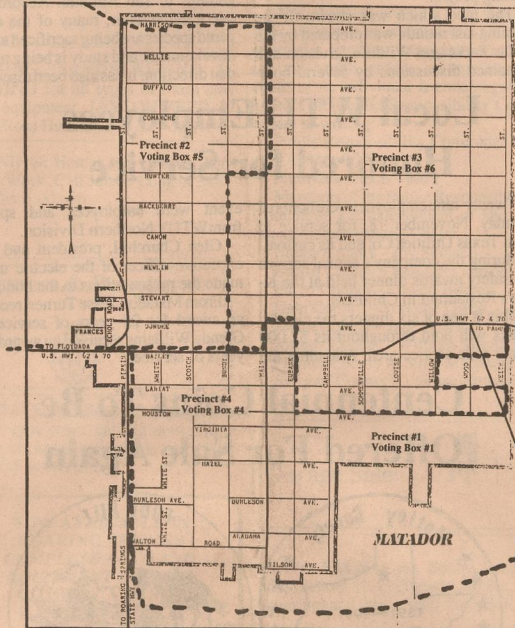
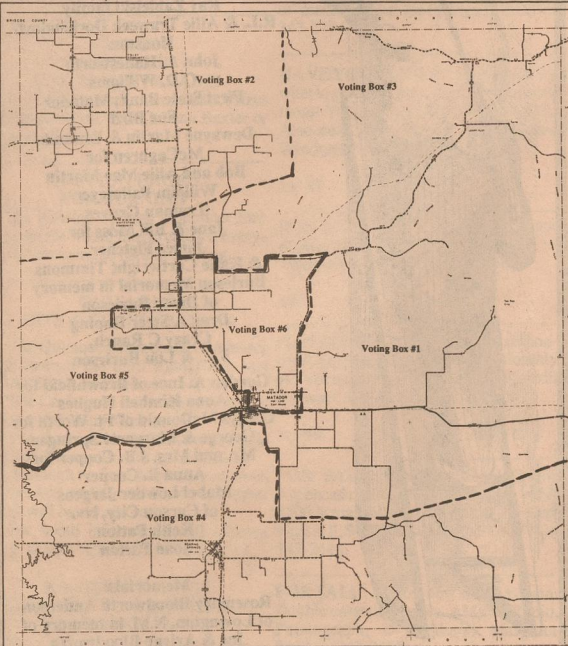

Teachers Remembered With Museum Donations

Among the recent honorariums presented to the Motley County Museum fund were two for former teachers. Anna Kimbell Bain Hughes, remembered by Gordon A. Ince as Mrs. Ince's grandmother. As a young girl in 1888 Anna moved to Motley County with her parents and lived in a dugout on Tom Ball Creek which was large enough for two beds, a stove, table, and chairs. The dirt floors were carpeted with tow sacks but the door was left open for "fresh air."

By 1891 Anna joined thirty other children at Whiteflat in attending school in a drafty one-room school house. When she attained the necessary requirements of the day, the young lady taught at Tee Pee City, Whiteflat, Northfield and Quitaque. Students at Northfield, where classes were held in a dugout, recalled that classes were barely disrupted when a rattlesnake was discovered coiled on the ledge near the roof. An older student efficiently dispensed with the snake and the unflappable Anna resumed her classes.

The second teacher to be honored with a memorial is Margaret Springer. Gladys Springer McDonald requests that the names of her parents, George and Margaret Springer, be added to the list of those on the engraved plaque that will hang in the museum lobby. George Springer, who operated Spot Cash Grocery in 1928, was a well known merchant of the Roaring Springs area.

His wife Margaret, Mrs. Springer to us, was a teacher by choice and profession, teaching at Roaring Springs, Matador, and Floydada where she attracted the attention of this writer with her "tough love" techniques, combining a disciplined exterior and a warm heart. The museum welcomes these two dedicated women, Anna Kimbell Hughes and Margaret Springer, who did so much to influence the lives of Motley County citizens (and a few outlanders) to the wall of honor.

Roaring Springs City Council Meeting Report

The Roaring Springs City Council met Tuesday, December 3 at 6:30 p.m. with all members present. Mayor Joey Thacker opened the meeting and City Manager, Frances Walters, read the previous meeting minutes. They were approved.

