation-wide, total February sales of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares were \$442 million, slightly above February 1968 sales, totaling \$366 million, 6.8 percent below a year earlier.

Fire Conference Set At Lubbock

Local firemen will attend the 21st annual Lubbock Area Firemen's Conference to be held April 7 through the 9th. The conference was scheduled by the planning committee

during early February. Former Tahoka Chief, Pat Patterson is a member of the committee.

Four participation projects are scheduled Monday evening, beginning at 7:30. Firemen will actively work in the projects, which include house fire, butane fire, truck spill fire and breathing apparatus.

Personnel in charge of the projects represent departments from Spur, San Angelo, Lorraine, Post, Abilene, Hereford, Plainview, and Tahoka. Pat Patterson is project leader in the truck spill fire.

Tuesday and Wednesday will be used for conference lectures and discussion. Also, the participation projects will be scheduled again Tuesday for those firemen unable to participate Monday night.

Falls And Tractor Accidents Lead In Farm Fatalities

"We must all become more safety conscious if we expect to reverse the upward trend of fatalities due to farm accidents," Howard Moore, president of Lynn County Farm Bureau said recently. "All too often it takes the death of a friend or relative to make us more safety minded."

Statistics for 1968, compiled by the Bureau of Vital Statistics and forwarded to the Lynn County Farm Bureau by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department, show a six percent death increase for

1968 as compared to the previous year. Last year 297 persons in Texas died as the result of farm accidents. There were 280 deaths in 1967.

TBA Safety Director, Joe Smetana of Waco said, "We're becoming less safety minded. With the rural population decreasing, we should at least hope for the number of deaths due to farm accidents to decrease at the same rate, but they are not."

Firearms accidents accounted for the greatest number of fatalities last year; forty-nine

persons were killed. Other major causes of the 297 deaths were burns - 54, falls - 44 tractor accidents - 33, drowning - 33, and farm machinery other than tractors - 22.

Most of the increase for 1968 is attributed to the increased number of deaths due to falls and tractor accidents as compared to 1967. The only category that showed a marked reduction of fatalities was drowning. Thirty-three drowned last year, compared to 41 in 1967.

County Vehicle Inspection Short Of Halfway Mark

"With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 43% of the registered vehicles in Lynn County have been inspected," stated Capt. Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline," Johnson added.

"Any driver operating a vehicle on public roads after April 15 that is required to be inspected will be operating in violation of the law," he said.

Capt. Johnson called attention to the fact that since the

beginning of the inspection program in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13% to 3%.

Johnson said, "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident."

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Why do consumers buy substitute foods. Cost, answers Linda. Substitute milks may cost 5 to 15 cents a quart less than fluid whole milk.

Another reason, some substitute milks have better keeping qualities, they will not spoil as fast and some of them do not have to be refrigerated.

And some consumers will buy substitute milks because of special diets. Since milk is highly saturated, many medical doctors suggest limiting its intake for those with certain heart conditions such as atherosclerosis.

Some substitute milks, those made with soybean oil for example, contain less saturated fats. However, coconut oil which is often used is more saturated than milk fat. Imitation and substitute foods today have engulfed a large section of the grocer's dairy food cases. Some substitutes have been perfected to the extent they are hard to distinguish from the real products.

Substitutes include milk, margarine, whipped toppings, coffee whiteners, and mello-

rine. Substitute milk falls into two categories. Filled milk and imitation milk. Filled milks are illegal in Texas and cannot be sold in interstate trade but they are used today by military personnel overseas. Imitation milks are legal in Texas.

Filled milk is a combination of milk solids, from non-fat dry milk or Grade A skim milk, and fats or oils other than milk fat (butterfat). The fat or oils may be coconut, soybean, or cottonseed oil.

To simulate real milk nutritionally, filled milk is vitamin fortified.

Imitation milk is a true dairy imitation; it does not contain milk solids as does filled milk. Ingredients, are vegetable fat, sodium caseinate, vitamins, minerals, coloring, and emulsifier, and seaweed extract, called carageenin.

Imitation milk is still in an experimental state and is not sufficiently standardized to be recommended as a substitute for whole, skin, nonfat, or filled milk.

"Neither filled or imitation milk is milk as we know it." Research has not shown that coconut oil is a satisfactory substitute for butterfat.

This causes much of the controversy over the sale of the milk substitutes.

Coconut oil is often used as the fat in filled milk. Coconut oil is highly saturated and many nutritionists and medical doctors advise some persons to limit their consumption of saturated fats, using polyunsaturated fats instead.

Therefore, substituting filled milks made with corn, soya, safflower, or cottonseed oils may be a real contribution to better health.

Recipe of the week

- Frozen Fruit Salad
- 6 oz. cream cheese
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- 1 cup sweetened condensed milk
- 2 envelopes whipped topping
- 1 can pineapple, crushed and drained
- 1 can cherry pie filling
- 1 cup nuts
- Soften cream cheese and add lemon juice. Mix until smooth, add milk, pineapple, fold in whipped topping, nuts and pie filling. Freeze until firm. Cut in squares.

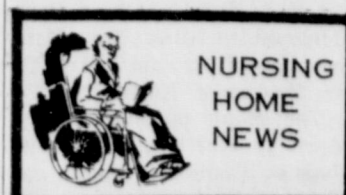

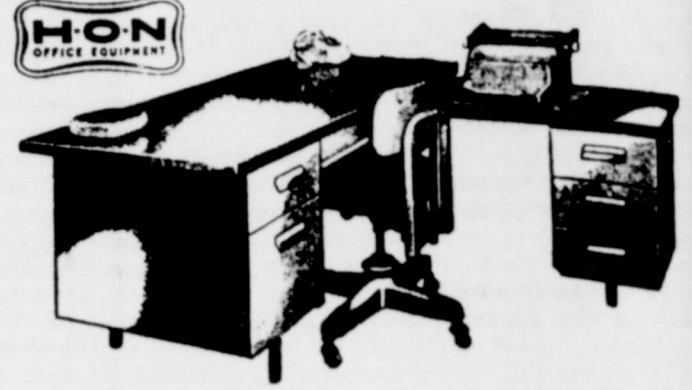
