### County Agent's Comments

### by Rocky Vinson WATCH FOR BOLLWORMS

With the recent rains, cotton in the area is growing rapidly and fruiting. This has caused increased insect activity.

nas caused increased insect activity.

I have received reports that bollworms have occured in damaging numbers in some fields, so scouting your fields is definitely a good idea. When checking fields, you should walk the field out. If you don't have time to do this you should at least check several spots on the field. If you find 8,000 or more treatable worms per acre treatment is probably justified.

A transpla worm is 10" or less; in length

A treatable worm is 1/2" or less in length.
Aphids are being found in some fields.
Aphids control should be considered if you find an average of 25 or more per

Pyrethroids are the insecticides of choice when treating for bollworms. Organophosphates should be used to treat aphids. If both bollworms and aphids need treatment, a mixture of a pyrethroid and an organophosphate insecticide should be used.

**NEW EDUCATION BILL TO** HAVE A SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ON MOTLEY COUNTY SCHOOLS

The recently passed education reform bill, Senate Bill 1, is having a dramatic impact on local school districts. The bill is an attempt to equalize funding in school districts throughout the state in hopes that this will lead to more equalized educa-tional opportunities for all students throughout Texas.

Senate Bill 1 is the result of six legis lative special sessions and is an effort to appease the property poor school dis-tricts in Texas who have consolidated tricts in Texas who have consolidated their efforts into a group known as the Equity Center. This group, led by the Edgewood I.S.D., San Antonio, filed suit against the Texas Education Agency (Edgewood vs. Kirby). The Texas Supreme Court upheld the complainants and decreed that there was a significant difference in the monies available to the local districts to fund equal education for local districts to fund equal education for all students throughout the state. As a result of Senate Bill 1, local

school districts are being forced to in-

garnish all of its share of state funding. To encourage the local district to raise its taxes to that level, the state is using two ploys: (1) To match local monies raised through increased taxes (if local taxes are raised enough to generate an additional \$43,000 over last years levy, the district will receive an additional \$34,689 in guaranteed yield from the state) and (2) To penalize local districts that do not raise taxes to the state's effective rate by significantly reducting their state fund-ing over the next four years.

According to Dr. John Walker, a school finance expert and consultant to the Texas Association of School Boards,..."the state has placed local school districts in the same predicament we have all found ourselves in when we share a soda with a friend. If they have not re-applied by the end of those ten school days, then the Free/Reduced benefits will be terminated and they must pay full price for their meal tickets. (Free/Reduced Applications will be given to each student at the time they register. Applications may also be picked up in the office. The meal tickets will be sold every moming from 8:00 - 8:30 in the Gym. Lunch, Breakfast and Extra Milk will all require tickets. Mrs. Woolsew, will keep the real tickets. Mrs. Woolsey will keep the meal tickets in a file to prevent loss or theft of the tickets. Students will not be allowed to eat on another students ticket. Guest must make reservations by 9:00 a.m. to eat lunch with us in the cafeteria. If you have any questions please feel free to call the office (347-2677). PRICES SLIGHTLY LOWER ON BACK-TO-SCHOOL CLOTHES

Although sharp increases in the cost of clothing were seen this spring, parents may find back-to-school prices slightly

Prices were up this year on clothing Prices were up this year on clothing for women by 5 percent and toddlers and infants by as much as 10.3 percent. But overall, prices have dropped within a year by 1.7 percent for boys and 1.5 percent for girls.

Since clothing prices for boys and girls have dropped, bargains may be easier to find. However, style is costly and very important to young people who like to dress similar to their peers.

To get the most for your money when

To get the most for your money when shopping for clothes, follow these tips:

\* Make a list of specific items needed before you go shopping. Also, include the quantity of items needed.

\* Take your child shopping with you.

Before you go, prepare him or her for what you are looking for, and shop only for the child since children get tired eas-

\* Consider the child's growth patterns. Don't buy more than what is needed.

Children grow rapidly and may outgrow what you buy before the school is over.

\* Consider purchasing two or three outfits that can be mixed and matched for

outrits that can be mixed and matched for a more useful wardrobe.

\* Consider the special activities your child will be involved in. If special clothing will be needed for each activity, consider these as a share of the clothing budget. Decide if parts of these garments

reservateseavere could be worn with regular school clothing as a wardrobe extender. Less expensive tops such as brightly-colored t-shirts can

add variety to a wardrobe.

\* Choose styles and fabrics that will grow with the child. Ragland sleeves, cuffs on pants, adjustable straps and waistbands, large hems in dresses and tops are features that can add to the wearlife of a garment.

\*Also, consider the care factors. Knits, especially cotton or cotton/polyester, are easy to care for and stretch for comfort.
