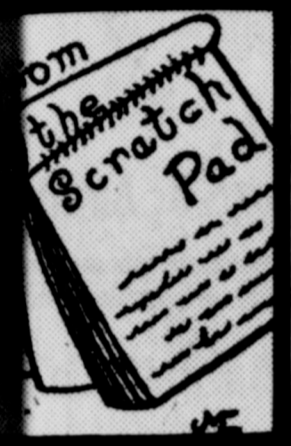

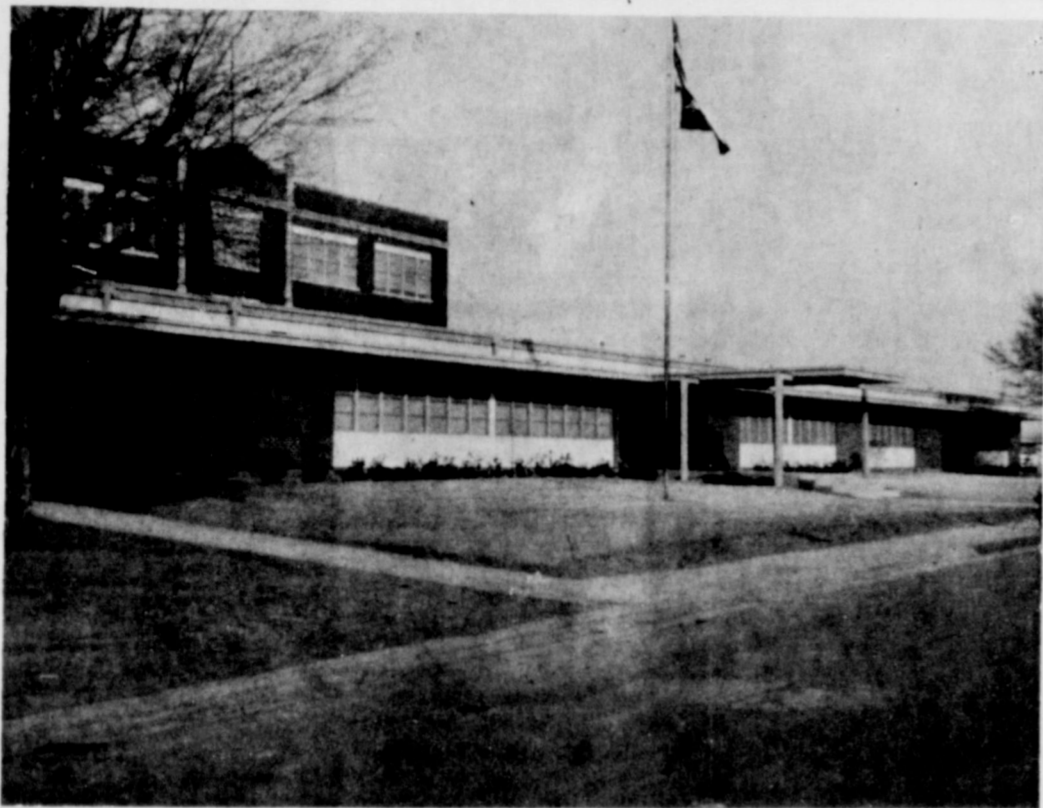
All of the above added together is the reason why some kids are running wild today. Dad has run out of brains.

Two trustee positions are open on the school board and the city council will have filings open for two councilmen and mayor.

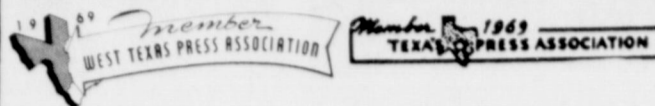