Council approved the resolution from the Motley County Appraisal District to request they change their fiscal year to October 1 through September 30.

The Master of Fine Arts exhibit, entitled "Another Part of the House", spotlights mixed-media drawings and large-scale oil paintings in black and white, a dramatic departure from her colorful, non-representational work viewed earlier this year at Galerie d'a, Dallas.

"In this current exhibit," the artist states, "I represent certain structures, primarily empty rooms, in varying degrees of abstraction. The pictures reflect a simple record of some preceptions that I have gleaned from places where I have lived or worked. The illusion of real space is not as critical to my project as is the poetic depth of the space."

"I want to recover and reveal those special silent places that protect day-dreamers."

One of those special silent places recalled from her childhood is a laundry chute that her grandfather, the late R.E. Campbell, built into the house where she was born.

"As a child I was especially intrigued by the small knee-high door my grandfather installed in the bathroom of his house. It opened above the pitch black space of a closet-hamper in the basement, a jump-

ing off place onto soft clumps of dirty clothes -- a fortune of lights and darkness -- and a great hide-out, where only my grandmother would think to look," Richardson said.

Her charcoal rendering, "Chute", drawn from the memory of her leaps from light to dark, soft landings, and private thoughts, recently won an honorable mention in the Dallas Women's Caucus for Art "Expanding Visions/Women of the Metroplex" competition, juried by Annegreth Nill, Associate Curator for Contemporary Art at the Dallas Museum of Art.

In general Richardson notes, "In my personal surroundings I strive for elegance, a little mystery, varied shapes and colors, and an overall peaceful or playful

feeling to counter any random chaos from the recent past -- yesterday's events, today's activities, or the conversation just over. For the same reasons I seek these qualities in my art as well

"No human figures appear in this work. I invite viewers by their presence to 'people' the empty places, to notice their own color or light affectability, and to make whatever meaning they want of the depictions. The meanings that I attach to the works are contained within the exhibit as short narratives that recollect my own 'interior involvements.'"

A reception for the artist will be held on December 14, from 3-5 P.M. in Gallery 4 of the Dallas Public Library at 1515 Young Street, Dallas.

Opening the program in the church auditorium after the meal, was music by a High School Girls' Ensemble composed of Kobbri Risser, Brooke Brandon, Heather Hobbs, Lisa Jones and Amber Brandon, who were introduced by Donna (Mrs. Larry) Hoyle.

Introduced by Dan (Mrs. C.M.) Barton, Mrs. Eversole recounted her married life as she and her husband traversed the globe as an Air Force family, starting in Lake Charles, La., and ending 22 years later in Plainview, Texas, where they have lived the past 11 years. "My husband and I met, married, were saved, and had two children in Lake Charles," she said.

As they were transferred from one location to another they were often met with problems and disappointments, especially in living quarters, she said. "But God met our requirements. Life is rich and wonderful, and I appreciate the life God has given me," she declared, referring specifically to the years following her and her husband's conversion. "We were both unsaved when we married," she said as she related the circumstances that led to their respective decisions.

During the years they were relocated,

first from Louisiana to California, "God was teaching us that wherever we went He was with us." Then to Maine - "God was there, teaching me patience," and from there to Montgomery, Alabama, where "God called and blessed us." In 1966 they were sent to Puerto Rico where they encountered hurricanes, but "God provided friends" in their need. In 1969 they were rotated back to the states and in Oklahoma their last child, a daughter was born and, she said, "I felt the Peace that passeth understanding." But not without misgivings at first. They had started from Lake Charles with two children, and now have five, with four grandchildren.

MONEY IN MARRIAGE

How married couples manage their money is an individual and private matter, but research findings suggest that there may be fewer differences in money management style between dual-earner couples and single-earner couples than previously thought.

According to a study conducted by researchers at the University of Illinois, joint responsibility for certain money management tasks was common for both types of couples.

Both types of couples shared responsibility for these common money management tasks:

- Who looks after having cash on hand.
- Who decides how much cash to get
- Who decides on purchase of major appliances
- Who handles money for house furnishings
- Who handles money for recreation
- Who handles money for gifts and contributions

When an individual instead of a couple was responsible, wives were more likely to:

- Look after having cash on hand
- Decide how much cash to get
- Handle money for house furnishings

Handle money for gifts and contributions

The study also showed that wives had primary responsibility, whether they were in a single-earner family or a dual-earner family, for:

- Paying the bills
- Handling money for food, beverages, housing and utilities

Keeping track of expenditures. Whether both spouses earn an income or only one spouse is an earner is only one factor which may influence the way in which couples handle their finances. Other factors that could influence money management in marriage include whether the dual earners are wage earners or career professionals; which spouse earns the higher income; and the stage of family life cycle of the couple.

