OVER THREE SCORE YEARS ago a young Scotsman dreamed of becoming a cowboy on the Matador Ranch and visiting Matador. He read regularly in Scottish newspapers of the annual stockholders meeting of the Matador Land & Cattle Co. in Dundee. He first believed the ranch was located in the Argentine but later learned it was in Texas.

Shortly after the turn of the century Charles Low left Scotland and came to the United States. He planned to come to Canada where 160 acres of land might be had for homesteading, but landed in Detroit, which is still his home.

Charles Low, who will return to Scotland next year to celebrate his 80th birthday, visited Matador Saturday. It was the realization of a dream.

It was inevitable that he should meet a fellow countryman, D. I. W. Birnie of Matador, who was born and reared in Scotland. The two were born in the same county, Angus, in Scotland. They had not met until Saturday, but Mr. Low knew of Mr. Birnie's late and prominent father, Mr. Birnie has returned since he left Scotland 40 years ago. Mr. Low has returned several times.

Charles Low's son is the 9th to receive the name Charles. For many years the Charles Low clocks were the standard of quality and many of the hand-some clocks are still in service all over the world.

Mr. Low, after 20 months near the Arctic Circle as a storekeeper, became associated in the lumber business and spent his life in the work. Matador Matadors copped first place in the Paducah tournament last week end by smashing the Paducah Dragons, 64-41.

On the preceding Thursday the Matadors, rolled by Guthrie, 63-41, to advance to the semi-finals. Saturday afternoon the Matadors squeaked by Crowell 50-49 in a really nerve-wracking finish. From there they moved to the finals that night when they defeated Paducah, Tim Green was named to the all tournament team.

In the Guthrie game Matador held a 28-20 halftime lead but increased it in the final period to the game ending 22 point victory.

The Crowell game was probably the highlight of the entire tournament. It was "nip and tuck" all the way. With less than 10 seconds remaining Mike Bird, a hot Crowell shooter, arched the ball through the goal to make the score, 49-49.

The Matadors rapidly moved the ball down court where Richard Campbell was fouled in the act of shooting. With 0 seconds remaining in the game, he missed the first shot but popped the net on his last shot and the Matadors won 50-49.

The Paducah game was fairly close until the final quarter when the Matadors couldn't miss, even standing on their heads. They easily took the game by the score of 64-41.

"Matador, the top Class B team in the area, placed three players on the first eleven, while Ropesville, the only regional champion in this class, had two. Sundown, the 2-B champ, also had a couple of players on the team and Bovina, the 1-B king, got one."

Two of the players backs Richard Campbell of Matador and Sammy Crosson of Wilson, are on the squad for the second year in a row.

"Campbell, the 210-pound bruising fullback was on the All-South Plains Dream team, representing players from all classes, last year as a junior.

MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that after due publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its Regular Session in 1965 for the passage of an Act creating a Hospital District over Motley County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:

AN ACT authorizing creation of a county-wide hospital district in MOTLEY COUNTY, to be known as MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT; providing for an election in Motley County to create a county-wide hospital district and making certain findings in connection with the establishment of the District; providing for the levy of a tax for the District for the purpose of

maintaining and operating the District, paying any bonds issued by the District; providing for the issuance of bonds by the District for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes and for any and all such purposes and for refunding bonds and prescribing limitations on such power; providing that the District may execute an operating or management contract under certain terms and conditions and that the District may lease all or part of the hospital facilities under certain conditions; providing bonds issued or assumed by a District shall be lawful investments and collateral for certain funds; providing for the selection of a governing body of such hospital district and tenure of office and powers and duties of such governing body in carrying out the provisions of the Act, prescribing a procedure for the adoption of a budget, the selection of a depository and the power of eminent domain which power is conferred upon the District; prescribing a fiscal year; withdrawing authority for the sale of bonds for hospital purposes by a city located within the District established or the County, prohibiting the levy of taxes by a city for hospital purposes and restricting the powers of Motley County wherein the District is established to levy taxes for the care of indigents under certain circumstances; providing severability; and declaring an emergency.
