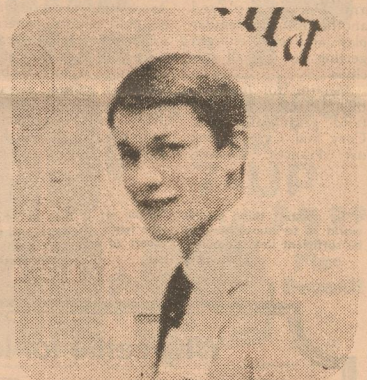

EMT Class Finishes Training

Persons taking the EMT Class here finished their classroom work and took their final test last Tuesday. A few in the class still have to finish hospital time and ambulance time.

The Emergency Medical Technicians are trained to handle any bandaging, splinting cases, spinal and head injuries, burns, or cardiac failure. They received training to cover most

emergency situations and also are trained to deliver babies.

To receive their EMT Certificate they must complete 10 weeks of classroom instruction, spend 24 hours in a hospital emergency room, 16 hours in any of three other departments in a hospital, be present for the birth of three babies and make 5 emergency ambulance runs.

Home From Extended Trip

Mrs. C. C. (Eliza) Jones, her sister, Mrs. W. E. (Mollie) Burleson and friend, Mrs. Allene Henery both of Floydada returned home recently from a springtime tour to points of interest from Texas to Florida and a Nassau Cruise.

They toured Vicksburg, Battleground in Texas and a local guide recreated the "seige" of Vicksburg in 1863 at the 80 acre National Military Park. One of the highlights in Alabama was the "First White House of the Confederacy" in Montgomery that had personal property and war relics of Jefferson Davis.

Among tourist attractions they visited in Florida the next three days was a tram-tour visit of St. Augustine, the Nations oldest city, beach of Atlantic Ocean, Cypress Gardens, and The Fountain of Youth. They were impressed by the Kennedy Space Center and the continuing exploration of outer space. A point of interest was the Manned Spacecraft Operations building and viewing a space trip transport weighing six million pounds. They also enjoyed Walt Disney World in Orlando.

They sailed from Miami on the Emerald Seas cruising hotel ship with 980 other passengers aboard. They visited the charming, bustling Nassau Island with its delightful shops, surrey rides and native straw markets. They continued to the Bahama Island Paradise with a general tour of the island including Fort Fincastle, that has twelve and fourteen feet thick walls with several rooms under tons of rock, and the Water Tower, a glass bottom boat ride and seeing where the Shah of Iran resided when he was there. Brush Clearance Machines Compared

The "Hydro Mower," a
heavy-duty, self-propel-
led brush cutter,
effectively shredded all
brush on two range sites
representative of the
mixed-brush complex of
South Texas. A
conventional tractor-
drawn brush shredder
also effectively shredded
both brush types, with
the exception of trees
exceeding 4 inches in
diameter. On a clay loam
range site, dominated by
mesquite and associated
mixed-brush species, the
Hydro mower shredded 3
acres of brush/hour
compared to 1 acre/hour
for the conventional
shredder. On a shallow
sandy loam range site,
dominated by blackbrush
acacia and associated
mixed-brush species, the
Hydro Mower shredded at
the rate of 2
acres/hour, compared to
3/4 acre/hour for the
conventional shredder.
Based on these cutting
