Thanksgiving to be Ushered In Sunday

THANKSGIVING SEASON will be ushered in Sunday, with a Harvest Festival at the First Methodist Church during the morning worship period, and Union Community Services at 7 p.m. at the First Baptist Church.

Worship services at the Methodist Church will be at 10:30 a.m. it was announced by Rev. John Fitzgerald, pastor. Dinner will be served at 12:15 p.m. in the church basement. Tithes and ingathering of offerings will be stressed by the pastor during the service.

Rev. James Hancock, pastor of the Baptist congregation will deliver the Thanksgiving message, Sunday night, and combined choirs of the two churches will be joined by others in the community, for the song services, directed by Vernon Higginbotham. Those who will assist in the choir are requested to meet at 6:30 p.m. in the church basement for a brief rehearsal.

Union Thanksgiving services for the community have been held annually for a number of years, and the support of the citizens, by attending again this year, will be appreciated. A cordial welcome is also extended to friends in adjoining communities.

Matadors Winner In Homecoming Tilt

The Matador Matadors worked the Rochester Steers over Friday night, Nov. 11, here at Burselon Field in honor of the exes who had come for Matador's homecoming Ends Dick Moss and Max Barton crossed the line for the Matadors, leading them to a 14-6 victory.

At half-time, Matador captains Larry Bynum, John Thomas and Luis Moore revealed the team's selection of cheerleader Shariene Berryman as Sweetheart, placed a helmet on her head and presented her with a bouquet of roses. The Football Sweetheart is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wade Berryman.

Things looked bad for the red and black team the first quarter as they kicked off and started losing ground. The Steers kept the ball in Matador territory most of the beginning period and scored on a pass play to make it 6-0 in the Steers favor.

The game improved in the second quarter for the Matadors however, as Moss intercepted a Rochester pass and started the ball rolling for Matador. Throwing the ball seemed to work well for the home team; in fact, quarterback Larry Bostick passed for 60 yards before the half. With less than one minute before half-time activities, Moss snatched one out of the air and scored, tying up the game 6-6.

The Matadors received the ball in the third quarter. Fullback Joey Meador broke through the middle for a 50 yard gain. Soon afterwards, Bostick pitched back to Larry Bynum, who then passed to Barton for six more points. The extra points were made by Luis Moore on a dive up the middle and the score stood 14-6 for the remainder of the game.

In the over all picture, Meador moved the ball for an even 100 yards and Luis Moore drove for 34. Bynum came out with 27 yards and Bostick rushed for 13. Passing made the touchdowns as Dick Moss received for 57 yards and Max Barton, for 7.

John Thomas, back in the game after a two weeks interruption because of a broken hand, was high man on defense with 11 tackles. Meador made 9 and Barton showed up with 8.

This week, the Matadors will meet the Rule Bobcats at Rule. Although the Bobcats have a 1-5 standing, they are considered to be a big threat. At this moment, the Matador Matadors are tied with the Rochester Steers and the Lockett Panthers for second place and must win this last game to hold the position.

Overseas Mail Speed Up Seen For Christmas
In an attempt to speed up overseas mail delivery for Christmas, packages weighing less than five pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined will be airlifted on a space available basis, Postmaster Charlie Scaff of Matador announced.

Second class publications in accordance to the recently passed Dulski Military Mail Act, such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the Amed Forces serving in Viet Nam.

SAM Services
Parcels weighing five pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has asked that all parcels be clearly marked upon presentation at the post office with the letters "S A M" (surface airlift mail).

A book review by a former honorary member of El Progreso Study Club, Mrs. W. F. Gaede of Silverton, was enjoyed by the club at regular meeting, Thursday, The November 10 meeting was in the home of Mrs. L. E. Campbell.

Mrs. Albert Daffern was program director and introduced the speaker.

"A good book," Mrs. Daffern said in her introduction, "is one that is opened with expectation and closed with delight and profit."

The book which Mrs. Gaede reviewed, "The Trouble With Being a Mama," by Mrs. Eva Rutland, proved to be this type of "good" book. It is a timely book, for the troubles with being a mama are the same the world over.

The story is an account of one woman's life with four lively, trouble-making youngsters and Mrs. Rutland's sense of humor makes the story a delight to hear. Her wisdom and understanding are a real contribution to family living in today's society.

Mrs. Rutland is an educated Negro, raised in Atlanta, Georgia, who lived in an integrated neighborhood after her marriage. She and her husband tried to keep their frustrations from their children, but Janey, a little white girl said the Negro family "shouldn't be in the same neighborhood with white people."

Mrs. Rutland told her children that the white mother of the little girl did not know real values. "She does not know how to judge people on their character, so she bases her judgement on false values, like color of skin or cash in their pockets... or something like that."

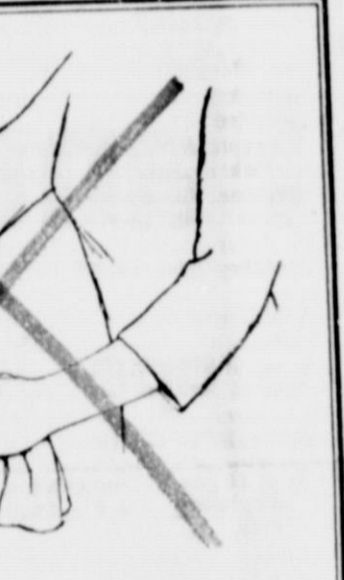

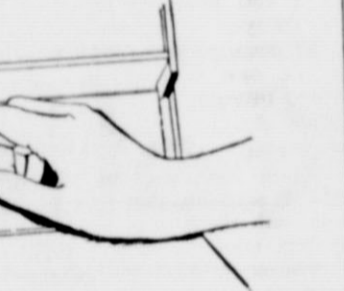

THE FATE OF COTTON'S FUTURE may well rest in the hands of the grower between Dec. 5 and 9, when he votes on the marketing quota referendum, and at the same time vote on the cotton research and promotion program which would be financed by \$1 per bale uniform assessment. Voting will be done by mail by two (green and blue) ballots.

Bringing the importance of the election into closer perspective, it will mean that if the marketing quota referendum is vetoed the grower (less than 2 3rds of all growers) the price support and diversion payments will cease. In Motley County in 1966 more than \$900,000 was paid to growers.
