It has been a long time since I have observed a man with white stains of dried perspiration bordering the suspenders of his overalls.

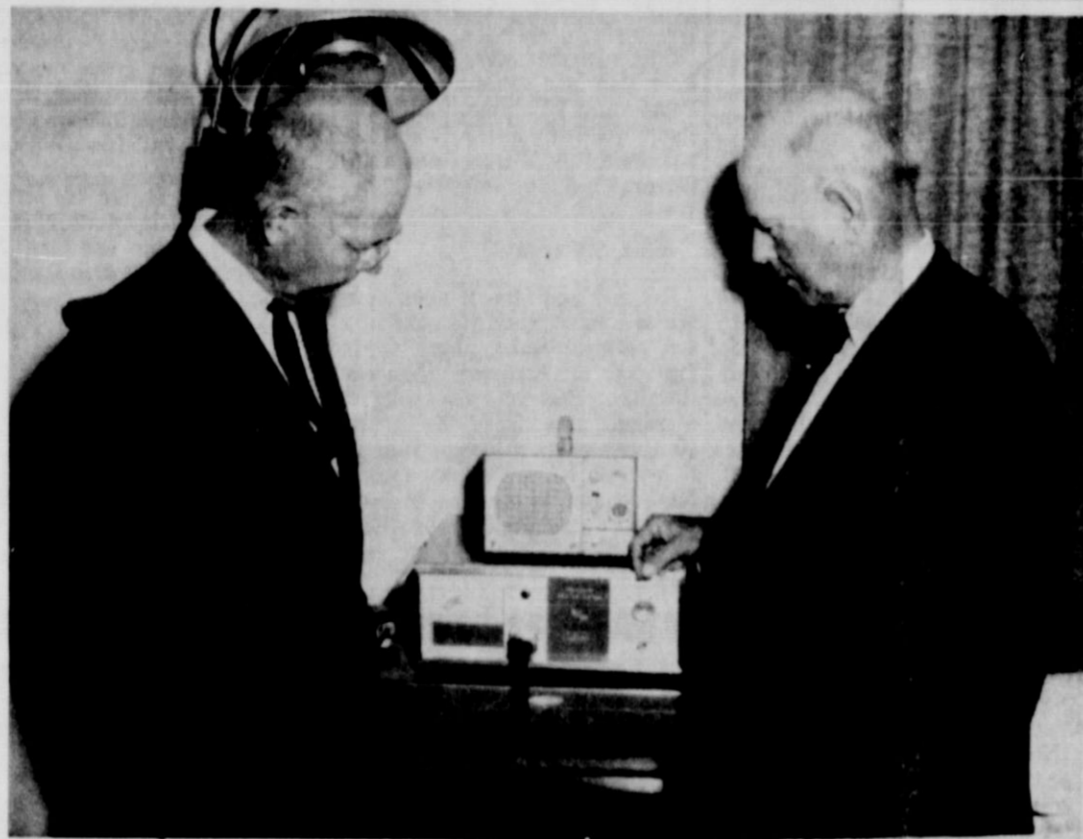

Singers To Meet

IN 1892 the Motley County Singing Convention was organized at the Whiteflat school house with the late W. J. Whitworth as president. It has met twice each year for 78 years.

The singers are going to meet again Sunday at the American Legion building starting at 10 a.m. and continuing until about 4 p.m. W. L. Craft of Roaring Springs is the current president and Mrs. Una Simpson of Northfield is the secretary.

In the early days the group met for two days (Saturday and Sunday) and the custom was continued for some time. Later it was changed to one day.

The Texas Almanac says Motley County had a total population of 139 when the census was taken in 1890. It was not known what the attendance was when the singing organization was formed, but it is assumed that much of the county's residents attended. The big event was "dinner on the ground" when people spread their food together, and visited.

Transportation in the pioneer days was buggies, wagons and horseback. The Motley County Singing Convention served as a social meeting place as well as place to enjoy the singing of gospel songs.

A number of years ago the convention accepted an invitation from the American Legion as a permanent meeting place, rather than meeting in the various county communities.

Challenge Made To Universities

SURPRISE announcement Tuesday night at the Matador Lions Club Ladies Night banquet held in the basement of the First Methodist Church, was the coveted Lion of the Year plaque to Lion Ronnie Christian. He believed he was a member of the

secret panel which selects the honor member.

