

BANK HERE ROBBED OF \$9,042

Hostage is Released; Bandit Captured and All Money Recovered

Most Exciting Event In Matador's History

LESS THAN 24 HOURS after a bandit had robbed the First State Bank here of \$9,042 and abducted pretty Mrs. Bill (Rachel Craven) Harrison, about 12:55 Thursday afternoon, all the money was back in the bank, Mrs. Harrison had been released and a former Tech student, Sammy Jim Horton, had been arrested.

Mrs. Harrison was released when the late model Buick automobile ran out of gas, about 18 miles northwest of Matador, near the Floyd-Motley line. Mrs. Harrison was unharmed when found by Floyd County Deputy Foster Amburn, who radioed a message of her safety to Matador. The bandit had escaped on foot. The hold-up car had been stolen earlier in the day in Lubbock from Mrs. Bill Polson, Shallowater. She said she left it in 1700 block of 26th street, unlocked and with the keys in the ignition. She is employed in the Lubbock School Administration building and found her car missing when she returned at noon.

Displayed Revolver
He placed a satchel on the counter in front of cashier Howard Gwinn and said matter-of-factly, "Buddy, this is a stick-up."

"I hesitated a moment," Gwinn recalled. "He had his left hand under his coat and he pulled out a blue revolver and waved it toward the satchel, saying 'Fill it up.' He told me to call the women at the back and I did."

After Gwinn had filled the bag with money from two tellers' cages and the vault, the bandit ordered the cashier, two other employees and three customers to face the back of the bank.

Got License Number
"You're going with me," he said to Mrs. Harrison, taking her by the arm.

The two walked calmly out of the bank and sped off in the new Buick parked directly in front of Frank Price, bank assistant vice president, followed the pair to the door and noted the license number.

The robbery took about five minutes. Tim Wood, 1707 33rd St., Lubbock, walked into the bank on business for the March of Dimes and noticed the stranger outside.

"He stuck out like a sore thumb here," Wood said later. Mrs. Harrison and Mrs. Garland Cartwright, a bank secretary, were at a back bookkeeper's window, to which Wood had walked. A customer, Mrs. Vivian Jacobs, was in the safe deposit vault. Another customer, Mrs. Hope Fish, and Price walked in during the robbery.

After Gwinn had called the

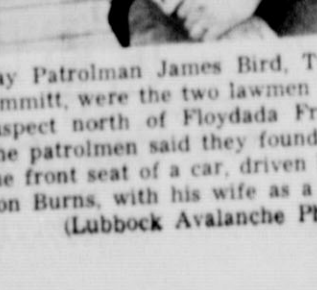
two women employees up front on the bandit's orders, the man barked orders to Wood. "You come here!"

"He was waving the pistol, so I did what he said," Wood declared.

Meanwhile, the quick-thinking Gwinn bypassed larger bills in two teller's cages, filling the satchel with \$1 to \$20 bills but remembering to include a batch on which serial numbers had been recorded.

The bandit then ordered him to "get the money from the vault," but stayed up front with the other employees and customers.

Knew What He Was Doing
About this time, Mrs. Fish walked into the bank, followed by Price, the assistant vice president, who had been to lunch. When Gwinn returned with the satchel, the bandit ordered all those he left behind to face the

back and not move for 30 minutes.

Had Some Money
Gwinn estimated the robber got only about half the money in the cages. He at first figured the bank's loss at \$11,242 but \$2,200 later was discovered in the top of the vault safe and Gwinn recalled hiding it there in case the bandit followed him into the vault.

When Mrs. Fish walked into the bank, the armed man asked, "Lady, did you want something?"

"Yes," she recalled saying, "I was going to make a deposit but I've got to go back to my car."

"You," he replied, are not going anywhere. As he left the bank, the robber looked both ways down the street, then assisted Mrs. Harrison into the waiting getaway car, getting in after her. As he sped around the corner westward, Wood came outside and soon hailed a passing deputy sheriff, J. E. Russell Jr.

The alert was broadcast immediately. Turning north on State Hwy. 70, the bandit sped past a road maintenance crew and Mrs. Harrison spotted her father, J. D. Craven—but he, ironically, had his back turned and did not see her.

Driving almost to Whiteflat, the robber turned westward on a dirt road on which construction work had been started. The getaway car ran out of gasoline 17.8 miles northwest of Matador.

Ironic Question
As he left her, Mrs. Harrison said, the bandit asked her politely if she would like to have some of the money.

Back at the bank, he had at one point admonished the men, "don't try to be a hero."

Offered No Resistance
The suspect was armed but offered no resistance, the patrolmen said. He had a satchel of money with him.

The officers said when the car, driven by Burns, was stopped at the block, he (Burns) made a Motorists Warned

Patrolmen on all paved roads leading from Motley County stopped motorists and warned them of the robber. Trucks were searched, at times tarpaulins being removed so officers could look underneath.

As darkness closed in, officers at the search scene went to eat in shifts. Later in the night, with thunderstorms threatening, most of the officers were relieved of duty but a strong force was left to patrol the scattered roads which wind through the ranch country.

Sammy Jim Horton, was held in the Lubbock County jail Friday night, charged with the \$9,042 bank robbery Thursday and the abduction of a woman hostage there before his capture Friday morning in a car with two more hostages at a road block north of Floydada.

