A Regular Snap.

"Yes," remarked the country merchant to the newspaper reporter, "I certainly have a snap. The wholesale houses send me duns and draw on me at sight, but if I send a bill to a farmer he will come in swearing and quit trading at my store. While I am hard up for money, many of my debtors are sending cash in advance to mail order houses. If I contribute money to any cause, people say I am bidding for trade; if I don't they say I am a hog. Every day I am expected to dig up for something, from a raffle ticket to a church fund, by people who say I ought to do this because they do part of their trading here, but Montgomery Ward neither buys raffle tickets nor helps the church fund any, and gets the cash-in-advance business, and if I were to circulate a subscription paper among the city wholesale houses where we trade I would get the horse laugh proper. If I sell a pair of pants I must treat the family to candy and cigars; if I buy a load of potatoes I must do the same thing. Customers who are able to pay, hang onto their money while I pay 10 per cent at the bank to get the cash. I have a big business during hard times and poor crops, with people who are willing to trade with me providing I can duplicate cattalog house prices and wait until after harvest time for my money. My scales weigh too heavy when I sell sugar and too light when I buy butter. I am a thief, a liar and a grafter. If I smile I am a soft, gump." And then he leaned over \$10,000 worth of book accounts all good, and wondered how he could pay a \$350 sight draft due tomorrow.-Ex.

The neighbors have accused her of an evil power, and threatened to kill her. The poor woman says her neighbors have influenced the husband against her, and denies being the author of the alleged ills of which she is accused.

RARE CONTINENTAL BILLS.

Washington Newspaper Writer Owns Collection Dating Back to 1785— Received from New England.

Washington.—Col. Ezra Nat. Hill, a newspaper writer of this city, has come into possession of some rare and valuable pieces of continental money which he has been exhibiting to his acquaintances. One of the notes was issued by the city of Albany, N. Y., March 26, 1791, and the legend "Three Pence" is printed across its face in old style type.

Another note of similar value was issued by the city of Philadelphia in 1797, while a quaint bill on age-yellowed paper was issued by "the state of Massachusetts Bay" in 1785, and calls for "one Spanish milled dollar." Another note, issued by the same state, calls for "two Spanish milled dollars," and still another demands seven of the dollars of the dons.

Col. Hill says this queer and interesting continental money was sent to him by a friend in New England.



HUNT SNAKES FOR SKINS.

Men in Upper Missouri Valley Gain a Living by Capturing the Venomous Reptiles Alive.

Trempleau, Wis.-Hunting rattle snakes for their skins has furnished a new and hazardous occupation for many men who reside among the hills and rocky bluffs of the Upper Missouri valley, where the rattler attains perfection as to size and color. The snake must be taken alive and decapitated before he has an opportunity to strike himself, for once the deadly poison is injected the skin loses luster and value.

The price paid for perfect tanned skins is about one dollar each, and in addition the oil obtained from the snake commands a high price from its supposed value as a cure for rheumatism and kindred diseases. Each rattler captured alive means about \$1.50 to the hunter.

Among the most successful hunters is Alfred Johnson, of this place, who possesses many large and beautiful skins. His latest capture was nearly seven feet long and carried 19 rattles. Mr. Johnson has succeeded in domesticating a large number of young rattlers, which allow him to handle them as he will, and follow at his call like well-trained puppies.

SUIT TESTS DIVORCE LAWS

Short Period of Insanity Intervenes Between Alleged Cruelty and Wife's Plaint.

Carlinville, Ill.-A peculiar suit for divorce has been filed in this county, involving the construction of the law which prohibits the granting of a legal separation because of insanity. So far as is known, no similar proceeding has ever been filed in Illi-

Mrs. Georgia Kitzmiller, wife of Former Representative James V. Kitzmiller, is the complainant. Cruelty is the charge, and the acts complained of date back 13 and 14 years. They consist for the most part of threats.

In 1903 Kitzmiller was adjudged insane, and sent to the hospital at Jacksonville. He has spent much time there, and it is understood that he has quite recovered his reason. Recently he returned to the home of his father in Girard, where he is now living. Whether the acts of cruelty complained of, and which occurred so many years ago, can be set up as proper grounds for divorce in a case where a period of mental irresponsibility has intervened, is the important question to decide.
