Plants Are Found Killed By Scale

Scale is being found on many ornamental plants in Motley County, resulting in death or unsightly appearance says Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

This small insect is white and may look like fuzz on the plants, found mainly on the leaves, but also appearing on the stems. They suck the sap from the plant which results in bad appearance or death. Materials that may be used to control this insect are: Malathion, Dormant-oils, Dimethoate or Diazinon. Be sure to follow mixing instructions on the label and follow other instructions. Two or more applications at a two-week interval may be

required for control.

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
