Area TV Service Has 3 Networks

Improved television reception reaching to Whiteflat, Flomot and as far north as Northfield, and to all communities south, including Roaring Springs, Afton, DeMont and Dickens areas is assured through the acquisition of the former Settiff tower west of Matador by the Matador Translator TV Service.

Extension improvements have been made in the tower to bring in Channels 11 and 13 in Lubbock and 7 from Lawton, Oklahoma, giving customers the three major networks. The cost per subscriber is only \$3 plus 6c tax per month.

The Matador Translator TV Service represents entirely new ownership and management of the former Settiff TV Service, according to John Barnhill, executive vice-president of the First State Bank.

"The new owners," he declared, "have spent an impressive amount of money to improve and change the equipment. The purpose is to provide an extremely large area with the best possible television reception. The bank is interested in enterprise as a civic service to farmers and ranchers, as well as urban customers."

Translator set owners are asked to report reception they are now receiving to the Matador Translator TV Service, in care of the First State Bank, Matador.

With the new television programs starting and the election scheduled in November, it is believed set owners will appreciate the improvement.

Johnson Winner in Straw Ballot Here

IF "straws" in the wind are any indication, Matador voters are more than willing to keep a Texan in the Whitehouse. The "election" was conducted last week by Spot Cash Grocery Melvin Meason, manager of the store said he did not vote. He said, however, that he "watched voters like a hawk" to make sure there was no "ballot stuffing" during the straw voting.

Johnson led his GOP opponent Barry Goldwater by almost 2 to 1. Johnson received 89 "votes" and Goldwater 45.

Impartial and "unquestionable" judges were asked to unhook the box, and count the votes Saturday afternoon. "Voters had a choice of two ballots. One ballot read (in longhand) "Johnson" and the other "Goldwater." The voters merely dropped one of the slips in the ballot box on a counter near the store's cash register.

Meason said in previous "straw voting" he has conducted, the percentage has been almost exactly that of the Matador box, largest voting precinct in Motley County, usually polling more than half of the votes.

Motley County is by no means a solid Democratic county. In previous years it has "gone Republican." It will be interesting in 60 days to compare the "Spot Cash Election" percentage with the actual voting.

City "Fogged" For Mosquitoes

Not many residents were aware Friday night that Matador was under "attack" to destroy mosquitoes that may have survived the drought. A fogging machine in the back of a pickup truck under the direction of the American Chemical Co. of Wichita Falls, covered every street and alley.

Colonial Design
Colonial architecture is featured in the general design of the exterior. The building covers 12,000 feet of floor space, and among other features, are sound-proof walls, and separate offices for the various needs.

The private arrangements office, the insurance office and the business office are all separate and distinct, and business in any office may be conducted and completed without fear of intrusion of other business. The building is air-conditioned throughout, and is equipped with an intercommunication system.

The chapel lends itself to use as a wedding chapel although in perfect taste for holding funerals. The first activity of the building, even before it was quite complete, was a wedding in rich mahogany wood, and lights are adjustable to provide just the right amount of illumination. A total of 294 persons may be seated on the Appalachian red oak pews and the family room, just off the chapel proper, can be used for up to 40 persons.

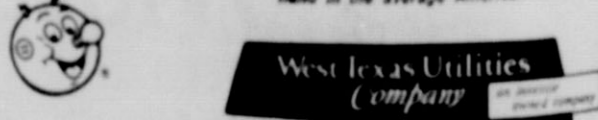

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Further concerning cotton spraying for diapause boll weevil control. From the standpoint of residues, malathion is one of the safest for humans, farm animals, wildlife and crops, yet deadly to the boll weevil. Housewives and gardeners have used malathion for several years. The chemical to be used is undiluted, technical per acre. By using this material, form, applied at the rate of 12 oz. cost of the program will be greatly reduced.

Fields in the control zone will be sprayed three or four times, depending on climatic condi-

tion and whether the farmer defoliates or not. Only cotton acreage will be sprayed, and producers will be notified before spraying is done. Farmers may have to apply controls of their own to help protect the crop this fall, as this program is to reduce the number of boll weevils going into hibernation and emerging to damage crops in 1965. 100% cooperation will result in reduction of emerging weevils by 90 to 95%. The program will go into effect by Tuesday, September 15.

Boys and girls who plan to feed steers or heifers for the 1965 show are reminded that now is the time to make arrangements for obtaining the calves, if they have not already done so. Many of the better calves will be delivered before long.

I have had a few inquiries on bamboo, which varies in size from 10" to 100" at maturity. Many types require several years to become well established, but when they do, they are among the most rapid growing plants in the world.

Running plants produce rhizomes which creep underground before they rise to another vertical stem. Many species produce thickets, and will cover an acre unless controlled. Clump bamboo confine themselves to small areas, since they make little horizontal growth. This type is not as winter hardy as the running type.

Pygmy bamboo is one of the smallest types, and Timber bamboo is one of the largest. Both require heavy waterings at 7 to 10 day intervals. For additional information, ask to see a leaflet I have recently received.
