## Mrs. Harry Willett Makes World Tour

Mrs. Harry Willett returned  
home Wednesday of last week  
from a world's tour which in-  
cluded visits to major cities and  
provinces on two continents.

Traveling in a western direc-  
tion the entire way, the 105-day  
trip began March 17 and was  
terminated on July 1. Leaving  
Lubbock, Texas at 8:30 a.m.,  
Mrs. Willett and her party ar-  
rived in Honolulu at 4:30 p.m. the  
same day, after a two-hour  
wait in Los Angeles, and covered  
a distance of 2070 miles. Differ-  
ence in time zone also accounted  
for a day lost between Honolulu  
and Tokyo.

Arriving in Japan, the tour  
covered ten days of exhaustive  
sight-seeing, including trips to  
Taiwan and the Philippine Is-  
lands. Six days were spent at  
Hong Kong and Macao, with a  
trip to Cambodia to view the  
famous ruin of Angkor Wat at  
Siem Reap. Other stops were  
made in Singapore, Malaysia,  
Thailand and its capital, Bang-  
kok, and at Rangoon, capital of  
Burma.

India, Nepal, Pakistan and the  
Kingdom of Swat, Afghanistan,  
Iran, Iraq, Lebanon, Syria (Dama-  
scus), Egypt, Jordan and Is-  
rael were other countries visited.  
The tour of India required  
fifteen days, and while in New  
Delhi, Mrs. Willett visited in  
the home of Mr. and Mrs. George  
Knierrim and son, Larry. Mr.  
Knierrim is the brother of Mrs.  
Frank Pohl of Matador, and is  
a government agronomist. For  
several years he was engaged  
in agricultural pursuit in the  
small kingdom of Nepal.

Picturesque Istanbul, Turkey,  
divided by Bosphorus Strait, is  
astride the two continents of  
Europe and Asia and was toured  
as the party was completing the  
last "lap" of the journey.  
Going from Turkey to Greece  
and continuing to Italy, Spain  
and Portugal, the tour left Las-  
bon at 2:30 p.m. June 29 and  
arrived in Dallas at 9:00 p.m.  
after a three-hour wait in New  
York, with seven hours of fly-  
ing time. Mrs. Willett completed  
her trip to Matador after spend-  
ing two days in Dallas.

## Blackeyes Now On 1000 Acres

Blackeye peas are now plant-  
ed and up on more than 1000  
acres in this area and another  
500 acres are "pledged" to plant,  
according to "Corky" Marshall,  
Manager of Marshall's Feed and  
Seed at Roaring Springs.

Mr. Marshall handles the seed  
peas for the Holmes Green &  
Dry Pea Company of Post, which  
will harvest the green peas, ac-  
cording to contract, at \$1.75 per  
cwt.

He said the firm had supplied  
approximately 15,000 of pea seed  
to farmers in this area. Seed are  
to be paid for out of harvest.

Mr. Marshall said peas can  
be planted until the first or  
second week in August, in this  
area.

## FIRE DESTROYS GIN BUILDING

FIRE SWEEPED a large sheet  
iron and wooden building in the  
northeast edge of Matador's busi-  
ness section about 2 p.m. Mon-  
day, and within a short time re-  
duced it to smoldering rubble.

The building was a former  
cotton house owned by the West  
Texas Gin Company, and cur-  
rently used as housing for mi-  
grant laborers. Beattie Keltz,  
manager of the West Texas Gin  
now located on State Highway  
70 north of Matador said the  
building was insured for about  
\$2,000. He said he assumed it  
was constructed in 1915 when  
the original West Texas Gin was  
built here.

Three small children of the  
Ed Torres family escaped from  
the building a short time before  
the fire alarm was sounded. Mr.  
and Mrs. Torres and seven chil-  
dren were living in the struc-  
ture. Their possessions were a  
total loss, as were the posses-  
sions of N. B. Garcia, stored in  
the building. His loss was esti-  
mated at \$200.

Fire had spread through the  
large structure by the time the  
Matador Volunteer Fire Depart-  
ment arrived. Strong winds, ex-  
tremely dry weather and the  
difficult nature of the fire made  
it impossible to bring it under  
control. All three units of the  
fire department were kept busy  
in protecting other adjacent  
buildings.

It was the first total loss  
fire in Matador in several years,  
especially in the semi-business  
area.

## Key Fire Rate Reduced Here

Matador's key fire insurance  
rate has been reduced from 85c  
to 47c, effective June 30, accord-  
ing to information received this  
week from the Texas State  
Board of Insurance, by W. N.  
Pipkin, local insurance agent.

Mr. Pipkin said the rate is one  
of the lowest in many years and  
gives Matador a Class A dwelling  
rate instead of a former Class  
B. He estimated that the rate  
would save property owners  
many thousands of dollars in  
insurance premiums.

The high previous rate was  
established Jan. 2, 1962 when  
the State Board took away pro-  
tection recognition from the  
city.

While the fire rate is lowered  
there will be some increase in  
windstorm insurance, following  
a high rate of loss in the north-  
west Texas area, in which this  
county is included.

## Firemen to Sell New Key Chains

Chances are that a member  
of the Matador Volunteer Fire

few days about purchasing a new  
chain for your keys. The price  
is \$1.

The attractive chains bear the  
Matador Fire Department emer-  
gency number as well as the  
Matador Post Office Zip Code  
number.

Money from the sale of the  
chains will be used in the pur-  
chase of a new six-station short  
wave system to be used by the  
department. Four units of the  
equipment have already been in-  
stalled on fire-fighting equip-  
ment.

The system will enable one  
truck to talk to the driver of  
another truck several miles  
distance. The system will be es-  
pecially helpful in the fighting  
of prairie fires, it was declared.  
The radio units will also be  
used as storm warning in the  
event of severe conditions.

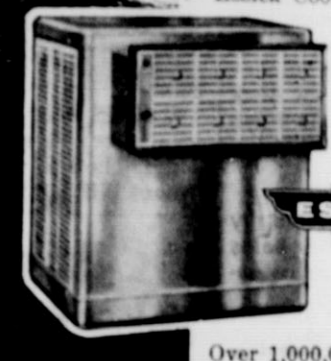

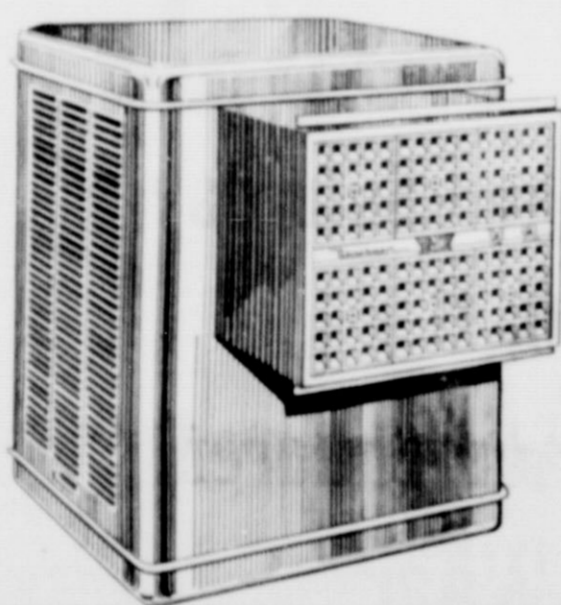