It was an evening of excellent food (fried chicken) prepared and served by Methodist ladies, frivolity and the transition to the new administration which begins the civic club's fiscal year of 1970-71.

Lion Zone Chairman Jimmy Davidson of Quitaque conducted the ceremony in which new Boss Lion Wayland Moore assumed the club's leadership, with 11 other officers. In most instances places had been filled by re-electing present officers.

Kept in suspense during the evening was a group of new members and their wives seated at a special table. They expected some kind of initiation prank which is a tradition of the club, but there was only the suspense.

Topping the evening was an inspiring address by J. Fike Godfrey of Spur, immediate past president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He was introduced by Lion Bob Stanley, a member of the WTCC board of directors.

"Man has never found the perfect society," Mr. Godfrey declared, "but our system of government far exceeds all others and it is created to constantly correct flaws as we become aware of its imperfections."

"The basic principles allow man to enjoy the fruits of his work... liberty and justice are not free—they are bought and paid for... Americanism is a cause, not a word... the laws of our land must be respected and obeyed."

"Our capitalistic system allows each man to enjoy the fruits of his work and the government is supported through taxes from the wealth the people create... there is no Berlin wall or restricted zone in America, but every man is privileged to go where he pleases and do what he pleases."

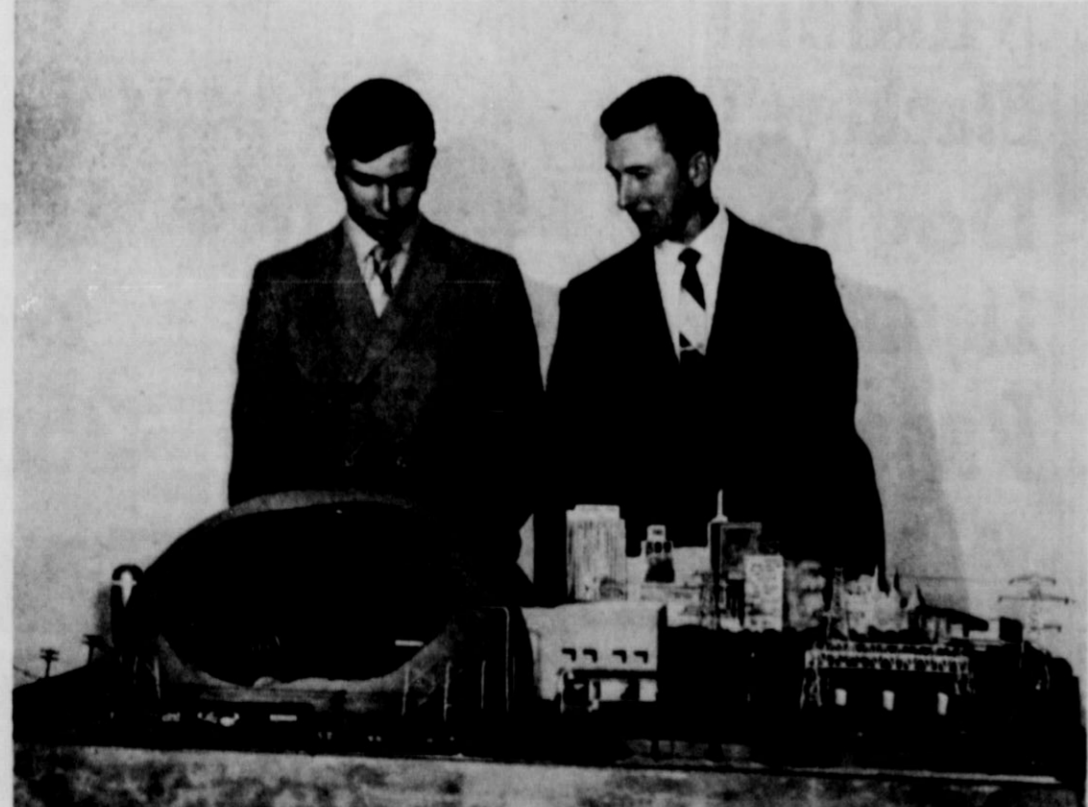
Challenge to Education — Mr. Godfrey declared that non-residents of Texas should pay actual cost of education and that it is not right that citizens should pay the difference in taxes.

