

Motley County ISD receives Telecommunications Grant

Austin -- High-tech, dot com, world wide web, and surfing the net are just a few phrases that can be associated with the technology revolution and have become staples in the daily lives of many Texans. With the

assistance of the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board, a state agency that provides technology funding for Texas public

schools, new opportunities to partici-

pate in the ever-progressing technology of today are now possible. Students across the state are able to reap the benefits of technology in education. Using TIF grants, schools are introducing students to modern technology in education. Using TIF grants, schools are introducing students to modern technology, including high-speed Internet access and

distance learning. Motley County ISD received a grant award of \$50,000.00 for Elementary and High School campuses. This funding will be used to develop new, and expand current, technology infrastructure to provide students with the technology

The TIF Non-Competitive Grant for Texas Public Schools was designed to fund up-to-date hardware and connectivity equipment, highspeed workstations, Internet access, and/or distance learning equipment so that students may take classes

from another school district and/or an institution of higher education. Additionally, grant funds will be used for technology staff development, including hardware and software training, network training, methodology training, and base level technology training. These grant projects officially begin May 15, 2001.

In an effort to provide equitable funding for Texas public schools, TIF collaborated with the Texas Education Agency (TEA) by coordinating the release of the PS9 grant award announcement with the Technology Integration in Education (TIE5) an- agency receives approximately \$150 nouncement. We, as educators, want our students to succeed and become more marketable because of the education that they received while in school here. Since its creation by the 74th Leg-islature in 1995, TIF has awarded approximately \$592 million in grants to its four constituent groups - public school, libraries, institutions of higher education, and public, not-forprofit healthcare facilities. The

Jury finds no negligence in 1998 TxDOT accident

A 100th District Court jury deliberated just over an hour Thursday before returning a verdict of "no negligence" as to Bobby Williams, driver of the TxDOT pickup involved in the June 11, 1998 accident in which Megan Adams, 10, died.

The bicycle-pickup accident took place on FM 94 at Tell. The jury found

that the child was negligent.

The specific question to the jury reads: "Did negligence, if any, of those listed below proximately cause the occurrence in question. Answer yes or no for each of the following: a. Bobby Williams - "No"

b. Megan Lynn Adams - "Yes"

The charge continues, "If you have answered yes to question one for more than one of the persons named, then answer the following question. Otherwise, do not answer the following question."

The next question asked for percentage if negligence had been found by more than one of the persons named. Since only one was found negligent, it was not necessary to answer the next question.

Mark Blankenship of Lubbock attorney for TxDOT and Bobby Williams, emphasized that "Bobby Williams did not start this accident. He did everything he could to avoid that bike...he was not able to avoid Megan's mistake. The bike pulled out in Bobby's path." Blankenshp also advised the jury that the law doesn't say that "children are never negligent. The judge has given you the law that says children can be negligent."

At the time of the TxDOT accident, Megan Adams was on summer visitation with her father and was riding her bicycle in his driveway when she decided to cross the road and was in collision with a 1997 Texas Department of Transportation pickup driven by Bobby Gene Williams, 58 of Matador.

Filed by Megan's parents, the suit is styled Joe Adams and Tammy Adams Emery, individually as "next of friends" of Megan Adams, a minor child, naming Texas Department of Transportation as defendant.

Pre-registration for these programs is very important in helping the District plan for the 2001-2002 school year. Parents are encouraged to pre-register their students.



"We are grateful that Mr. Doucette believes in us and for his investment in our children's future. "We also wrote for and received

a grant for operating costs for the

next three years. The revenue generated from services will be put back into the VIP Program." Ballou said others in the commu-

nity have also donated to the project. "People have been very cooperative," said Ballou. "The support has been marvelous. The City of Floydada has donated service work and other private individuals have donated service and equipment."

The VIP program would benefit now from donations of old cars or motors for residents to work on. All donations are tax deductible.

Ballou said the intent of VIP is to "teach job related skills to PAC residents so they can be successful in young adulthood."

The automotive services being offered to the community include large and small engine repair, including: car washes, oil changes, brake work, tire repair and replacement, wheel balancing, engine overhauls and replacements, and irrigation overhauls. Repair will also be offered on lawn and garden equipment as well as tractors.

'We also plan on offering classes to other kids," said Ballou. "We would like to develop an elective automobile mechanics class for the local school districts.

'We have also discussed developing classes to teach women preventive maintenance on vehicles, changing tires, checking oil, etc."

The automotive center is just one component of VIP. The Center is also working on an Industrial Arts Component (woodworking). "We hope to have a facility soon for this," said

"We feel like we've been successful with juveniles in our current system but there is a portion of the population of offenders that are in need of vocational skills. After going through the vocational program we feel like the kids that graduate will be better prepared for adult living and less likely to re-offend. With this new addition to the staff I feel this makes us one of the finest small departments in the state."

County Agent's Report

PECAN NUT CASEBEARER

The pecan crop last year was poor over much of the Rolling Plains. This was due in part to the hot, dry conditions that prevailed during much of the spring and summer. Since pecans are alternate bearing, especially when the trees are older, this could be a good pecan year. However, the spring and summer rains will be needed and now much of the area is in need of a good rain. Trees should be inspected to determine the probability of producing an economical crop and to determine if pecan nut casebearer control is needed. The catkins or male blooms are very apparent on many trees and the female blooms or small nutlets have been or soon will be set on the end of new growth.

The pecan nut casebearer and the pecan weevil are the two pest that cause most of the damage to the developing pecan crop. Pecan nut casebearers are most damaging during the first generation which occurs from late May through June. Pecan weevil adults do not emerge from the soil until mid-August or later and often are delayed because they emerge after a rain or when the orchard is irrigated. The eggs of pecan weevils that develop in the pecans as larvae, are deposited in pecans from the pe-can gel stage until the shell is too hard for the weevils to gnaw through. The time to control the pecan nut

casebearer is usually from May 25 to

Producers should begin inspect-

ing for pecan nut casebearer eggs by May 10 in Parker County and by May 15 of 20 further north and west. Eggs are flattened and are placed in the

dark tip of the nutlets or just under bracts near the end. The egg will be white to green when newly deposited, but as they near hatch will have red spot. When eggs are found, tie a bright colored ribbon on the limb so the eggs can be inspected daily. When the first small casebearer larva, which will be about 1/16 inch long, begin tunneling into the small nutlets it is time to apply an insecti-

cide labeled for pecan nut casebearer control. Research has shown that two infested pecan clusters of 310 inspected clusters will result in the loss of about 5 percent of the pecans and this is enough to justify control mea-

Each year County Extension

Agents work with producers in determining when to apply control measures for the pecan nut casebearer. However, by inspecting and applying control measures when the larvae begin to damage the crop, the amount of insecticide needed can be reduced. One or two well timed application depending on the duration of nutlet entry period, will often result in effective pecan nut casebearer control. A second generation will occur about 6 weeks after the first generation. The second generation usually does not cause excessive damage to the pecan crop.

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


