The Matador High School football captains for the 1970-71 season presented the district 3-B trophy to the school, Thursday, December 3. After the presentation of the trophy, Coach Stan Irvine revealed that at the annual coaches conference held December 2 for district 3-B, six Matador seniors and two juniors received recognition by being named to the coaches all-district team.

Richard Elliott was chosen for first team as defensive lineman

and honorable mention as offensive tackle. Robert Elliott was chosen unanimously to fill a spot as defensive linebacker.

Randy Cook was named offensive tackle and received honorable mention for defensive lineman. Lee Hurt was chosen to take a spot in the defensive secondary and also received honorable mention as an offensive running back.

Donnie Jackson was honored as one of the four offensive running backs chosen and Dale 'Maddog' Markham was chosen as a defensive lineman.

The two juniors selected for honorable mention were Stanley Nelms as a defensive lineman and Bill Barnhill as a quarterback and in the defensive secondary.

## Minister Pringle Is Legion Speaker

WORLD PEACE was the theme of a Pearl Harbor Day address by Woodrow Pringle, Minister of the Church of Christ, Monday night at the monthly meeting of Fleming Post American Legion, and the Legion Auxiliary.

The day had passed with little notice locally of the historic event which rocked the world on December 7, 1941. Minister Pringle brought present conditions into focus with his subject, "Lest We Forget."

"War destroys so many lives of men who might have become, doctors, lawyers, preachers and of other professions," he declared. "We should remember the widows who spend many lonely hours... those who returned home permanently injured."

"There can be no security in this world until enemies have been changed into friends; until hate is replaced with good will and brotherhood prevails. This can not be done by injuring men's bodies, but by changing the heart. It is the Lord's program, and it is our job to carry it out... if we will do our part, God can make even our enemies see the folly of war. Let us both pray and work for Peace."

Lance and Shannon Jameson, sons of Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Jameson, each gave a reading and sang a song, accompanied at the piano by their mother.

Commander J. M. Thacker introduced the program following the customary covered dish supper.

He announced that the annual banquet for Motley County high school seniors would be held on March 29, 1971, instead of on April 7, as first planned. Tentative arrangements have been made for Henry Hill of San Antonio, past State Commander of American Legion, to be the speaker for this event.

Time has passed and burned its bridges from the high point that overlooks the winding river. The Sunday, Dec. 13, opening will be at 1 o'clock, and during regular banking hours on Monday and Tuesday.

