Rowland family profile.....

The Rowland family have come to make their home in Matador, as Thomas "Tom" Rowland takes the administrative position of Superintendent of Motley County School System.

Mr. Rowland stated in a recent interview, "I really want Motley County to be proud of all the programs in the school and of the good job by the faculty and administration."

Rowland was born in Lexington, Texas, but lived most of his youth in Bay City, where he received his high school diploma in 1963 from Bay City High School. His education was as follows: Superintendent Certification from University of Houston, Victoria Campus, 1988; Master of Education with Mid-Management Certification received from Pan American University, Edinburg, 1976; Bachelor of Science with Teacher Certification in Social Studies from Stephen F. Austin University, 1973. Other colleges and universities attended are Wharton County Junior College, University of Guam and the University of Houston.

His professional experience since 1983 is as follows:

1985-Present: Columbus Independent School District. Originally the principal at Columbus Junior High School (approximately 200 students); but, because of expertise in dealing with personnel, was transferred to Columbus Elementary School (approximately 900 students) in 1987 to bring stability to the school and move Columbus Elementary School toward the effective school concept.

Responsibilities include all administrative, curriculum, personnel, budget, and maintenance duties necessary to successfully run a school with sixty percent of the district's personnel and students. While at Columbus Elementary School he implemented several new programs (i.e., a remedial reading lab, a transitional first grade, an all day chapter kindergarten program, a restructuring of all chapter programs, development of G/T identification matrix for grades one through six and implementation of G/T program throughout school) and led the elementary team through an extremely successful monitoring visit from TEA.

1983-1985: Victoria, Texas. Superintendent-Headmaster of The Parish School, Trinity Episcopal Church. The first non-Priest head of the school, he was able to increase the enrollment to 178 students, balance the school's budget, move the teachers to a state base pay schedule, and redesign the curriculum of the school. His responsibilities included all administrative duties necessary to maintain the day to day running of the school while involving himself with the Board of Trustees in planning the school's future.

Rowland married Judy K. Humphries, also of Bay City in 1967. Judy will be working in the Motley County School system as part-time Counselor, Librarian and will teach 7th grade Texas History. Judy is looking forward to meeting the parents, teachers and local citizens as well as working with all the students.

Motley County School Registration Times Set

Registration for the Motley County Kindergarten class of 1990-91 has been scheduled for Friday, August 24, from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. To register your student, we will need their Birth Certificate, Social Security Number and current Immunization Records. Students must have a TD booster after their fourth birthday and an MMR shot after their first birthday to be in compliance with state immunization laws to begin school. The Texas Department of Health is at the Courthouse on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. You may obtain these shots there or at the Motley County Clinic by appointment. If you choose not to use these facilities, see your family doctor for an update on your children's shot.

There is one new Immunization law to be effective the first day of January,

1991. A Measles booster is required for students whose 12th birthday occurs on or after September 1, 1990. Please keep

this in mind and make arrangements for this booster if you have a child who will need this.

It is very IMPORTANT, due to some curriculum and schedule changes, that each High School Student come to register at their appointed time. Mr. Van Hoose needs to visit with you as a class, and as an individual. All high school classes will register on Thursday, August 23. All Seniors report to the Cafeteria at 1:00 p.m.; Juniors, report at 2:15; Sophomores, report at 3:30; Freshmen, report at 4:15. Remember, be here if at all possible.

Junior High Students will have a set schedule and will register the first day of school.

School Board Meeting Report

The Motley County ISD Board of Trustees met Wednesday, August 8 at 8:00 p.m. with all Board members present. Also attending the meeting were Superintendent Tom Rowland and Dick Van Hoose, Principal. After the minutes were read and approved, bids were opened and accepted on Bread, Mrs. Bairds; Milk, Borden's; Diesel and Gasoline, Davis Fuel; Propane, no bid. Prices for lunchroom were set. Due to a \$17,610.87 loss in the cafeteria budget during the 89-90 school year lunch tickets will be sold in advance. The loss occurred from cutbacks of state funding, cutback on commodities and

charges not collected.

Betty Stevens, PEIMS Coordinator, explained proposals for student insurance. The Board elected to keep insurance on all UIL participants (this is state required) and also offer the school day or 24 hour insurance to be purchased by parents for a secondary insurance policy. The Board adopted the 1988-90 annual Performance Report.

Matador City Council Meeting Report

The Matador City Council met with all Council members present. Minutes and bills were accepted.

After explanation and discussion, Council elected to leave the tax rate the same as last year (57.9).

The landfill problems were discussed. Digging has begun for a new pit. Due to all the re-roofing, the original pit will probably last only 2 more months. Nell Berryman, City Secretary, reported that approximately \$600 has been collected to help bear the cost of digging a new pit.

Mayor Gary Lancaster reported that in order to take care of the unsightly vacant buildings and houses, attorney Tom Hamilton said they need to get photographs and list all the property and owners, send letters requesting clean up and

then if no response is received, the city can take action.

Bob Davis, representing the Motley County Hospital Board, asked the city if they would accept the old shingles to be taken off the Clinic building. They are rated a non-rated hazardous asbestos material.

The Roaring Springs Ranch Club called to ask if they could haul their bagged trash to the Matador landfill. After discussion, Council stated until they know what is going to happen to the landfill, they won't take on any more trash.

Council elected to hire a part-time employee for mowing and for a landfill attendant.

Council went into closed session.

Commissioner's Court Meeting Report

The Motley County Commissioner's Court met Monday, August 13 with all Commissioners attending. Also attending were Boyce Hart, J.N. Fletcher and Butch Hughes.

Before the Court was called to order, they met in closed session with District Judge, David Cave.

The meeting was opened with Bill Dean Washington giving the invocation. The minutes were read by Lucretia Campbell, County Clerk, and approved after two corrections.

Rodney Williams, representative of the Fire Department came in to clear up a misunderstanding between he and the Court.

The bills were read for the outstanding expenditures: General, \$6,119.02; Precinct 1, \$1,148.00; Precinct 2, \$748.49; Precinct 3, \$606.81; Precinct 3, \$459.78. The Court reviewed the reports: Library, County Agent, Home Economist, Treasurer, and the J.P. collection of \$8,532.00.

J. Russell read a letter from Sharon Pigg, Special Prosecutor, suggesting how

the Court can change their calendar year to meet their fiscal year, by voting to begin October 1 and end it on September 30.

The motion was made and passed to do this.

Russell stated that due to the recent controversy over the election of the Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1 and 4, and those being the only J.P.'s for the entire county, but that the entire county was not able to vote, the Court could start proceedings to consolidate the Precincts and elect one county wide J.P. in the next election for 1994. This process has to be voted on by the Court and then sent to Austin to be approved, which could possibly take up to two years to pass. This motion passed.

Betty Luckett, Chief Tax Appraiser and J. Russell, President of Tax Appraisal Board explained the tax rate criteria. The court will meet August 20 for the budget study and set the tax rate hearing at that time.

Meeting adjourned.



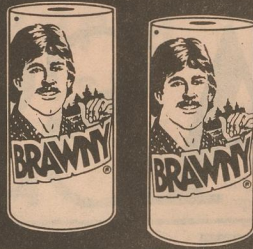

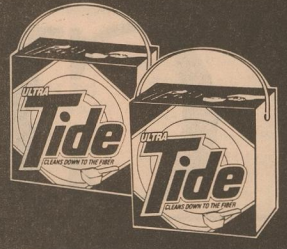
