SOUND POULTRY HINTS


Cull Out Ali Superficial Males and Unprofitable Hens.

Every Fowl That Does Not Appears Healthy and Vigorous Should Be Sent to Market-Feed Liberally During Cold Weather.

One of the very first things to do to secure a profit from the farm flock during the winter is to cull out the dock and sell every bird that does not show a promise of returning a profit

Old hens, superfluous males and pullets that do not show good healthy development had better be sold for what they will bring. All birds that do not appear healthy and vigorous should be placed in a house by themselves and given a cnauce to become marketable. In this way the size of the flock can be reduced and only hens that are capable of paying for their feed and care kept through the

The flock must be fed liberally during the cold weather. Nothing is to be gained by feeding starvation rations. This much is an assured fact.

It is better to sell half the flock and give he feed to the ones that are left. With feeds of all kinds at present price it requires strict economy and care I management to secure results during the winter months.

Wheat, corn and oats make an ideal grain ration for laying hens, It forms a palatable feed, furnishes variety and is well balanced for egg production. With boiled vegetables and meat scraps added or mixed with cut clover it makes a well-balanced feed.

The grain feeds can be improved by grinding and feeding in the form of a mash a part of the time. The change is highly beneficial and increases egg production. Meat scraps are a good source of protein. Green bone is preferred by many poultrymen, but it is out of the question with many poultry keepers on account of the amount of laber required in its

If one is situated near to a large market and can buy bone and meat at a low cost and has plenty of time to prepare it, he may then secure a good feed at a moderate cost. However, I believe that the average poultry keeper will find meat scraps at three dollars a hundred fully as cheap and economical a feed.

Heas must have bulky and succulent feed to take the place of the green grass they get during the surymer. Alfalfa and red clover cut and cured early, are the best substitutes. If the hay is run through a cutting box or grinder and steamed for an hour and a half the hens will consume

It is rich in protein and a good eggproducing food. If the flock has a dry and comfortable house, free from vermin, they will furnish an abundant supply of winter eggs, providing, of course, that other conditions are





FIND COMFORT IN TRENCHES

British Soldiers at Front Provided With Beds and Fires, and Have Dry Boots Awaiting Them.

Enormous improvements have been made in the British trenches since last winter. Most of them have boarded floors, others have brick

The dugouts are comparatively cons fortable. The men have rought beds to lie on, and many contain tables. Many of them also have small braziers with fires.





BUILDING ON INSIDE LOT

Home May Be Made as Comfortable as One Erected in More Advantageous Position.

When building on an inside lot a number of complications, not found in a corner house, will arise. The corner house has unobstructed views from the windows on two sides, while the house on the inside lot is likely to * have but one. This fact necessitates careful planning in locating the living room, front entrance and porch.

The location of the living room may develop the question of a choice between a western exposure, which is desirable, or windows, which are a necessity.

Since from the standpoint of health, as well as of comfort, it is essential to secure the maximum of sun and air in preference to other considerations, the living room should extend across the front of the house. High windows, if neighboring houses are near, may be placed at the sides to admit air and light, and will exclude unattractive views.

With the living room extending across the front of the house, the correct location of the entrance becomes a problem. A middle entrance is not desirable, since it would make the living room a common thoroughfare or else necessitate a division in it.

A satisfactory solution is to place the entrance at one corner. By this arrangement the entrance hall may be so divided from the living room as to

LAWN REQUIRES MUCH CARE

Must Not Be Neglected If One Would Have a Really Suitable Adjunct to Home.

in order to keep our lawns beautiful, they must have constant care. Too often the lawn is cared for only during the growing season, when in reality it should be cared for during the whole year.

Whenever the lawn needs fertilizing, put on very fine, well-rotted manure soon after the ground becomes frozen in the fall. Let it lay on the lawn all winter, and rake it off in the spring as soon as active growth takes place. Be cure and use well-rotted manure, because fresh manure is apt to heat and kill the grass roots.

During an open winter, the grass is subject to a drying-out process which tends to kill the roots. This can be helped by sprinkling the lawn

Weeds, dandelions, etc., infest the lawn whenever the grass has become thin. These thin places can be remedied a great deal by sowing grass seed very early in the spring and raking it in well. Young grass will start growing very early, and in this way, it will get ahead of the meds .- E. F. McKune, Colorado Agricultural College, Fort Collins, Colorado,

Recovering Radium.