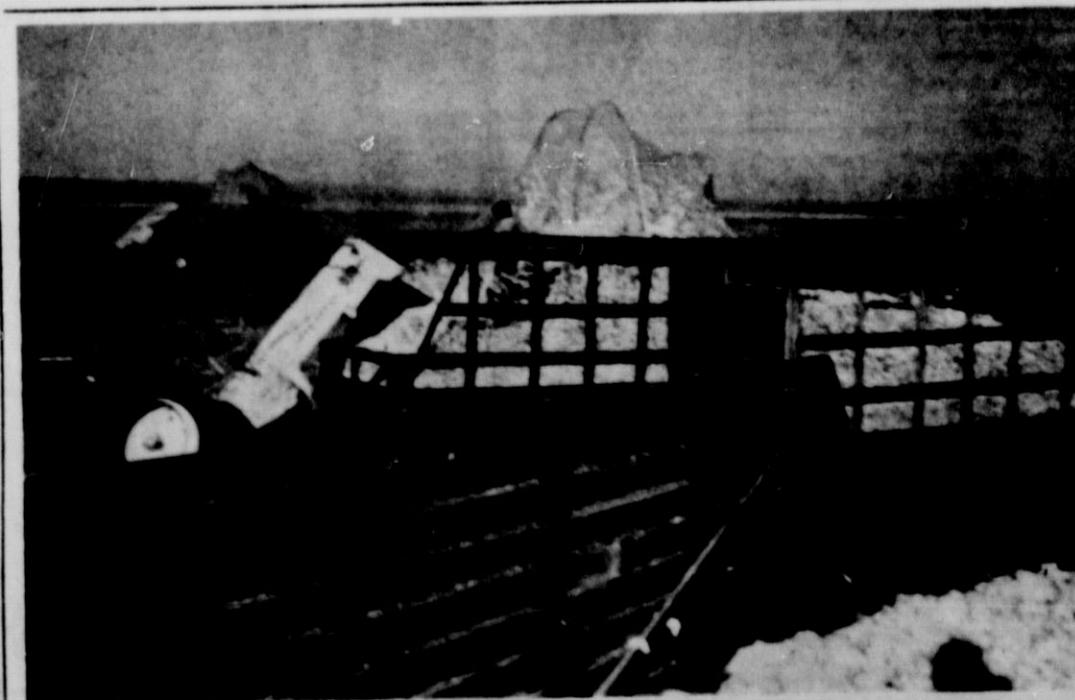
## Firemen Warn of Extra Dangers

### FRESH FRUITS ADD COLOR AND NUTRITION TO HOLIDAY MENU

What comes in colors of yellow, red, orange and can be found in many varying shapes and sizes? The answer is fresh fruits which gives us vitamins C in varying amounts. Serve fruits to your family during the holidays for they are bright in color, light in calories and right in nutrition says Judy Kitchens, County Home Demonstration Agent.

All fruits contain some vitamin C, but it is in varying amounts. Oranges, grapefruit, and straw-

berries are rich in Vitamin C.

Fruits can be used in many ways in the diet—as an appetizer, an accompaniment to the main dish, a salad, dessert or snack.

When buying fresh fruits: Watch seasonal supply and demand; the fruits in season are usually cheapest and best in quality and flavor.

Look for fruits that are designated "plentiful". The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service reports plentiful supplies of apples, oranges, grapefruits this year.

When possible, shop early in the day for best choices.

Inspect the fruit closely, but avoid excessive handling. Note the difference between defects that affect edibility, and those which merely mar the appearance.

Be certain containers are full and that fruit underneath is of the same quality as that seen on top.

Be wary of wet or leaky containers for they may indicate spoilage.

Now that you have bought the

best fresh fruits you want to take the best care of them. Many fresh fruits remain at their best for only a few days, while others, if stored properly, may keep for months.

Before storing the fruits, sort them and either use or discard damaged fruits immediately. Most fruits (except berries and cherries) should be washed and dried before storing.

Recipes containing fresh fruit: Apple Coffee Cake, Lemon and Orange Sponge and Pumpkin Bread.

### APPLE COFFEECAKE

1/2 cup light brown sugar  
2 tablespoons flour  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 to 2 teaspoons cinnamon, as desired  
1/4 cup shortening  
1/2 cup sugar, as desired  
1 egg  
1/2 cup milk  
1 1/2 cups unsifted flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 cups thinly sliced apples

Blend together the brown sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, butter and cinnamon. In another bowl combine sugar, shortening and egg. Beat thoroughly, then stir in the milk. Mix 1-1/2 cups flour, baking

powder, and salt thoroughly. Stir into egg mixture just until smooth.

Spread half the batter in a greased 9-inch square pan, cover with half the apples and top with half the brown sugar mixture. Repeat.

Bake at 375 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes, or until cake is set.

### LEMON AND ORANGE SPONGE

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin  
6 eggs, separated  
1/2 cup cold water  
1/2 cup fresh orange juice  
Fresh orange sections  
Fresh grape clusters  
1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind  
1/2 cup cold water  
1 cup sugar  
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
1/4 teaspoon salt

Soften gelatin in cold water. Set aside to use later. Beat egg yolks in the top part of a double-boiler. Gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar. Blend in water and lemon juice. Stir and cook over hot water (not boiling) until mixture coats a metal spoon. Remove from heat and add gelatin, orange juice, orange rind and lemon