When money management tasks are shared, one benefit is enhanced communications. Both spouses are knowledgeable about the families financial situation and if something should happen to one spouse, then the remaining spouse would be able to manage alone. In contrast to joint financial responsibility, some couples follow a specialized style of money management with one person largely responsible for financial tasks.

These couples may find this to be a time efficient strategy but they should be aware that the non-manager may be less familiar with the household financial situation. Each married couple either evolves or develops their personal money management style. It is important to communicate expectations for what should be done and who should do it early enough in the relationship so conflicts can be avoided.

Matador Garden Club Meets At Library For VCR Program

Endangered plants in Texas were featured in a VCR tape presentation for Matador Garden Club in regular meeting Monday, November 18 at Motley County Library. Mrs. Edgar Lee presided in the absence of the president, Mrs. W.N. Pipkin, and Mrs. Ted Elliott was program leader.

Reading of the secretary's minutes, committee reports and plans for decorating Pioneer Memorial Park and planters for Christmas were matters discussed during the business session. It was voted for members to meet at the park at 2 p.m. Friday, Dec. 6 to place the decorations. Also discussed was the sale of tickets on the wheelbarrow which the club has to give away. Mrs. Jack Crider of Odessa, who had the winning ticket when the wheelbarrow was given during the Centennial Celebration, May 25, gave it back to the club, to use again as a money making project.

The tape which was shown at the meeting last month, was prepared by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Division and contained discussions by several botanists on research of endangered species.

The range of subjects extended from the Rio Grande region to the Panhandle area. The tape pointed out that wild flowers and plants are interwoven in the lives of human beings who rely on them for food and clothing. It was also noted that because plant life has been neglected for generations, possibly one out of five will be lost due to neglect, and by the year 2000 it is estimated that 40 percent will become extinct.

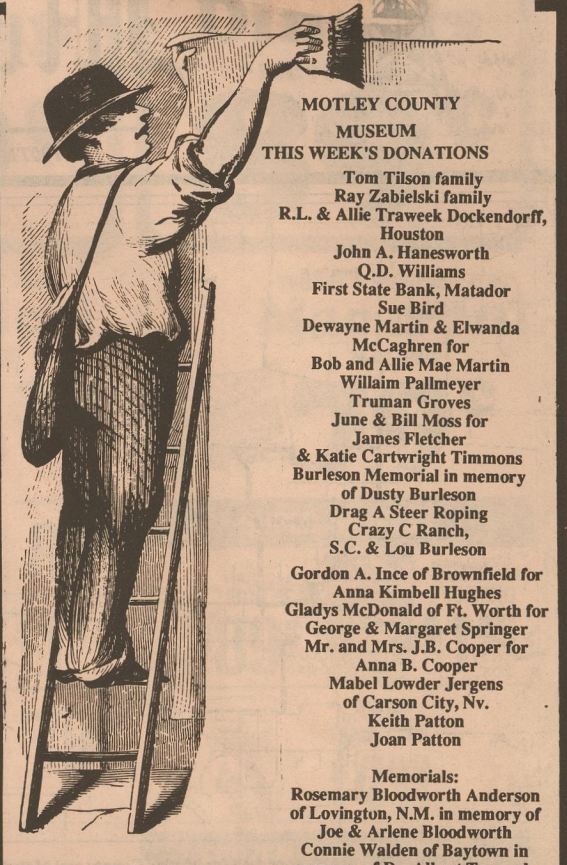
Although Texas has the greatest number of plants on record, it was shown that a great amount of the endangered species is found on private land. However, more of the rare types are found along the Rio Grande, such as the dogweed and willowweed. An effort is being made in reclaiming the Snow Bells in the Hill Country of Texas, the largest collection of these being in the botanical gardens in San Antonio. According to one commentator, many of the endangered species are being sacrificed to urban development, and study is being made in that direction. It has also been discovered

that wildlife in the state's rivers also contribute to the disappearance of plant life, such as the Texas Salamander found in the San Marcos River, and the nutra, or large beaver imported from South America, for their skins. Many other aspects of the subject were explored in the interesting tape which was donated for the Oceans Drive Garden Club in Corpus Christi.

