HISTORICAL Pageant of Pioneers which will be presented Friday and Saturday nights, at 8:15 at Burleson Field, is based on facts and legends honoring the Matador Ranch cowboys and early settlers.

Written by Mrs. L. M. Wingerd of Brownfield, the scenes will depict the time of Indians, buffalo hunters, cowboys and founding of the County seat and organization of the county on Feb. 5, 1891.

Events will be brought down to the present with the crowning of the Anniversary Queen.

In the scene of early cowboys, the parts will be portrayed by men still living in this area, who once worked for the Matadors.

Both Mrs. Wingerd and her daughter, Mrs. Glenn Woodruff, who directs the pageant, did extensive research of records and newspapers for data concerning early pioneer days.

Several humorous incidents in the pageant are taken from actual facts which have become almost legends, concerning such personalities as George Klutz.

Such humorous sidelights add to, rather than detract from the entertainment, as they are not intended as satirical.

As scenes from a later era—the 1930's for example, are enacted, the lights from Bob's Oil Well shining at the highway intersection form a fitting background and will be a silent reminder of the man who once served his community with a stalwart belief in its ability to survive the depression, as "Bob Robertson" appears to direct the "Shannon Davidson Day" celebration.

The mural type background depicting a scene in the "Foothill Country" northwest of Matador, was designed by Mrs. Benie Keltz. Final dress rehearsal is scheduled for 8 o'clock tonight and the first performance will be at 8:15 Friday night. The same performance will be presented Saturday night.

The historical tours will start the celebration at 10 a.m. Friday and will include the Matador Ranch headquarters, the Medallion Traweck home and the old jail. The parade will start at 2 p.m.

Tribune Reporter Close To Tragedy

Tribune reporter Karen Elliott was close to tragedy Monday morning while making plans for enrolling in the University of Texas. She was in the 27-story tower only two hours before the insane ex-marine student began shooting to death 13 persons and wounding at least 30 more on the campus.

Accompanied by her father, Ted Elliott, they had parked their automobile within range of the sniper's fire. The University of Texas was swarming with hurrying students when they left at 11 o'clock. A short while later it was a bedlam of death and mutilation as the sniper, Charles J. Whitman, 24, blasted away with high-powered rifle shots at those below his 307-foot perch. After a terrifying 90 minutes, he was killed by a policeman.

Mr. Elliott and daughter Karen were about 15 miles west of Austin when they heard of the tragedy on a radio at the entrance of Longhorn Cavern, which they were about to enter.

Bryan Cammack Dies Suddenly

Services Are Held For Judge Nominee

A HEART ATTACK late Sunday claimed the life of Bryan Cammack, 55, Motley County Democratic nominee for the office of County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent, after he had been rushed to West Texas Hospital in Lubbock. He died about 9:45 p.m. Motley County and surrounding area was stunned by the news. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 in the first Methodist Church here, with Rev. John Fitzgerald, pastor and Rev. James Hancock, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Interment was in Matador East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Matador Lions Club Tuesday cancelled its regularly scheduled luncheon meeting in tribute to a deceased member.

Bryan Cammack was a native of Matador and won the Democratic nomination for County Judge with a decisive victory in May.

He was born May 12, 1911 and died July 31, 1966 at the age of 55 years, 2 months and 19 days. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

He is survived by his wife, the former Zona Ruth Scaff, to whom he was married in December, 1961; three sons, Capt. Billy Eugene Cammack of Spokane, Wash., Thomas Bryan Jr., and Charles Edgar, both of the home; three daughters, Shirley Cammack of Houston, Janet Cammack of Amarillo, and Linda Carol, of the home; four step-daughters, Mrs. J. R. Swim of Lubbock, and Mary, Jacqueline and Henrietta Martin, all of the home.

Other survivors are his mother, Mrs. T. E. Cammack of Matador, two sisters, Mrs. Grace McDowell of Plainview and Mrs. Jack Barton of Lubbock; and three grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Ward Rattan, Howard Edmondson, J. C. Cross, Buck Waybourn, Emmett Jenkins, Vance Gilbreath, Frank Montgomery and James Price.

Precinct Chairmen To Name Candidate

FIVE PRECINCT Democratic chairmen of Motley County will assume more than usual influence Monday when they meet to consider a name to place on the November general election ballot, in lieu of the late Bryan Cammack, who died late Sunday following a heart attack.

Texas Election Code requires this group to select a nominee. Members are: Roy Grundy, Matador, C. L. Marshall, Roaring Springs, Boyd Perkins, Whiteflat, Jerrel Nimmo, Northfield and Sam D. Ross, Flomot.

It is the first time in the history of Motley County that precinct chairmen have been required to select a candidate to be placed in the Democratic column of the general election ballot.

County Democratic Chairman Furman Vinson said that persons interested in the nomination should contact their precinct chairman. He said only one name can be placed on the ballot, and that it must be with the approval of the majority of the five chairmen.

To Name Congressman

The same process will apply in the selection of a nominee in the place of Congressman Walter Rogers who resigned from the race early this week, except that a special "convention" of the 31 Democratic county chairmen, will meet to select the nominee. Motley County will be represented by Furman Vinson.

The Congressional nominee will oppose Republican candidate Bob Price of Pampa who has actually never stopped running since his narrow defeat in 1964.

After the county chairmen have selected their candidate, his name is submitted to the State Democratic Executive Committee and the nomination will then be ratified at the state convention, September 20.

Mr. Patton, an early-day County Judge, Commissioner and County and District Clerk, passed away March 21, 1953. Three sons, Math, Truss Jr., and Paul, preceded their parents in death. Heirlooms Decorate Windows For County Anniversary Celebration

Matador took on a festive appearance this week when windows were decorated for the 75th Anniversary celebration with family heirlooms and old pictures, by the decorating committee, headed by Mrs. Ward Rattan.

An old thread case, a ribbon case, two dresses and a bonnet, four china dolls and an antique umbrella stand are on display in the Matador Variety.

Also in the store is a coverlet made by Mrs. D. C. Keith from silk handkerchiefs willed her in 1904 by Mrs. D. E. McDonald, Mittie McDonald, who came to McDonald's camp on the Matador Ranch from Ft. Worth in 1887 or '88, was a laundress and mother to the cowboys at the ranch before Christmas in 1889. The cowboys each purchased a bright handkerchief for "Mammie Mac", which she saved, embroidered his name on, and later willed to Mrs. Keith, the first bride in Motley County.

Featured in the Cowboy Boot and Shoe Shop are two boots made in 1912 and 1913 by Bill Hendrill. Other interesting items include a saddle made in 1900, a replica of a chuck wagon and an ox shoe.

On display in Thacker Hardware Co. window is an 1873 model Winchester rifle, found in a Q. A. and P. railroad shack, a Baptist hymnal dated 1887, a waffle iron, a shaving set and copies of the Roaring Springs Review, printed in 1922. The display is the work of the Roaring Springs committee.

Also in Thacker Hardware is an improvised parlor. A blue velvet settee and chair and another blue settee and chair featuring needle point are on either side of an old table, forming a typical scene in early Motley County.

The former Miss Ella Eugenia Cribbs and Daniel Crawford Kieth were united in marriage Dec. 23, 1891, at McDonald Camp home of Mrs. Mittie McDonald. Mrs. McDonald was affectionately known as "Mammie Mac" by the cowboys, because she mothered them.
