

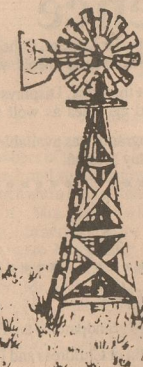

Motley County Student Selected As Recipient of SPC Scholars Program

Levelland - South Plains College officials recently announced that a graduating senior from Motley County High School has been selected as a recipient of an award from the college's Scholars Program.

A total of 48 students have been awarded South Plains College's most prestigious scholarships totaling \$98,000 for the 1994-95 academic year. Students named to the SPC Scholars Program are awarded a \$2,000 scholarship that is distributed in the amount of \$500 per semester for the recipient's two years of study at the college.

"We are pleased to award these scholarships to outstanding area high school students," said Dr. Gary McDaniel, presi-

dent of South Plains College.

"They represent the upper five percent of college-bound students and promise to provide exemplary leadership in academic and technical endeavors at South Plains College."

Kobbi Risser, daughter of Fred and Elaine Risser of Matador, has been selected as the C.M. Sanders Journalism Scholarship.

A mass communications major, Risser is the salutatorian at Motley County High School. She was selected for Who's Who Among American High School Students, and also was a member of the National Honor Society.

Trail Ride Becomes Endurance Test

When Hal Hines and sons Nathaniel and Travis signed up for the Panhandle Heritage Memorial Trailride on Memorial weekend they knew they could expect a hard ride through some spectacular scenery. Perhaps they did not realize what started out for pleasure would soon become a test of endurance for them and their mounts.

The trail riders' goal was to complete seventy miles from the rim of the Palo Duro on the Tom Christian ranch, cross country via the watershed of the Prairie Dog Fork of the Red River to Caprock Canyons State Park. "Although I had been raised not far away, I never knew much about this part of the country or how beautiful it is," Hines said as he recounted their journey which followed the early trails of the Comanche and Kiowa Indians.

"A strenuous trip for the average person and a hard trip for an animal not in good condition," explained the brochure sent out by organizer Glen Campbell. "When one person or his mount begins to falter, it affects all others and it stretches an already long day into an absolute nightmare."

The riders were well taken care of with rest stops, plenty of liquids, prepared meals, and a chance to load up at certain check points, when they or their mounts had had enough punishment and desired to be trailered the remaining distance.

A fund raising charity event benefiting the Panhandle Head Injury Association, the memorial ride is sponsored by the Panhandle Trailriders who promote horseback riding along the many state and national historic trails and provide volunteer help for the establishment and

maintenance of such trails.

Hines, active in the local Boy Scout program when he lived with his parents near Dougherty, is a home builder who now lives east of Dallas in Sunnyvale. Getting in touch with his roots, Hines bought his first horse a few years ago and began riding once again. Now his herd includes several horses and a small group of cattle which graze in the lush grass near his suburban home.

Although Nathaniel shares an appreciation for horses and riding with his dad, younger son Travis, a student in Austin, is a self-avowed "city slicker." Both sons, though somewhat sunburned and galled

to different degrees, seemed to appreciate the experience which they could only describe as an endurance test.

The Hines team earned special Trail Ride jackets and patches, and a belt buckle for traveling the longest distance to attend.

After packing up their bedrolls and loading three very tired horses in the trailer, the men pointed their Suburban toward Dallas. With them they took memories of friendly people, two days of hard riding in the extremes of Panhandle weather across some of the most spectacular scenery not often available to the public, and a special time of sharing between a father and his sons.

Summer Energy Saving Tips From WTU

The long hot days of Summer are upon us. When temperatures reach the 90s, you wonder how to stay cool and save energy at the same time. West Texas Utilities Company offers these tips to help use energy wisely during this hottest part of the summer.

* Check air conditioning filters each month and replace them at least every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to work harder and use more electricity.

* For economy, set the air conditioner thermostat no lower than 78 degrees. Each degree below that adds to the cost.

* Use portable and ceiling fans whenever possible to help circulate air and reduce the amount of air conditioning required.

* Set thermostats at a higher temperature when away from home. The air conditioner won't cycle as often while you're out.

* Perform heavy housework chores in the cooler time of the day. This includes washing dishes, baking and laundry work, chores which create heat and moisture that put an extra strain on the air conditioner. Vent clothes dryers to the outside and use kitchen exhaust fans to get rid of excess heat.

* Block out direct sunlight as much as possible. Close curtains, shades and blinds to hold down the temperature inside the house. Consider light-colored rooms, outside wall material, drapes and solar screens that reflect the heat.

* Weather-strip doors and windows to prevent expensive air leaks. Make sure

all windows and doors are closed when the air conditioning unit is operating.

* The attic should be properly ventilated to prevent excess heat build-up which causes a cooling system to work harder.

* Insulation is very important and can pay for itself by lowering cooling costs by as much as 20 percent. Use insulation with a high "R" value. WTU energy experts suggest R-30 to R-38 for ceilings, R-16 for outside walls and R-19 for use under raised floors. Also, an 11.0 or higher Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio

(SEER) is preferred for air conditioning units and heat pumps.

* Air conditioning and heat pump equipment should be inspected and serviced each year to operate at maximum efficiency.

* If you have a fireplace, be sure the damper is tightly closed.

* Keep furniture and draperies away from air vents inside the house. Air should be allowed to flow freely throughout the home.

* Shrubby growing against the outside walls, as well as trees that shade the roof, act as a barrier against the sun and can reduce the amount of energy required to cool a home. However, keep shrubbery trimmed away from the outdoor compressor unit so that there is ample room for good air circulation.

These tips can help the homeowner make it through the upcoming "dog days of August" while using energy wisely around the house.