After the program, refreshments of cake, cookies, crackers and dips, sausage pinwheels, nuts, coffee and hot punch were served by Mrs. Lee, Mrs. Ted Elliott, and Mrs. W.D. Lipscomb. The table was festive with a Thanksgiving motif featured in centerpiece and serving appointments. Others present were Mesdames Sue Seigler, Douglas Meador and Callie Giesecke.

Mrs. Palmer's hobbies are cross-stitch and reading.

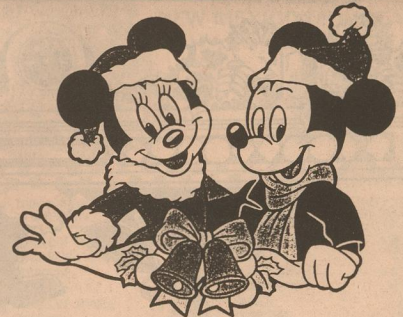
Amy's Anecdotes

Social Security Tips

HELP FOR LOW INCOME MEDICARE BENEFICIARIES

Do you know someone like Margaret Jones? (I'm not using her real name to protect her privacy). She's in her late 70's now and lives alone; her husband died some time ago. Although she owns her home, she has little savings left. Fortunately, Mrs. Jones gets a Social Security check of about \$450 a month and she has Medicare too.

Of course, on \$450 a month, paying the 29.90 monthly premium for Medicare medical insurance is not easy. Mrs. Jones also worries that if she has to go to the hospital, the \$628 Medicare hospital insurance deductible will wipe out her remaining savings.

Perhaps you know someone in the same circumstances as Mrs. Jones. It might even be you. Well, the good news is that there is a program to help people like Mrs. Jones with out-of-pocket Medicare expenses. It's called the "Qualified Medicare Beneficiary" program, or "QMB."

The QMB program helps low-income Medicare beneficiaries by paying their Medicare premiums, deductibles, and

coinsurance. The program is run by the States Dept. of Human Services and the federal Health Care Financing Administration. It is up to your State to decide if you are eligible for help from the program.

Like Mrs. Jones, you might qualify for help from the QMB program if you have Medicare coverage and your income and your "resources" -- things you own -- are limited. Here in Texas your resources can't be more than \$4,000 for one person, or \$6,000 for a family of two. But some things -- such as the home you live in -- don't count. Your car may not count either.

To qualify for the program, your income also must be limited. In general, if you don't work, your income -- from things like Social Security and interest income -- must be less than \$552 a month for one person, or \$740 or less for a family of two. If you work, you can qualify even if your income is somewhat higher.

Remember, only the people at Department of Human Services can decide if you're eligible for QMB help. If you think you might be eligible, or you want to find out more about the program, contact them at 2907 West 7th St., Plainview, Texas.

How does a bird hunter practice without going to the gun range? Try this new idea from hunting expert Wayne Pearson. Align and attach (with tape or thick rubberbands) a mini flashlight to the barrel of your shotgun. Get someone (a spouse, son/daughter, or even an insurance salesman if you wear ear plugs) to use another flashlight. Their job is to arc their light across a wall imitating the flight path of a quail, dove, or duck.

The goal is to develop the eye-hand coordination to quickly shoulder and aim the light on your gun so that it matches and "leads" the target light. Darken a room and practice. The smaller the flashlight beams, the better the practice.

This is a great excuse to turn off the television and spend some quality time with the family. Any time the TV set is turned off, every member of the family will know that something important is happening.

A trip to the gun range is still the best way to build shooting confidence, and I strongly recommend it for every hunter. After all, Arnold Palmer still goes to the driving range.

Ever wish you knew what the bottom of a lake really looked like? Now is a perfect time to visit the site of the newest lake in Texas, LAKE ALAN HENRY, named in honor of a former Mayor of Lubbock, is located seventeen miles south of Post on U.S. 84 between Lubbock and Snyder. Scheduled to be completed in 1993, Lake Henry will supplement water from Lake Meredith to meet the demands of the city of Lubbock.
