Members of the board later yesterday were attempting t contact US Representative George Mahon. A decision will be made by the board at the next regular meeting. Thursday, August 13

The problem is simple: Operating cost to keep the hospital open is amounting to approximately \$6,000 per month. Without patients because it does not have Medicare approval, there is no revenue. At present the facility is operating on next year's taxes. It can not continue to operate on a deficiency basis.

Members of the board believe that the log-jam created by Medicare, requiring 4.2 Registered Nurses, will be broken. Until the problem is solved, it is probable that the hospital will be closed.



After cleaning, the spray rig is ready for calibration. There are many ways to do this job, but the best is in the field with the same conditions the sprayer will be working under.

> One of the areas of potential for increased guar production is diverted acres, both mandatory and voluntary. Guar yields of 350 to 400 pounds per acre will offset payment for guar planted on acres voluntarily diverted from cotton. Guar may also offer possibilities for cotton acres which have been released after being destroyed by natural causes. For more details on these programs, visit the county ACS office.


