Young Veteran Says Soldiers Use Narcotics

A YOUNG veteran, Terry Keltz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bennie Keltz, who has just returned from Vietnam, is seriously alarmed about the use of narcotics by men in uniform overseas. He has been in a position to observe the widespread use of drugs being first attached to Military Police, and later going into plain clothes as a member of CID.

The young veteran was principal speaker Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club. He showed some slides made on the scene in association with his work.

"Approximately 80% of the men in uniform use marijuana, and frequently develop to other forms of habit forming drugs," he said. "Often the more potent drugs are fatal and 90% pure as compared with drugs in this country which are only 20% pure... drugs are the main problem and cause most of the crimes... drugs are available everywhere on the streets, in the bars and other places."

Young Keltz believes the United States forces are accomplishing their purpose and withdrawing according to schedule. The great problem is the use of drugs by servicemen, and the desire for them that they will bring home when they are returned.

Neighbors Gather Cotton Crop

NEIGHBORS and friends of Whiteflat farmer Alfred Cooper decided last week that his cotton crop should be harvested. They pooled their efforts and equipment and went into his fields.

Mr. Cooper became seriously ill and underwent major surgery in January. He had been unable to return to his fields. He employed a farm hand until the crop was "laid by." The hand quit and went to California.

A total of 14 mechanical harvesting machines gathered Monday at the two farms. Six arrived at the Cooper home place and eight at the rented farm in the east area of the Whiteflat community. There was some dew early Monday but later a sandstorm developed, which made harvesting difficult. Men not operating the harvesting machines, were on hand with cotton trailers and other equipment needed to get the crop to the gin.

J. B. Cooper of Cooper Butane Co., Matador learned of the work and drove a tank truck to the fields where he furnished free fuel for the equipment.

Before night a total of 34 bales had been harvested and hauled to West Texas Gin.

Miss Spindelreier, who speaks excellent English, was house guest for the Thanksgiving holidays, of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Traweck. She is a good friend of the Traweck's daughter, Nancy, a second year medical student at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston. The two girls drove here for the visit.

Daughter of Herrn and Frau Alfred Spindelreier, the young woman was a translator and interpreter of English and French for the Bayer aspirin company in Genuany before coming to this country last May.

In Galveston she is an editorial multi-lingual secretary for a German professor and Dr. Fred Unterharnscheidt. She is in this country to study English and to gain experience in the American way of life.

"I would like to say to the Americans that I am enjoying my stay here," the young woman declared, "and I have found the people very friendly."

MATADOR LOSES ROUND IN BI-DISTRICT BATTLE

The Sundown Roughnecks dug into their bag of tricks Thursday in Hale Center to defeat the Matador Matadors 40-14. Matador bidding for the bi-district title, dropped out of the race and Sundown will meet Rule in the Class B regional finals this week. Despite the point difference, the Matadors made a show of it and at times could almost see the Roughnecks' heels.

The Roughnecks held the Matadors scoreless in the first half while scoring 26 points themselves with senior quarterback Edwards making 3 of the touchdowns.

The Matador Matadors hustled back with determination in the second half and center Bobby Simpson stopped the Roughnecks' kickoff in mid-field. Four plays later, quarterback Bill Barnhill ran 45 slashing yards with the Roughnecks in hot pursuit to light up the Matadors' side of the scoreboard. Halfback Lee Hurt bolted through for the two conversion points. The Matadors' defense seeing Edwards' speed, strength and size the first half started limiting his ground yardage and end Randy Cook threw him for a loss of yardage so he went to the air and passed to Waldrop for six more Sundown points. "Maddog" Markham fell on a Roughneck fumble.

Fourth stanza and Barnhill guided the Matadors on a 55 yard attack and halfback Robert Elliott snared the Quartermaster's scoring pass to end the assault. Halfback Donnie Jackson had control of the loose Roughneck pigskin when the whistle blew to end the game.

The Sundown backfield had the most deceptive and the smoothest movements of any team the Matadors have played this year. The Roughnecks would exchange the ball in the backfield when moving at top speed.

Sundown had 15 first downs to the Matadors' 9 and gained 319 yards rushing to Matadors' 202 with Matadors' Barnhill chalking up 93 of the yards.

The Matador Matadors ended the football season with a 7-4 record and the district 3B championship.

MAILING 'GOODIE' PACKAGES REQUIRES SPECIAL ATTENTION

Surprise packages from home, filled with cookies, candies and other lip-smacking delights, will arrive fresh and tasty if mailed with special care, says Judy Kitchens, County Home Demonstration Agent-at-Large.