He is a native of Truby, in Jones County, and attended high

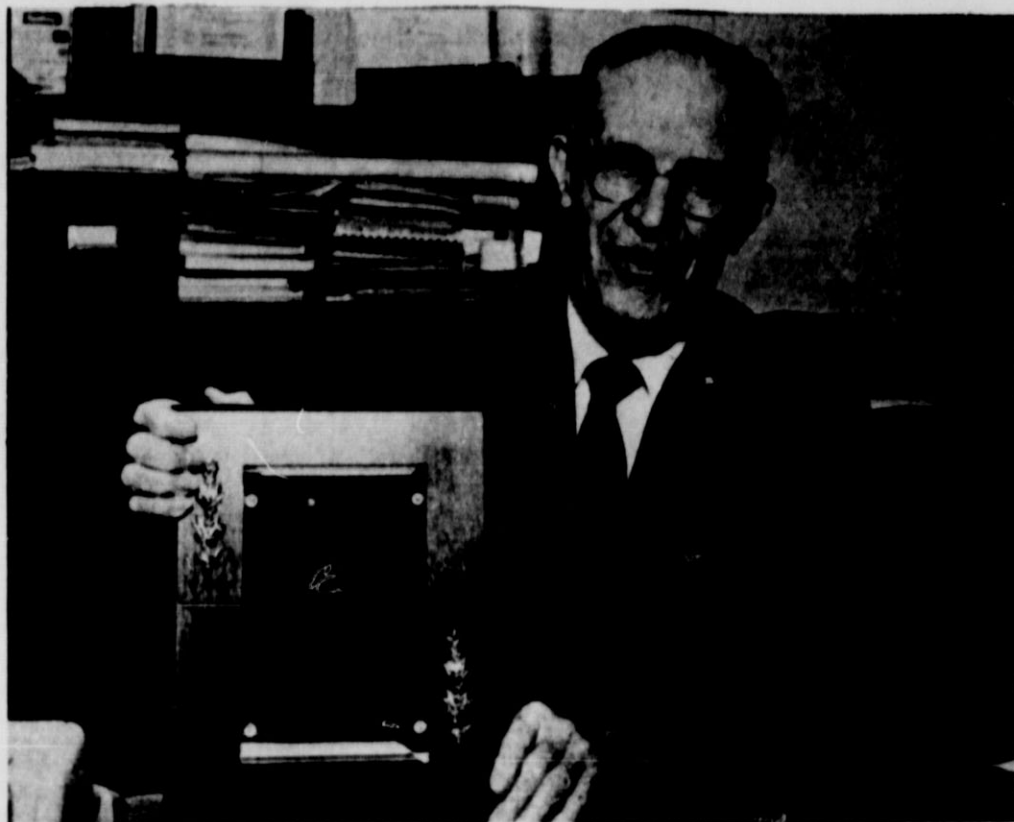

rink. Chill until the mixture begins to thicken.

Add salt to egg whites and beat until they stand in soft peaks. Gradually beat in the remaining ½ cup sugar. Fold into the orange mixture. Turn into an oiled 1½-quart mold. Chill until firm and ready to serve. Unmold and decorate with fresh orange sections and fresh grapes. Serve as dessert. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

### PUMPKIN BREAD

- 3½ cups flour
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 cup Wesson oil
- ½ cup water
- 1½ cup pumpkin
- 4 eggs
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon mace (optional)
- 2 teaspoon soda
- 1½ teaspoon salt

Blend oil, water and sugar. Add eggs one at a time beating well. Add pumpkin and mix well. Add sifted dry ingredients and mix well. Bake in greased - floured pan 1 hour. 350 degrees. Makes 2 loaves.

### Motley County in Planning Area for Crime Prevention

(Special to Tribune)  
Governor Preston Smith has approved a planning grant of \$19,845 to the South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock, for making law enforcement studies in the area and establishing a regional crime prevention program.

The grant was made on recommendation of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, which advises the Governor on administration of funds received from the U. S. Department of Justice under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968.

It was one of eight planning grants, totaling \$148,944, recommended by the Council at its regular monthly meeting. Also recommended were 11 action grants, totaling \$208,542.

Judge Joe Frazier Brown, executive director of the Criminal Justice Council, said the South Plains Association plans to make detailed studies of such areas as a teletype network, regional crime information center, feasi-

bility of a mobile crime laboratory, and probation services.

Local funds of \$2,205 will be added to the grant approved by Governor Smith.

Counties included in the South Plains State Planning Region served by SPAG include Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, King, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn and Garza.

