HE habit of borrowing is something to be frowned upon, chiefly because borrowers rarely have good memories. In largu citiea one escapes the borrowing neighbor because there is little or apart than the thickness of a wall or floor and ceiling, but in amall communities there is a temptation to remedy the
shortcomings of one's household or wardrobe by the loan of articles belonging to neighbors and relatives. Borrowers have scruples concerning the value of anything they may desire.
There is no doubt that there are times when the tempoThere is no doubt that there are times when, the empo-- "ary use of articles saves trouble and discomfort. In the neighborhoods eause it is understood that nobody cares to own more than one or two at the most. But invariably articles are promptly returned and the bor-
rowers stand ready to take their turn at lending. That is simply an arrangement where everybody shares alike, and not a bit like borrowin eggs and butter and sugar, postage stamps and small sums of money, and forgetting to repay them.

Fine-minded women are rarely content to rest under an obligation of any description. They accept favors graciously, even ask for them, but ner, but that is not always possible, save in borrowing. It is strange that vomen will be so punctilious in the matter of car fare and forget to repay postage stamps - we meet cases of that kind frequently.

Two women will argue for more than two minutes over the payment of car fare when it might be easily adjusted by a simple little scheme which is having some vogue among some women. Take a pair who ar
coing to a matinee-before boarding a car one will ask: "Odd or even?

SANITATION AND HEALTH IN THE PUBLIC sCHOOLS Khowing your duty towards the prevention of epidemics through contagious diseases that may be spread by a failure to obey thes instructions: I shall now mention a few of the salient points of sanitation and disinfection. Quoting from the advisory supplement the Sonitary code of Texas.

- Every public building must be properly lighted and well ventilat-
ed. Where ed. Where drinking water is furnished it must be pure and wholesome. The sweeping must be performed daily when in use and if possible at a time when the building is free from occupants, and must be done in such a way that clouds of dust will not arise, by
the use of either the preumatic the use of either the preumatic
vacuum process, or by sprinkling vacuum process, or by sprinkling sufficient sawdust, wet paper or
other wet material to allay the other wet material to allay the
dust: said material to be dampened with a two per cent absolute for maldehyde or dtsintactant approv ed by the State Board of Health

pneumatic xacuum process), but a cioth wet with two per cent solu tion of absolute formaldehyde o: other approved disentectant must