The first step in sending food packages is choosing recipes that stay fresh for a relatively long time. If cookies are too rich, they will probably crumble or turn rancid. Moist sheet cookies cut into bars, and flat, moist individual cookies are the best travel selections. Cookies flavored with honey and fruit improve with age.

Other items suitable for mailing are fruit cakes, candies, pies, canned meats, pickles and relishes.

Food items should be wrapped with moisture-proof cellophane and aluminum foil, to prevent drying out and keep paperboard cartons from absorbing food oils.

Before wrapping, allow cookies to cool; then wrap several flat ones together in a piece of cellophane or foil. Bar cookies should be wrapped individually.

After wrapping, pack cookies snugly in a heavy box or tin, stuffing crumpled tissue or newspaper into all corners and spaces, and separating the layers with more paper or with popcorn. If any space remains between the top layer of cookies and the box lid, fill with paper or popcorn.

Fit the box lid down snugly and seal with cellophane tape around the edges. Take larger pieces of moisture-proof cellophane and overwrap the entire carton or tin, sealing the edges with a warm iron or with cellophane tape.

Encase the wrapped tin or box in corrugated paper, then wrap again in heavy brown wrapping paper. If sealing the outside wrapping with tape, parcel post labels must be included to indicate the package may be opened for postal inspection if necessary. Put one label on the top of the package and another on the bottom. Print or type the name and address of both the receiver and mailer of the package on both the labels and the wrapper itself. Thus, if the labels should come off during shipment, the address will still be available.

Tie the package securely with several rounds of sturdy twine. Mark "this side up" and "fragile" on top of the box.

Mail the package as soon as it is wrapped. If the food package

is to be a Christmas gift, mail by December 1 (in early December) for distant states and by December 11 for local areas.

Some may think that this has been a bad year for tests and demonstrations, but it may be one of the best. We all know that in a good year anything will make, but how about bad years. If we can find practices of varieties that work these years, we may be better off in the long run. Joe Ed Helms, Flomot, has a good cotton test. This consists of: Lankum, Deltapine 16, MoDel, Western Stormproof 44, Watson GL 5, DelCot 277, SP 37, SP 23, SP 21, Paymaster 202, Westburn, and Lockett BxL. As this land is infested with nematodes, we should get some valuable information as to nematode tolerance and yield ability.

Sam Ross, Flomot, has a test consisting of Deltapine 16 and Lankart 611.

L. D. Bilberry, Flomot, has Northern Star 998 and Lankart 611.

L. E. Shorter, Flomot, has Tamcot 788, Deltapine 16 and Lankart 611.

Caldwell Smith, Roaring Springs, has a test consisting of Deltapine 16, Northern Star 998, Western Stormproof, and Lankart 611.

Ed Lee, Matador, is testing Paymaster 202, Stripper, Coker 4104, Watson GL 16, and Prolific Stormproof.

R. E. Campbell Jr., Matador, has a test consisting of Lankart 611, Lockett BxL, and Auburn M. D. C. Baker, Matador, has Lankart 57 and Gregg 45A.

Some have read about glandless cottonseed. The Watson GL varieties are of this type, and in case anyone is interested, I still have some small samples that I will give to those interested in tasting them. You roast them like peanuts.

We have started a guar rotation test at Roaring Springs. W. H. Marshall planted guar and cotton side by side, and in 1971 we plan to plant the entire acreage to cotton to obtain information that should show the value of guar in a rotation.

E. G. Reed, Flomot, has a good irrigated grain sorghum test. Varieties included are: Acco R-109; Acco-1019; Dekalb F-61; Northum King 270; Pioneer 946; Richardson 303; RS 671; T. E. Grainmaster A; T. E. Tell; WAC 692; H&T 124; Top Hand; and Niagara Oro.

Alfred Martin, Flomot, has a seedling disease control test on cotton. Five acres were treated with Terracot, with the remainder of the field untreated.

Fertilizer tests on peanuts were established by the following: E. J. Browning, Flomot, who has a comparison of commercial fertilizer and feedlot manure; Billy Meyer, Flomot, who is checking different rates of nitrogen; and E. G. Reed, Flomot, who has test for iron and zinc.

A test for the control of peanut leaf spot was also established by E. G. Reed, Flomot. Materials used were: Koicide 101; Sperlox SZ; Benlate; Manzate 200; Mectect 160; and Polyram. An untreated check was left to compare production of untreated plants vs. different treatments.