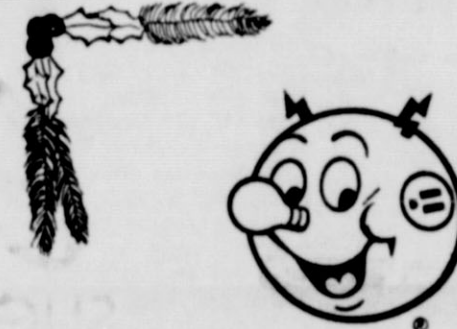

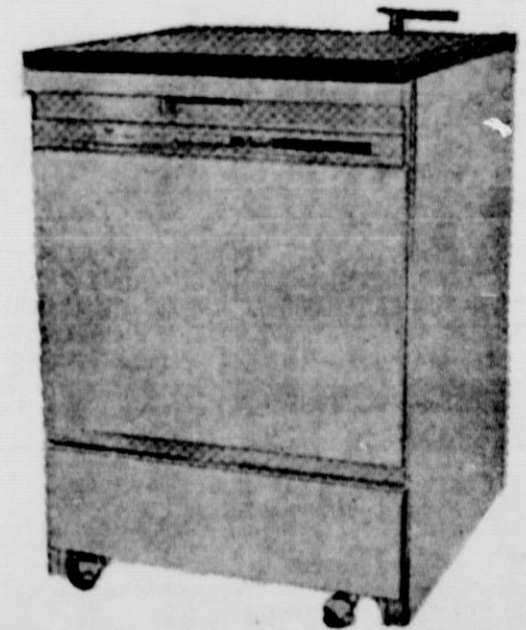

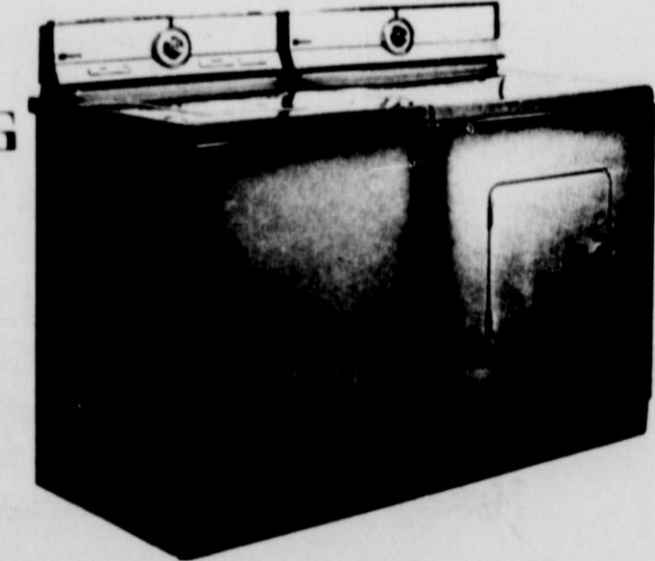

**Public schools' costs to climb by \$362 million**

(Texas Press Service)

Heads of the Texas Education Agency have set priority goals for public schools during the next two years. They estimate additional state and local costs at more than \$362 million.

HIGHEST priority must be assigned to implementing those ma-

for educational acts of the 1969 Legislature, says Dr. J. W. Edgar, commissioner of education.

He listed these acts as the 1969 salary compensation (long-range teacher pay raise) plan, a kindergarten program for five-year-olds, comprehensive special education programs, expansion of technical-vocational programs and refinement of the teacher retirement act. The programs are projected over a three to seven-year period.

As desirable as new or accelerated programs may be, says Edgar, the State Board of Education feels more experience is needed with the 1969 acts and more opportunity should be allowed to invest available resources in presently-authorized goals.

"NEXT priority," says the commissioner, "gives to carrying out recommendations of a committee studying changes in school finance formulas, with a view to equalizing funds assigned as the local share of foundation costs."

More than \$2 billion will be spent for public elementary and secondary education this year. Estimate for next year is \$2.6 billion.

About 2,728,000 pupils now are enrolled, and 2,760,000 will be in classes next year.

Cost of existing programs for next year alone will increase \$156 million, while new programs will require an estimated \$25 million more.

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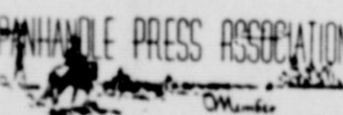
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result of a study on saccharin usage by a committee of the National Academy of Science and the National Research Council.

According to the committee reports, Miss Bell says, a safe level of about 12 to 18 quarter grain tablets per day may be used by adults. Actual usage is likely to fall far below the safety standard.

The use of saccharin overs an 80 year period. During World War I, heavy use of the sweetener in England and Germany has produced no adverse effects.

A recent cancer mortality study involving over 21,000 diabetics using saccharin showed no increased risk of cancer over a period of 28 years. The report showed.

Miss Bell said that the committee did recommend further investigation of specific items related to saccharin's long-term effects.
