Historical Marker For Old Railroad

Matador once had a railroad. It was built by local citizens to connect with the Q&P eight miles south of town. The charter was granted in 1913 and the line ceased to operate in 1936.

The Texas Historical Survey Committee has designated a historical marker for the site. The name of the marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Historical Markers, in order to stimulate tourist travel in this area, and to arouse interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of this locality with their unique heritage.

The marker, which was erected Monday, is located on US Highway 70, east of town, near the location of the former depot. It is immediately east of Bill's Conoco Service.

Lettering on the 18x28 marker reads: "The Motley County Railroad, Pioneer carrier for cattle and farm goods. Chartered June 20, 1913, by 92 people of Motley and nearby counties. One man is said to have invested \$50,000. Matador Land and Cattle Company also provided bonus funds. "Original directors were J. C. Burleson, A. B. Echols, J. N. Gaines, T. E. Leckie, I. E. Martin, J. E. Russell, R. P. Moore, J. D. Morriss and A. C. Traweck. "Trains used cattle sweepers, as the 8-mile track ran through unfenced ranches. Line joined the Quanah, Acme & Pacific tracks near Roaring Springs. The M.C.R. Ceased to operate in 1936."

Mrs. Deaton was born April 18, 1879 in Hunt County, Texas and passed away November 18, 1970 after attaining the age of 91 years and 7 months. She was married to Allan Deaton, Dec. 24, 1900 in Decatur. They moved to King County in 1912 and lived there until 1945 when they moved to Dickens County. They came to Matador in 1953 to make their home. Mr. Deaton passed away in December, 1966.

Mrs. Deaton moved to Crosbyton about 15 months ago.

She is survived by three sons, W. C. (Rosie) Deaton of Matador, Wendell of Hereford and Allan of Lubbock; three daughters, Mrs. F. J. Gordon and Mrs. John C. Reynolds, both of Lubbock, and Mrs. Walter Gruben of Abilene; 15 grandchildren; 22 great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Hardin and sons, Kyle and Kody, were joined in Lubbock for the funeral, by her mother, Mrs. Clinton Voyles of Memphis. Also attending from Matador were Rev. and Mrs. Gene Joplin.

Coyotes Eat Calf While It Still Lives

For many years some ranchers have advanced the theory that coyotes do not eat calves. Rancher Ward Rattan has definite proof to the contrary.

Yesterday morning he came upon a calf being eaten by three coyotes while the small animal was still alive. The predatory animals were eating from the hip of the young calf while the victim held its head up and looked at the coyotes.

Rattan shot at the coyotes as they retreated but his shots were not effective. He loaded the calf into his pickup and brought it to town but it died enroute.

Plans are to place poison in the small carcass and return it to the scene.

To Meet Sundown At Hale Center

MAYOR Kirby Campbell has issued a proclamation declaring today "Red and Black Day" in Matador, in support of the Matador Matadors to win Bi-District.

Game Broadcast Available Here

It is probable that some residents will not be able to go to Hale Center today to see the Bi-District game between Matador and Sundown.

They will be able to hear a live radio broadcast direct from the contest, which starts at 2:30 p.m. A Childress radio station, KCTX, will broadcast the game. The service is made possible by a group of local sponsors, who will be named on the program.

A pep rally will be held at 10:30 a.m. on the courthouse square. It was announced yesterday.

The Matadors are in the class 3B driver's seat and wrapped up the district championship with a victory over the Nazareth Swifts 18-8 here at Burleson field Friday night. The victory is Matadors' 6th without a loss and gave the Matadors the League Title for the first time since 1964.

All the chips will be on the table when the Matadors and the Sundown Roughnecks meet for the bi-district finale Thursday afternoon, Thanksgiving Day, in Hale Center at 2:30 at the High School football field.

First quarter and the Swifts went into the air for a 22 yard scoring pass and a successful air trip conversion to lead 8-0.

The Matadors struck back in the second quarter and grounded out a 70 yard touchdown drive when quarterback Bill Barnhill plunged over from the one yard line. Halfback Lee Hurt kept the Matador offensive spark going when he claimed Barnhill's sailing strike and fleet footed 44 yards for a touchdown. The half ended 12-8.

Second half, Matador kicked off to Nazareth and Hurt personally took care of the third Matador touchdown when he encircled the unchaperoned Swift ball in the end zone for the final score of 18-8.

The Matadors winning their 7th victory this season piled up 271 yards to Nazareth's 98 and 14 first downs to the Swifts' 7. Halfback Donnie Jackson gained the most yards rushing with 77.

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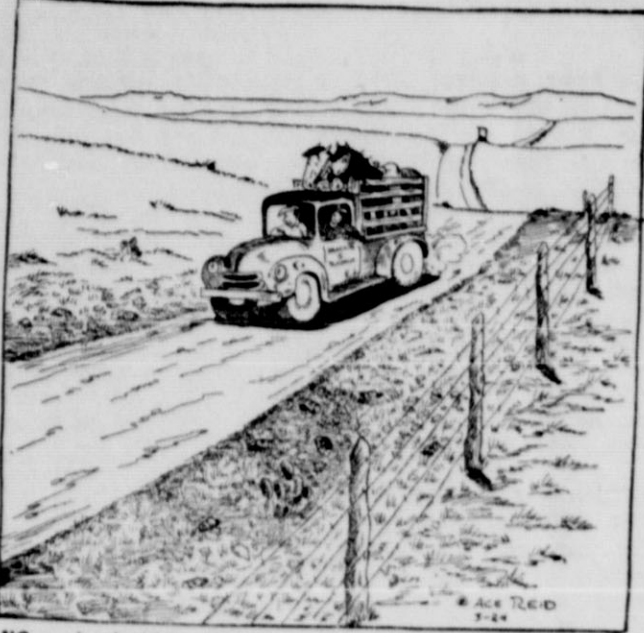

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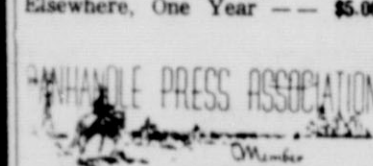
