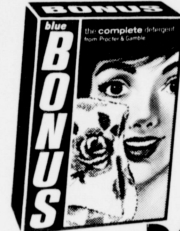

The House and Senate has voted to provide Secret Service protection for Mrs. John F. Kennedy for another 15 months at a cost of about \$210,000. Protection would have ended November 23rd, without an extension signed by the President.

Duck Stamp To Feature Mergansers

The design of two hooded mergansers sitting on a log near a swamp was chosen today for the 1968-69 Federal Duck Stamp. C. G. Pritchard of Lincoln, Neb., created the winning entry, a black and white wash drawing.

The Interior Department's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife announced the selection of Pritchard's design from 184 entries received in the 19th Federal Duck Stamp Design Contest. Selection was based on anatomical accuracy, artistic composition, and suitability for engraving.

Pritchard, 57, has been a staff artist for the Nebraska Game, Forestation and Park Commission for 19 years. He never before has won the duck stamp contest, although he finished second in 1952 and 1956.

Second place was a tie between Edward Bierly of Lorton, Va., and Arthur M. Cook of Bloomington, Minn. Bierly, a two-time winner who works for the National Park Service, entered a drawing of Ross' Geese. Cook, a professional artist, drew Emperor Geese.

Judges were Jim Trefethen, Wildlife Management Institute; Carl Scheele, curator of philately and postal history, Smithsonian Institution; Reuben K. Barrick, Bureau of Engraving and Printing; and Fred Evenden, executive secretary, The Wildlife Society.

A new duck stamp is issued each year by the Post Office Department. The 1968-69 stamp will go on sale July 1, 1968, and will be valid through June 1969. Every migratory waterfowl hunter 16 years of age or older must purchase this \$5 stamp with a State Hunting license.

All revenue from duck stamps, except the cost of printing and distribution, is used for acquisition of wetlands for waterfowl. More than one and one half million stamps were sold last year.

Artists from 34 states and the District of Columbia competed in this year's contest. Minnesota had 20 entries from 12 artists. Pennsylvania and New York were second with 14 entries.

Leslie C. Kouba of Minneapolis designed the current stamp which features Old Squaw ducks. Information on other designs since the stamps were first issued in 1934 is contained in "Duck Stamp Data," a publication available for 25 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402.

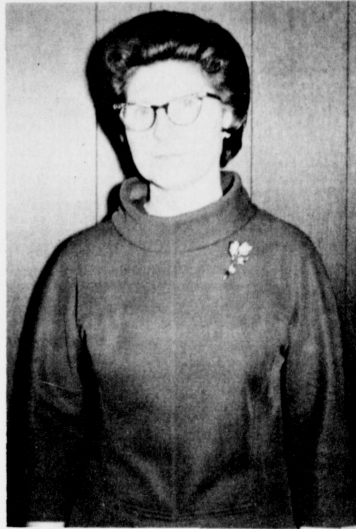

Veterans Q's and A's

Q -- I suffered a disability while I have been in the Army. Does this mean I'll have to pay higher insurance rates when I get out of service next month?

A -- No. To begin with, servicemen are covered by their Servicemen's Group Life Insurance for 120 days after discharge at no cost to them. During that period you may secure insurance from any of some 500 private commercial insurance companies at regular rates, regardless of any disabilities incurred in the service.

Q -- I draw a pension as widow of a veteran. With a recent check was a folder which reported a new benefit, the supplying of medicine by the VA. May I get medicine from the VA?

A -- No. The present law authorizes the VA to furnish medicine only to certain types of veterans.

Q -- I am a veteran of Viet-Nam era service, I have a private pilot's license and want to train to become a commercial pilot. May I get training assistance under the G.I. Bill?

A -- Yes. Since October 1 the VA will pay for 90 percent of the cost of your pilot training if you are otherwise eligible. One month of your G. I. education eligibility will be cancelled for each \$130 the VA pays for your training. You have earned one month of eligibility for each month of service. 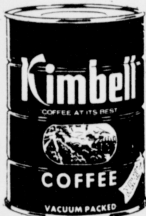

by county officers; nine by city officers and seven by the Highway Patrol.

Sixteen were jailed for other traffic violations including three by county and five by city officers while eight of the number were jailed by the Highway Patrol.

Three violations had 13 of offenders under each category. They were aggravated assault disturbance and felony theft. Ten were arrested by the Sheriff's office for aggravated assault; three were lodged in jail by city officers. Twenty of the thirteen were arrested by the Sheriff's office for disturbance and one by the city. All 13 of those persons on felon theft charges were arrested by the Sheriff's office.

Arrests for misdemeanor thefts total nine for the year seven of which were made by the Sheriff's office and two by the city police.

All three departments had 11 in apprehending a total of eleven for driving without license; three by the Sheriff's office, two by city police and six by the Texas Highway Patrol.

Eight persons were arrested for breaking and entering; six by the Sheriff's office and two by police department.

In other arrests, the Sheriff's department placed seven in jail for revocation of probation; six for contributing to the delinquency of a minor; four for auto theft; six for forgery; four for gambling and two for sodomy.

One person each was placed in jail during the year for the following charges: driving under the influence of drugs, rape, adultery, revocation of parole, contempt of child, desertion, contempt of court, removal of mortgaged property and juvenile revocation of probation.

A total of four were jailed for fighting; two by the county and two by city police. Four were also arrested for carrying a prohibited weapon; one by the county, two by city officers and one by the Texas Highway Patrol. Two were placed in jail due to mental illness; one each by city and county.

Six persons were arrested for driving while license were suspended; three by the city police department and three by Texas Highway Patrol.

A number of others were jailed here during the year and held for other counties on various charges.

1968, the net amount of the tax will be due. She also said her office has been busy all week as people are coming in to receive a discount before the first of January.

On February 1, a penalty will be charged on all unpaid taxes at that time.

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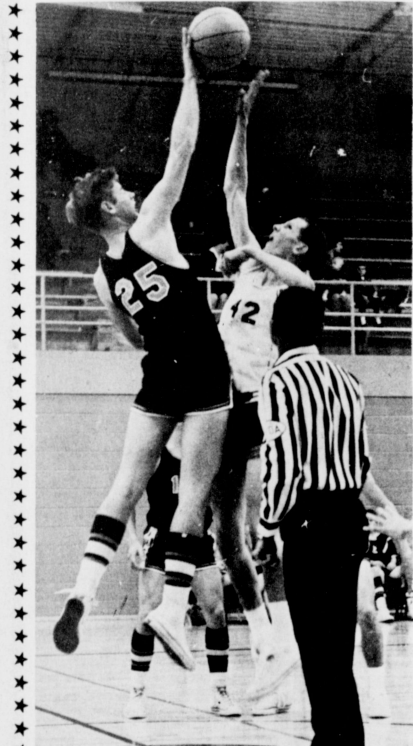

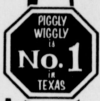

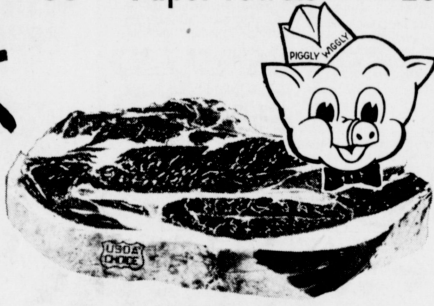
