EMT Class Finishes Training

EMT Class here finished their classroom work and took their final test last Tuesday. A few in the class still have to finish hospital time and ambulance time. The Emergency Medical Technicians are trained to handle any bandaging, splinting cases, spinal and head injuries, burns, or cardiac failure. They received training to cover most

emergency situations and also are trained to deliver babys.

To receive their EMT Certificate they must complete 10 weeks of classroom instruction, spend 24 hours in a hospital emergency room, 16 hours in any of three other departments in a hospital, be present for the birth of three babys and make 5 emergency ambulance runs.