He charged the university problem of unrest as having a serious effect on our young people. He blamed faculty and administration with many of the problems and said if universities are becoming too large, funds should be curtailed, faculties made more selective and students should be screened until control is restored.

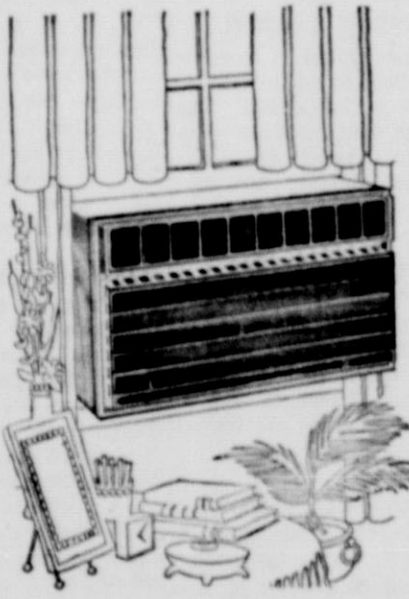

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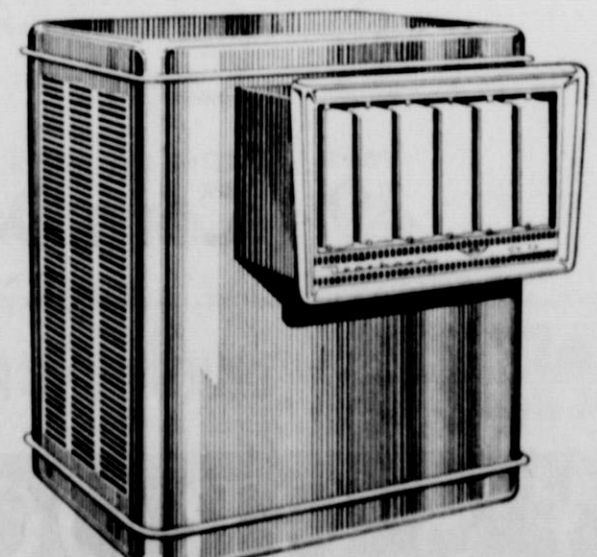

Weevil Control Plans Discussed

A coordinated effort is the key to halting the westward movement of the boll weevil, says County Agent Bill Pallmeyer. Ways and means to bring about this coordination were discussed at a recent meeting in Lubbock. Attending were county agents

from counties bordering the Caprock, both above and below, and from counties in the southern part of the South Plains.

Also present were officials of Plains Cotton Growers Inc., Texas Department of Agriculture, Plant Protection Division, Texas A&M Univ. Research & Extension Center at Lubbock, and Extension District 6 personnel from Ft. Stockton.

Most of the discussion centered around the diapause boll weevil control program which was initiated in the fall of 1964 and which has been conducted each fall since then. A lack of funds the past two years has hampered the program, but it is hoped this will not be the case this fall. Actually, available funds in 1968 and 1969 were spread too thin by trying to halt the outbreak of weevils in counties outside the control zone, thus the control program was not as effective as in the first three years of the program.

The need to keep officials of the Plant Protection Division in Lubbock informed of detection of weevils or weevil damage is essentially critical, emphasizes

cers in the county to check their cotton closely at regular intervals during the season and to report any findings to his office.

Pheromone traps will be used, but mainly in the newly infested area to the southwest. As in past years, survey teams will be working throughout the control zone and in neighboring areas to keep a close check on the weevil situation.

Twenty-three survey teams of two will spring into action about July 15. When weevils or weevil damage is detected, a white flag will be placed at the point of detection in the field. If weevil infestations are heavy at these locations, an in-season spray program may be necessary.

If weevil infestations are found in cotton fields above the Caprock early in the season, producers will be urged to carry out a limited spot treatment spray program. In some cases this procedure may also be profitable under the Caprock as this method of treatment has proved successful in preventing the spread of weevils before the period of peak weevil movement which is usually about mid-August. Spot treatment also has less harmful effects on the beneficial insect populations in the field. Carbarbyl (Sevin) is one of the safest materials to use for spot treatments with a ground spray rig.

If all goes according to plan, the diapause spray program will get underway about Sept. 1, adds Pallmeyer. Farmers should sign a permit with the Texas Department of Agriculture before this time, and these can be obtained at the county agent's office.
