Auxiliary History and Projects Reviewed in Workshop Held Here

History of the American Legion Auxiliary and its projects were reviewed in a workshop held Monday in the Legion building, conducted by Mrs. Jack Flynt of Dimmitt.

The morning session was devoted to the structure of the Auxiliary and its projects. Emphasis was placed on the rehabilitation of disabled veterans during the afternoon session.

Mrs. Flynt told the women as-

sembled for the workshop, that the nearly 1,000,000 members of American Legion Auxiliary constitute "the largest patriotic organization of women in history."

The organization is formed by local units, district, state and national divisions, with four geographical divisions.

"Our fundamental purpose is to help build a stronger America and to inspire in all women who feel as we do a more devoted patriotism," Mrs. Flynt said.

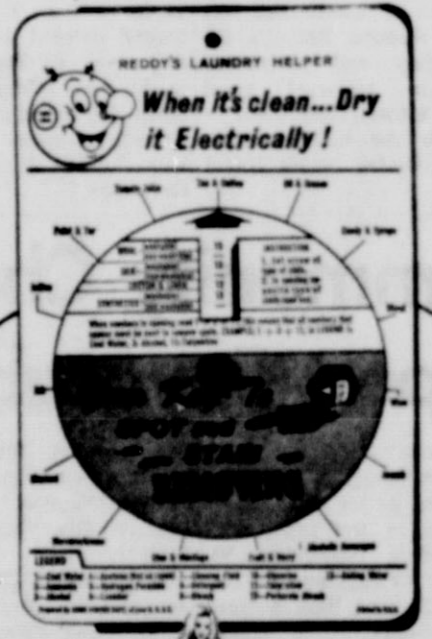
