

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

Results obtained from the cotton variety test that was carried out by Frank Montgomery probably can't be used as a guide, as the hail on Aug. 30th damaged the varieties on the north part of the plot more than those in the middle and south part. Only 4.60" of moisture was received prior to the hail. The 4 acre tracts were fertilized with 70 lbs. of anhydrous ammonia per acre, planted on June 18, and mechanically harvested on Nov. 25th. Seed were furnished by the breeders, and complete information on the test can be obtained from ginners, seed dealers, or myself. In order of net return per acre, the results were as follows: Paymaster III, Locket 88A, Rilcot 90, De-Kalb 302, Lankart 57, Parrott, Western Stormproof, Antone 99 and Qualla 10. .
