## Dale Dixon is Killed in Accident

**IN A GRINDING crash of two pickups, two miles south of Turkey yesterday afternoon, Dale Dixon, 23, was killed and Mrs. H. R. (Skeet) Jameson, was seriously injured.**

### HOMECOMING EXES ARRIVING

An effigy will be thrown on the fire during the rally. Townspeople are invited to join the students in the demonstration.

Matador Exes, arriving for Homecoming, will be greeted by an unusual sight in the front corridor of the high school. Standing before the trophy case is a bier supporting a coffin in which reposes a "Bobcat." Caption above reads, "Bury Rule." Signs and art work welcoming the Exes and boosting the Matadors have been painted by the senior class, on store windows in the business area of town.

### Sparse Crowd Observes V-Day

Local observance of Veteran's Day was marked by the attendance of a sparse crowd who gathered to pay tribute to veterans of all wars, with a program Saturday night at the American Legion building.

"Freedom is not free... it costs," the group was told by Post Commander Edgar Lee in introducing the speaker, Glenn Sanders, following the invocation by J. R. Whitworth and Pledge to the Flag led by W. C. Pfallmeyer, who also gave a brief resume of the history and significance of the pledge.

Superintendent of Roaring Springs Schools the past three years, Mr. Sanders is a navy veteran of the Korean war.

"There is no such thing as a 'typical' veteran," Mr. Sanders declared as he spoke on the subject, "What is a Veteran."

He pointed out that since men from all walks of life had served in every war, a veteran can't be "typed."

Addressing his remarks to veterans in the audience, he declared, "Because of your willingness to risk life for principles and ideals during wars, and your service to the nation in peace."

"OPPORTUNITY IS MORE of what you are, than where you are," O. R. Stark, President of the First National Bank of Quitaque, told an audience of Motley County 4-H Club members, their parents, sponsors and invited guests, at the American Legion Building Monday night.

He was the principal speaker at the annual Motley County 4-H Awards Banquet, and was introduced by Miss Jeanette Day, President of the Motley County 4-H Clubs, who served as Master of Ceremonies, following the supper of barbecued beef, potato salad and red beans, topped off by Foremost ice cream.

"I am honored to be on the Motley County 4-H program," Mr. Stark said, "and it is an inspiring sight to see the wholesome young people. It is wonderful to know that they will be our leaders in a few years."

"It is a contrast to the large cities where parents are meeting in an effort to stem the madness in their children... where they seek to divert their turning into hippies, drop-outs, users of LSD and marihuana."

"Here is the true symbol of American youth," Mr. Stark said, "I want to admonish you young people to look first for opportunity on your own door step, because opportunities are everywhere. It is a fact that 67% of the millionaires in America came from farms and rural areas."

"There is plenty of opportunity for anyone willing to work and there is always someone willing to pay someone who is willing to work. Farming is the greatest industry in the world and I ask you to have faith in its future. The size of the town in which you live is not important, but the size of your heart and the size of your vision is important. Opportunities are here."

### Amendment Vote Light in County

VOTING was light in Motley County Saturday, on the six proposed State Amendments. With a probable 1000 to 1100 qualified voters, only 175 voted in the five boxes.

Interest in the election, however, was higher than the state average. Reports indicate that all six amendments were approved by Texas voters, with some question on No. 1.

Official canvass of the ballots show county approval of three amendments, No. 2, No. 3 and No. 6 and a tie of No. 4.

Matador polled 98 votes, Whiteflat 15, Flomot 19, Roaring Springs 31 and Northfield 12.

Totals: No. 1, 76 for and 93 against; No. 2, 100 for and 70 against; No. 3, 105 for and 66 against; No. 4, 85 for and 85 against; No. 5, 76 for and 94 against; and No. 6, 91 for and 78 against.

### Drive Launched For Chest Funds

A DRIVE for funds in support of the Matador Community Chest was officially launched yesterday, however a pre-drive campaign was started early last week in Matador business and professional places.

President Forrest Campbell said a total of \$515 had been received in cash and pledges. The goal of the 1967 drive is \$3000.

In addition to the local needy cases, the Chest supports Boy Scouts, Baseball League, Teen Center, USO, Salvation Army, Red Cross and transient welfare cases.

The Community Chest is sponsored by the Matador Lions Club. Every request for funds is carefully screened by a committee which serves without pay.

### Former Resident Retired in June As Administrator of SMU Records

A former Matador resident and member of the Ex-Students Association, Mae Sandlin Fee (Mrs. Z. R. Fee) retired in June as administrator of Records and Diplomas at Southern Methodist University, Dallas after 43 years of service. Her father, P. A. Sandlin, who also resides in Dallas, was Matador's first city marshal.

**Retired, But Will Return**  
Many of SMU's top administrators—as well as some 32,000 other SMU graduates—owe their diplomas to one energetic, grey-haired woman.

Mrs. Mae Sandlin Fee, who retired from SMU in June after 43 years of service, spent nearly all of those years behind the scenes at the University's annual commencement exercises.

Responsible for everything connected with the important certificates, the retired administrator of Records and Diplomas each year saw to it that the prop-

erly named and signed certificates were in their designated place before each ceremony. Adding her inimitable personal touch and cheerfulness Mrs. Fee enjoyed clipping articles honoring senior students and slipping these into the diploma case as a surprise for the graduate.

Early each year, she began corresponding with the degree candidates, ordering the certificates and then running the gauntlet of obtaining the proper signatures on each diploma, which throughout her career at the University has amounted to tens of thousands of signatures.

And some of those who are now doing the signing had their own diplomas signed years ago by other SMU officials—also through Mrs. Fee's efforts. President Willis Tate, whose name now appears on every graduate's diploma was one senior for whom Mrs. Fee ordered a diploma, as were vice presidents Neill McFarland and Richard Rubottom.

Without her, the diplomas of Deans Claude Albritton, Charles Galvin, Joseph Harris, Board of Directors member Gerald Mann and Secretary of the University Phoebe Davis might not have reached commencement exercises.

Mrs. Fee, who ordered diplomas for her husband and son, regrets that she won't have the opportunity to do so for her grandchildren and nieces and nephews. But she may still have the chance.

At the urging of Don Renner, SMU registrar, Mrs. Fee plans to do some seasonal work at SMU—on diplomas.
