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Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cullin Begin Publication Of The Wilson Reporter

A former Matador couple, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cullin of Lubbock, have begun publication of The Wilson Reporter, with Volume 1, Issue 1, dated June 24. Mrs. Cullin is the former Charlotte Campbell. Parents of both are Matador residents, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Campbell Jr., and Mr. and Mrs. George Cullin.

The newspaper is being edited during the couple's "spare time" Mr. Cullin is employed at the Lubbock Avalanche, and his wife, in addition to her home work, is attending classes at Texas Technological College. Although Charlotte describes their initial effort as "... full of boobos and bad taste," it nevertheless contains news of the Wilson community, some 50 miles from Lubbock, and gives promise of advancement, if the "Statement of Policy" is any indication.

Charlotte, who did a column for the Tribune during her school life, has a corner of her own in the Reporter. Following is her version of their newest venture:

Being the publisher's wife is a lucrative business when your foremost aim in life is to get something published. Mr. C. has told me that this space is all mine, every week... without pay. That's the dig. But I still get a thrill when I see my name in print.
I am known around the Cullin castle as Charise and Charyn's mother. On the block I'm known as "The woman-with-That-Dog," at Texas Tech, where I am a

student, they say "This is Richard Campbell's sister. You know that football player from Matador?" Sure they know him. In Matador I'm known as Jr. Campbell's daughter. In McLean, it's Carol Allison's sister, or "Yawl remember Charlie who owned the McLean News a few years back. This is his wife." You see why I get so excited just seeing my byline on this column? I'm the only one who knows my name!

My journalism career was inspired by that rare newspaperman perfectionist, Douglas Meador of the Matador Tribune. I sweated and swore under his nose news for two years. At the end of that time I had four fan letters, a lot of experience writing, no money saved, and an undying love for the world of the weekly newspaper. And then, in spite of Mrs. Meador's advice I married a newspaperman. I still have those four fan letters, experience, no money, and the love for the weeklies. That's it. The rewards in this business are far from financial. One can live on love alone.

About the boss: Charles, as I call him (Charlie sounds like the kind of horse you get in the leg, and Chubby, which is his childhood nickname, sounds like a childhood nickname) was born in Lubbock. Then his parents, the George Cullins, moved to Memphis, Tex. to rear their family. He has a brother, Ray, who went West to seek his fortune. Ray is already wearing out. Charles sold his newspapers to invest in a magazine. You have never heard of the magazine, because it was never published.

Why we support a Hospital District!

These are changing times and the people who live in smaller communities are faced with grave problems to retain protection for themselves and their families. Nowhere has the change been any greater than in the medical profession. For more than 70 years Matley County has had the services of from one to five doctors. They were general practitioners who usually called at homes. They were capable, dedicated men who served this area with skill and pride in their profession. Most of us over 40 years of age were born in the homes of our parents, with the services of a good doctor.

We accepted with a greater feeling of security, the hospitals that serve our area. We are grateful for them and the capable doctors who head them. We wish very much that we could retain the present situation. If we vote a Motley County Hospital District, it is because we are preparing for an eventuality when retirement or other causes may leave us without medical protection.

We much prefer that private investment own and maintain hospital facilities. We know, however, that doctors are reluctant to come to smaller communities unless they have some assurance that they will be successful, and that they would prefer not to have the responsibility of a hospital. We do not blame the doctors. They have spent long, expensive years learning a great profession. They have every right to secure the most possible returns from their productive years.

On the other hand, we want available hospital service for our families. If we are old, we know that we will need a doctor's service more frequently and if we are young and have children, we need a doctor's protection more desperately. We are not certain a hospital district will bring us security, but it is all we know to do as we meet the problem. Certainly it will aid our chances in the future.

Some contend that hospital districts are failures. This is true in some cases and it is also true that many private businesses fail. Many small hospital districts have been entirely successful.

The problem is a serious one and concerns everyone who has children or grandchildren. It concerns young and old who have homes in the area. It concerns the future security of those nearest to us and their progeny.

A hospital district will cost in taxes, but it can return more value than you have ever received for a tax dollar.

Here is an example: If for instance, you have a \$15,000 county valuation, you are now paying \$171.00 county taxes. At the estimated 30c per \$100 valuation, you would pay an additional \$45 in taxes.

If you have a \$2000.00 county valuation, your present taxes are \$22.80 and the estimated 30c cost of the hospital district would add \$6 to your present county taxes.

If you have a \$100,000 county valuation, you are presently paying \$1,140 in county taxes and the district would increase your cost \$300.

The estimated 30c tax would raise over \$24,000 per year.
