
Hunter Tucker ls In Florida

E. L. Short of Tahoka local farmer, rancher, businessman and friend of most people in Lynn County won State Representative Post Tuesday. August 5 to be the first Rep resentative from Lynn County. in the 73rd District, since the early 1920's.

Short will replace R. G. (Randy) Pendleton who resigned the Post to take a position in Washington.

Mr. Short is married to the former Dink Fortenberry of Dawson County and has four daughters. Patti. Robbin. Vivian and Leah. He left for Austin Wednesday morning.

Short received 3,799, or 64.6 per cent, of the 5,877 votes cast the six-county district Andrews, Dawson, Gaines Lynn, Martin, and Yoakum

while Clack received 2.085 votes The county votes were Andrews, Short 272, Clack 994; Dawson, Short 1,143, Clack 277; Gaines, Short 657, Clack 363; Lynn, Short 1,001, Clack 208; Martin, Short 245, Clack 61; and Yoakum, Short 480, Clack 155. Short polled 43.4 per cent of the votes cast in the first election for the seat July 22. Nine Clack polled 19.4 per cent.

Easy Egg Nog Custards



Why weary the family with the same plain old custard when you can give it a flan-like flair? While the feeling may be French, the convenience is strictly American. The prime reason? A canned egg nog that's available year 'round. It requires no refrigeration, so is ever ready on the pantry shelf as a chill-and-serve beverage, for pastries, sauces and custards. 
Caramel-Crested Egg Nog Custards

1/2 cup sugar 2-1/2 cups Borden Canned

2 eggs 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons rum,

In a small skillet heat sugar over low heat until it melts and In a small skillet heat sugar over low heat until it melts and turns a light, golden brown syrup; stir constantly. Pour about 1 tablespoon hot syrup into each 5-ounce custard cup; let cool. In a medium-size saucepan scald egg nog. Beat eggs with salt. Slowly stir hot egg nog into beaten eggs. If desired, stir in rum; blend well. Pour mixture over syrup in custard cups. Set cups in a 1-inch warm-water bath. Bake in a slow (325°F.) oven 1 hour and 30 minutes, or until knife inserted 1/2 inch from edge of custard cup comes out clean. Remove cups from oven, then from water bath. Cool at room temperature. Refrigerate until well chilled, about 2 hours, or until serving time. Then, carefully insert a knife around side of cup to loosen custard; invert cups sert a knife around side of cup to loosen custard; invert cups and quickly turn out custards and caramel syrup.

MICRO-MESSAGES FOR THE MOON from 74 head of state plus four U.S. documents are contained on this 112 inch diameter silicon wafer in a Time Capsule left on the moon by the Apollo 11 astronauts.

The messages were reduced to 1/200th of their original size by a new information technology process developed by the Sprague Electric Company Semiconductor Division, Worcester, Mass.

By etching the micro-messages in an ultra-thin, 4millionths of an inch, quartz (silicon dioxide) coating on the silicon wafer, a record able to withstand the extreme conditions of space will remain permanently on the moon to signify the historic event.

The Sprague process allows the pin-head sized messages to withstand temperatures over 1800°F indefinitely, something far beyond the abilities of microfilm and other previous micro-reproduction techniques.







Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says....

If you plan to buy lace for fall here are some tips:

1. Ask if lace is stabilized for shrinkage control. Lace fabrics are under tension in manufacture. Drycleaning and the steaming in finishing release the fabric causing shrinkage if it hasn't been stabilized. Unstabilized laces may shrink as much as 10 per cent.

2. Note underarem and side seams in lace clothing. Are they amply in width and well finished? Small seams pull out with strain in wear.

3. Observe buttonholes. Unfinished or machine-stiched buttonholes fray readily.

Wood furniture will resemble metal in modern home scenes. A finishing technique using silver nitrate gives wood the appearance of silver, cop-per, brass, gold or chrome. This finish now found on up-

holstered furniture has been used for many years on pictures and mirrow frames.

It can be used on pieces with elaborate detailing such as Spanish and Mediterrean styles where it would be impossible to shape some metals into some of the intricate designs. Advantages are that the finish can be applied to almost any surface or material and is economical.