Two Highway Patrolmen James Bird, Tulla and Larry J. Snider, Dimmitt, found the suspect, crouched behind the front seat of a car in which Mr. and Mrs. Marion Burns, of the Fairview community, Floyd County, were riding in the front seat.

Lubbock Dogs Used
Police dogs from Lubbock were taken to the spot where the car was abandoned but could not pick up the bandit's trail. Officers found no footprints nearby. The hard-packed road led to a pasture fence, beyond

Paducah Doctor Tells Lions Of Hospital Need
Most satisfactory condition for medical services is through a small hospital where the doctors and their patients have an exchange of trust and understanding that frequently lasts for many years. This is the opinion of Dr. George Orr of Paducah.

Dr. Orr was born and reared in Scotland and served for a period as a doctor in the British Army. He came to America after his native country went to socialism, embracing socialism.

"America is great and rich and free," he said, "and it did not become great because of government handling—but because men could do what they wanted to do. I have a great faith in the American people and I do not believe they will continue a present tendency of allowing increased government controls."

"I think Medicare will serve a useful purpose," Dr. Orr continued, "but I should warn you against its extension to other age groups until medicine may become socialized. In Britain the medical program costs twice the amount of early estimates. You

Former Sheriff H. H. Courtney Claimed Sunday

A heart attack Sunday night around 10 o'clock claimed the life of former Motley County Sheriff, H. H. (Cy) Courtney. He had been making his home on a farm at Como, near Sulphur Springs for the past several years, and was visiting in the home of a neighbor when stricken.

Services were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday at the Murphy-Orworsky Funeral Home in Sulphur Springs in compliance with his instructions, his body has been contributed for medical research, to Southwestern Medical Research center in Dallas.

Courtney first served as deputy in 1935-36 under the late Ed Skinner, and continued as deputy under L. A. Carlisle during his term as sheriff. In 1940, he ran for the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector and was elected. He served as sheriff for six years, beginning January 1, 1941.

He later lived in Dallas where he was a member of the Police Department and was Chief of Police at Farmers Branch for several years. He had been in ill health and had suffered frequent heart attacks in recent years.

Born at Northfield
Hilliard Hinson Courtney was born at Northfield, in Motley County, February 4, 1906, and made his home there until moving to Matador as deputy sheriff. He was married at Northfield, Dec. 3, 1927, to Miss Maggie Lee Harrington, who died May 26, 1963.

He is survived by one son, Hal Courtney of Oakland, Okla., and two grandchildren. Attending funeral services from Matador were Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Bostick and Ward Rattan, and from Northfield, a niece, Mrs. Delmont Hays. Other former county residents attending were Mrs. Lillian Steen, and her brother, Everett Caik, and Jim Ward Jeffers and son, Freddie, all of Dallas; and Mr. and Mrs. Eddie J. Leary of Irving.

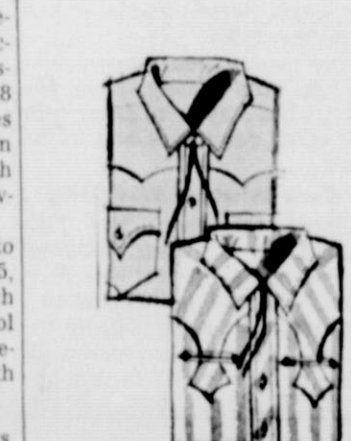

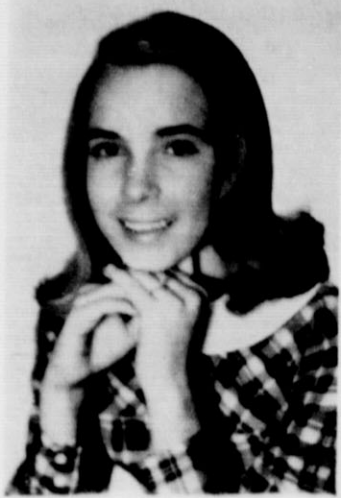

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

I would like to give my personal thanks to the many people and organizations that helped the 4-H members who took part in the state 4-H contests at A&M June 7-9. Without your assistance, it would have been very difficult for the 18 members who competed in 9 contests to have made the trip.

Cryo-branding (super-cold branding) offers the advantages of lack of pain, less hide damage and growth of white hair at the brand site, which is legible from a distance.

Most of the work has been done on clipped animals with copper branding irons. Heavy copper branding irons were selected because they are the most efficient for heat transfer. Experimental irons were 1/4 to 1 inch thick with depth from the contact face at least 1 inch. Cattle were clipped and the

skin wet with 95% ethyl alcohol. They were then brushed with copper irons chilled in ice alcohol with 40 seconds contact. These brands were effective even with a flat iron of only 1 inch diameter. Brands made by applying the iron for 60 seconds resulted in legible brands with white growth, but produced a loss of phthelium, while 20 seconds of skin contact produced a patchy outgrowth of white hair.

Of major importance is the stage of hair growth. The hair is easily destroyed when it is growing rapidly. "Cryo-branded" cattle have replaced hairs in the brand area with new white hair, but this has been observed over a long period of time to determine the permanency of the brand, however it is believed that the brand will be permanent.

Now that summer is here, don't be in a hurry to get your lawn and flower beds the first sign of wilting. Frequent watering during the day heat, but recover in the evening. Frequent waterings encourage shallow growth, so if you must water and it doesn't seem like you're getting much help from the weather, really soak the grass when you do water, and less often.
