Sid Wasson Acquited.

On Wednesday the 16th of this month, at Colorado, Sid Wasson of Dawson County was cleared after a trial in which 30 witnesses were examined and which consumed three days.

The state was represented by District Attorney M. Carter, Han. L. W. Sandusky, of Colorado, and J. S. Crumpton county attorney of Dawson county. The defense by Hon. C. P. Woodruff, of Sweetwater, Hon. H. B. Morrison and Ellis Douthitt, of Big Springs, and Judge Felix G. Thurmond, of Colorado.

HISTORY OF THE KILLING.

The defendant was charged, together with his brother, Arthur Wasson, with killing of J. B. Puryear and Earl Seeds, on June 9th., 1906, both citizens of Dawson county, recently coming there from Oklahoma. The theory of the state was that the Wassons conspired together to kill Puryear and seeds. The theory of the defense was that the said Puryear and Seeds had conspired to kill Arthur Wasson and had secured a witness, who was to be present at the time of the killing in order that they might be able to prove self defense. According to the evidence it seems that Arthur Wasson, brother of Sid Wasson, and Puryear had had trouble, engaging in a fist fight a month or so before the killing, but at the time they shook hands and agreed to drop it, but it was soon learned by Arthur Wasson that Puryear was making threats to take his (Wasson's) life at first sight, he being informed of these threats by Grant and others at different times, and Puryear and Seeds had on several occasions tried to borrow a long range gun, and up to the day before the killing, Seeds, who was a friend of Puryear's tried to borrow a gun from a neighbor, Ed Pearce, which was testified to by Mr. Pearce in the trial, and which fact Wasson was informed of. Being informed of all these facts the Wasson brothers went armed and were on the day of the killing engaged in rounding up cattle, some 800 or 900 head, in their pasture at the Turbine wells, and while there Puryear and Seeds came up in their wagon, returning from Lamesa, and from the testimony of the only eye witness who testified in the case, Puryear and Seeds opened fire on the Wassons, Arthur Wasson returning the fire with a winchester shotgun, and after

emptying it he got a winchester from his brother Sid's saddle, when Puryear fired upon them again, whereupon Arthur Wasson again began firing and both Puryear and Seeds were killed.

The testimony was a general surprise to everybody who heard it, as a rumor had previously gone out which put a different light on the case altogether. After hearing the evidence, the jury, we believe, weighed the matter impartially, and the verdict is generally approved by those who heard the evidence.

The case of Arthur Wasson was continued by the state until the June term of court.

Below we print an extract from a Fort Worth Daily Record editorial.

The Salton Sink is a large depression which is 200 feet below the level of the Colorado river. Few people have ever lived there, and the only advantage the section possessed was in the store of salt which the Southern Pacific railroad found profit in hauling to market. The section is among the hottest in this country, and the evaporation from this unwelcome sea is, therefore, enormous. The immense volumes of moisture from the waters in this valley are carried up over the low mountains and carried by the prevailing winds to the southeast, where the cooler atmosphere causes its precipitation upon the rich lands of Mexico, West Texas and the territories. As proof of this theory, it need only be mentioned that the rainfall in these sections last year was unprecedented, and last year was the first that the Salton sea has been a living body of water within the memory of man.

Chapels on Rails.

In the February number of the New Idea Woman's Magazine, Katherine Louise Smith tells of the ingenious method by which the benefits of religious teaching are being spread through many new and sparcely settled districts where the hamlets are too small or not sufficiently well-to-do to afford a chapel to themselves. This is by furnishing a regular railway carriage as a chapel, attaching it to a train and side-tracking it all along the line wherever it may be desired. The management is as follows:

"The cars are sent out with a missionary, who frequently is accompanied by his wife, and are side-tracked while in the town. They have living quarters for the missionary and an audience room capable of seating from eighty to a hundred and forty people, the newer cars being larger and more commodious than those first built. A library of books, papers and railroad magazines, an organ and a graphophone form the usual equipment. Often people come from ten or fifteen miles away to attend service, and in a few instances the townspeople have laid sidewalks that the car may be easily reached. When it is remembered that in smaller communities the church is frequently not only the guide and

teacher in all higher life, both spiritual and intellectual, but the only social center as well, it will be understood what a blank has been filled by these itinerating chapels.

"The cost of running the six cars averages \$15,000 a year, and all the cars are built and maintained by voluntary offerings. Some railroads have built a special side-track for the car, and on one occasion, never to be forgotten, a track was laid especially for the car. At another time the general manager of the road went with the car to the dedication of a church and offered financial aid to the work in new towns. Another hitched the car to his special train. All these courtesies are much appreciated, but they are deserved, for it goes without saying that when a car can in a short visit change a place so that the station agent will remain at his post when he has planned leaving because of the rough element, such work is worth encouraging.
