Duck Stamp To Feature Mergansers

The design of two hooded mergansers sitting on a log near a swamp was chosen today for the 1968-69 Federal Duck Stamp. C. G. Pritchard of Lincoln, Neb., created the winning entry, a black and white wash drawing.

The Interior Department's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife amounced the selection of Pritchard's design from 184 entries received in the 19th Federal Duck Stamp Design Contest. 