Brush control test plots were also established. On Givins Lawrence's place the following was used for prickly pear control: 2,4,5-T & diesel; 2,4,5-T, oil & water; Tordon 225, oil & water; Tordon 225 & oil; Nopalmate; Tordon 10K pellets; and Tordon 2K beads.

On the Burleson Ranch, the following materials were used for cedar control: Tordon 10K pellets; Fenuron pellets; and Urab pellets. On the Harold Campbell Ranch, Tordon 225 & oil; and 2,4,5-TP (Silvex) was used for yucca control.

I have also established some tests for the control of gourds, ground cherry and yucca using stock salt, diesel and kerosene. J. C. Cross established a range fertilizer test on the Harold Campbell Ranch near the county line. Nitrogen at the rates of 100, 200 and 300 lbs./ac. were applied to check against the grass production of no fertilizer.

Several other tests were planned, but the weather and lack of time limited the testing work in 1970.

Obtain the best seed available of the varieties adapted to this area. The choice of variety is influenced by whether the crop is seeded on dryland or irrigated land; low or high fertility conditions; whether used for grazing or grain of both; and its resistance to disease and insects. It is also well to consider shattering and lodging characteristics and quality, especially in the case of wheat.

Not long ago the results of the 1966-70 test in Matador were published. This is a good guide to follow but remember, this was only one years test. It was encouraging to note that the leading varieties in our test for barley, oats, wheat and rye were ones that have proven out over several years in other tests in this area.

The test will be planted again this year, with some new varieties added.

All livestock producers should read the following and heed the warnings. We all know of the trouble some farm chemicals are in (DDT for example) and I am sure that we don't want to lose the use of other chemicals that are practical and economical to use.

PRESENT FDA REGULATIONS REQUIRE THAT ANIMALS MUST BE OFF THE SYNTHETIC HORMONE (DIETHYLSTILBESTROL) FOR AT LEAST 48 HOURS BEFORE SLAUGHTER. If a residue of this chemical shows up, the meat will be condemned for human consumption and feeders may be prosecuted.

This chemical can still be used if the directions are followed. This way the feeder can still benefit from use of stilbestrol

and not worry about any reper-

There is an advantage of having cattle tested at the sale ring. All female cattle over 8 months of age should be tested at the sale ring before taking home.

If cattle are not tested and brucellosis reactors show up later on MCT (Market Cattle Test), the entire herd including calves up to 6 months of age become quarantined.

If cattle are tested at the sale ring and a reactor is found, only the cattle from the origin of the reactor are affected and quarantined. These cattle should not be moved or mixed with clean cattle.

Cattle from quarantined herds can move only to a packer or a quarantined feedlot.

Lately I have been asked to look at many wheat fields where greenbugs were suspected. The grain has shown little growth of late, and brown leaves and patches are noted.

To date very few greenbugs have been found, and I have taken plants to the experiment station at Lubbock for detection of disease. No disease indications were found, and after a call to the Amarillo station, the only explanation that can be given is cold weather damage while the plants were young.

From information obtained all we can hope for is suitable moisture and weather for the plants to overcome this setback.

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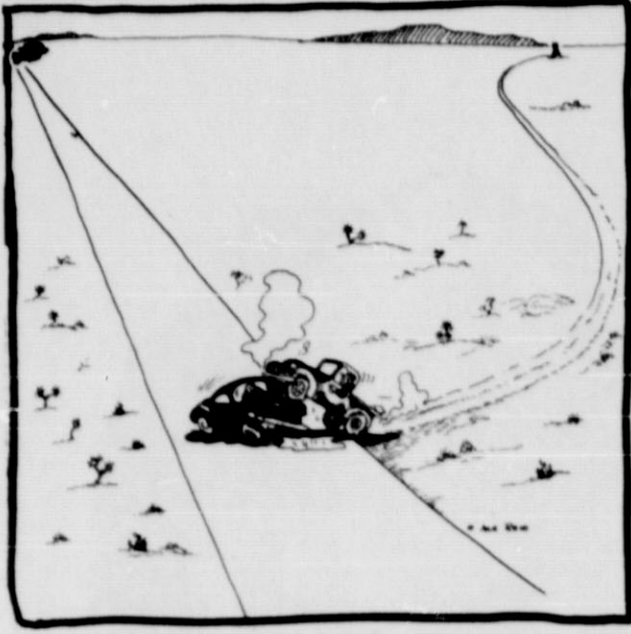

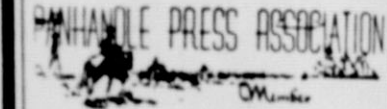
