II Cor. 3:17. God grant that their labor of love and sacrifice will not be in vain. As the book is told in "first person." Mrs. Pohi gave her review as such, making Dale Evans' great enthusiasm for freedom ever more mindful to the audience.

In continuing the introduction, she said, "I want to be a part of the answer. I want to keep Old Glory flying high; I want to keep aflame the touch of freedom.
