Many families continue to main-

vided. Athough recent surveys show

gether, the good news is that most
American families still break bread together often. A 1996 survey by Rice-
A-Roni indicated that, on average Americans eat with their families five
nights each week, and 40 percent spend every night dining together

people interviewed in the Los Angeles area, one in three households did
not eat regularla as a fanily.
