Motley Downs Owls; District To Open

The Motley Matadors contained the Silverton Owls 22-6 in a non-district game here Friday night and will open conference play tomorrow night at 8, when they host the Valley Patriots on Burleson Field.

The Matadors scored first with halfback Craig Christian going over for 6, and Joe Campbell adding the extras, for a score of 7-0. The lead was short lived with the Owls coming back and scoring, which narrowed the score 7 to 6, the try for extras failing.

The second quarter was marked by the scoring and

running of halfback Craig Christian, who rushed for 107 total yards and added another touchdown. With Joe Campbell adding the extras the score became 14-6.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but both continued to move the ball well.

A pass from quarterback Harold Dempsey to end Jerry Lee with one second remaining, highlighted the fourth quarter and added another touchdown. With Joe Campbell running for the extras, the game ended with the Matadors on top 22-6.

Matadors Face Crucial Game

The Motley Matadors face the Valley Patriots in a crucial district play opener here Friday at 8:00 on Burleson Field.

The Patriots are undefeated in two games this season, and have not been scored on in either game. The Matadors will open district play with a 2-1 record.

The Matadors lost their first game with Paducah, 27-6 then won their next two games - 18-12 over Chillicothe and 22-6 over Silverton.

Tomorrow's game will be the stiffest competition the Matadors have faced this year, and everyone is urged to come out and support the team.

Local merchants and many individuals are boosting the Motley Matadors and their coaches in a page advertisement in the Tribune, and on the football programs, sponsored by the Matador Lions Club.

Jameson Is Runnerup For Lady Bird Johnson Award

Clay Jameson of Matador won the second-place \$500.00 Lady Bird Johnson award for highway beautification, Thursday at Stonewall.

First place, \$1,000 award winner was Dwain Rogers of Anson.

Both winners are maintenance construction supervisors for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Mrs. Johnson presented the awards at a luncheon at the LBJ State Park before a large audience of departmental officials and beautification specialists, 24 other district nominees, press representatives and other invited guests.

Rogers received an attractive, bluebonnet-embellished award plaque and Mrs. Johnson's personal check for \$1,000. Jameson, as second place winner, received a hand-lettered certificate and Mrs. Johnson's check for \$500.

Four other finalists also

received certificates signed by Mrs. Johnson. They were Grady James of Fort Worth, J.C. Larison of Gainesville, Wayne Rust of Mount Pleasant, and Rufus Jones of Fredericksburg. The finalists were selected by department administrative officers from 25 nominees, one from each highway district. The finalists and their wives were honored as special guests at the luncheon.

Department maintenance supervisors are responsible for taking care of all state-maintained highway facilities in their areas. In addition to more than 71,000 miles of highways, these facilities include the road-shoulders and the 1,100 roadside parks, safety rest areas and scenic turnouts on the Texas highway system.

Jameson has been supervisor of maintenance in Matador since 1969, and is responsible for highways in Motley County and the southern part of Hall County. He began his career with the department in 1957.

After attending the luncheon, Mr. and Mrs. Jameson drove to San Marcos, where they visited Mr. and Mrs. Dick Carpenter, former residents of Roaring Springs and Matador, and attended the 6th Annual Republic of Texas Chilympiad, Friday.

Scale is being found on many ornamental plants in Motley County, resulting in death or unsightly appearance, says Extension Agent Bill Pallemyer.

This small insect is white and may look like fuzz on the plants, found mainly on the leaves, but also appearing on the stems. They suck the sap from the plant which results in bad appearance or death.

Materials that may be used to control this insect are: Malathion, Dormant-oils, Dimethoate or Diazinon. Be sure to follow mixing instructions on the label and follow other instructions. Two or more applications at a two-week interval may be required for control.

Project Identification: A new water supply system for the City of Matador which includes a minimum of two water supply wells, two above ground steel tanks and approximately 7.4 miles of underground water pipeline.

Statement of Intent: The City of Matador, Matador, Texas does not intend to file an Environmental Impact Statement respecting this project.

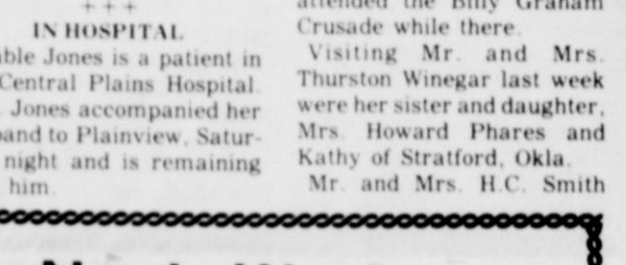
