R. L. Anderson Rites are Held

Funeral services for Raleigh L. Anderson, 88, were held at 3 p.m. Sunday at the First Methodist Church.

Rev. Wilbur Gaede, pastor, and Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister officiated. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Mr. Anderson died of a heart attack Thursday afternoon in Fort Worth at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Jessie Spencer, with whom he and his wife had been visiting the past three weeks.

A retired farmer, Mr. Anderson had made his home in Matador the past five years, moving here from the Flomot community which had been his home since 1924.

He was born in Hood County, Texas December 16, 1875 and died August 28, 1964 at the age of 88 years, 8 months, 12 days.

He was married to Miss Bertha May Loving at Desdemona, Texas on December 23, 1910, and they came to Motley County in 1917 from the Margaret community near Crowell. He had been a member of the Baptist denomination since early manhood.

Survivors include his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Deola Caddell and Mrs. Jessie Spencer (Lons), both of Fort Worth, and Mrs. E. B. Jenkins (Donnie) of Matador; a son, Denver Anderson, Quitaque; two brothers, A. L. Anderson, San Diego, Calif., and J. F. Anderson, Cordell, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. May Smith, Carlbad, N. M., and Mrs. Cora Sparks, Abilene; four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Fight Started On Mosquitoes

Despite the prolonged dry summer, Matador has mosquitoes and a fight has been started under the auspices of the Matador Lions Club to bring the mosquito under control before the town has a case of encephalitis.

Lions Lill Palmeyer and Jerry Noles have already started a movement to secure spraying equipment to destroy the germ-carrying insect.

Lion Palmeyer advises all users of evaporative air coolers to spray carefully, to kill out mosquitoes. He said irrigated flower beds and grasses also provide breeding places for the insect.

Creek Being Cleared
As an extension of the Lions Cleanup drive, brush and trees are being cleared out of Hackberry Branch of Ballard Creek, which includes the City Park area. Use of heavy equipment was started Tuesday and will include raking trees and brush to prepare for burning.

The "water holes" at Main Street bridge over the creek will be filled as a further precaution against mosquito breeding grounds, according to an announcement by Boss Lion Freddie Welling.

Shooting hours are from 12 noon until sunset. Hunters are warned that all migratory birds dressed immediately after shooting, must have left one fully feathered wing.

The requirement applies from the point of shooting to the personal residence of the hunter. After reaching his home the hunter may remove the feathered wing, Noles said.

1st Bale Ginned

First bale of 1964 cotton produced in Motley County was ginned Friday, (Aug. 28) by the H&H Gin Inc. of Flomot. The cotton was grown by C. A. Matney of Whiteflat.

The 2200 lbs of snaps yielded 570 lbs of lint cotton and 850 pounds of cottonseed.

The first bale was ginned and wrapped free by the H&H Gin and then purchased at 40c per pound. The cotton seed were purchased at \$50 per ton.

Merchants and business firms in Matador and Flomot contributed to a prize for the first bale of the 1964 season.

A check of Tribune files shows that the first bale of 1963 was ginned at Roaring Springs on August 26, from cotton grown by J. T. Swim Jr.

Weevil Spraying To Start Soon

Time is running out for signing permits to have cotton sprayed for the diapause boll weevil control program, with only a few Motley County producers still not signed up.

The program will go into effect by Sept. 15th, according to County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

"If you haven't signed a permit, contact one of the community committees, County Agent, ASIS office, bank or gin and sign immediately," he urged.

"One unsprayed weevil infested cotton field can provide a reinfestation site for a large area next year. Don't let your field be the reinfestation area."

Malathion, one of the safest chemicals available, yet effective and low in cost, will be used, Palmeyer pointed out.

Miss Hankins first heard Mr. Nobel speak while attending a seminar on Communism held in Huntsville this summer. Mr. Nobel clearly describes the conditions under which he lived while a prisoner in East Germany and Russia. Since his release, Mr. Nobel has traveled over the globe speaking free of charge to school children on the evils of communism.

SAM ROSS, prominent Flomot farmer Thursday afternoon was re-elected as President of the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association, in the brief business session that followed the equally brief program at Roaring Springs Pioneer Park.

The vote was unanimous on recommendation of the nominating committee.

Harley Ragland was named vice-president and Corby Lee (Corky) Marshall was re-elected secretary-treasurer. Directors

re-elected are: Johnny Koonsman, Lewis Bostick, Hal Courtney, Johnny Stevens and Con Davis. Only Ragland and Davis are new to the board. They replace S. J. Braselton and Maurice Goodwin.

The 41st annual reunion of the organization started a few minutes behind schedule time of 10 a.m. Thursday morning, with 176 horses in the parade.

Judges selected Deward (Pete) Knight as the most typical old time cowboy riding in the parade, and Mrs. Richard Martin as the most typical senior cow girl.

Bill Smith of Spur was named the most typical cowboy and Kay Russell was selected as the most typical cow girl. Most typical Junior cowboy was Kenneth Ragland and typical junior cow girl was Jane Briscoe. G. B. Ragland's (Dickens County) float was the only entry and received the blue ribbon.

Change Is Cited
Motley County Judge Elbert Reeves made the memorial address at 11 a.m., and pointed to the thinning ranks of pioneers.

He cited the large number of deceased from both Motley and Dickens Counties during the past year. He said greater changes had been made in the past 25 years than in all the former years of recorded history.

"Recently," Judge Reeves said, "a teacher asked a class of young students to describe a horse collar. The children found it impossible.

"Yet, a quarter of a century ago every child in the class could have described a horse collar."

He pointed out the rich heritage left to West Texas by its pioneers and said: "We have a different type of people here because the spirit of the old settlers has continued to live on in the second, third and fourth generation. . . we can not pay sufficient tribute to those who blazed the trails into this land. . . the pioneers."

Roaring Springs Mayor S. J. Braselton made a brief welcoming address to which he added: "Welcome home to the 42nd annual reunion. Motley and Dickens Counties Old Settlers."

Cotton John Speaks
"Cotton John" Smith, prominent announcer on Amarillo's KGNC radio and television, was introduced. It was the 13th year in which he had attended Old Settlers'.

It outranks all other celebrations in West Texas," "Cotton John" declared. "It is the best of the old timers' organizations. The pioneers of this area have left their imprint on West Texas."

Following the brief talk, he began making tape recordings of the program and conversations with pioneers, to be used later on his radio broadcasts.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

CARE URGED AFTER USE OF FERTILIZER

Following the application of fertilizer to pasture grasses and forage sorghums, several precautions should be observed to avoid possibilities of nitrate poisoning of livestock. First, remove cattle from the area to be fertilized. Pick up any spilled material to prevent spots of unusually high concentration. Remove bags from the field, as cattle sometimes will be attracted by them. Second, keep livestock off areas for one week after fertilization and irrigation.

If forage is particularly succulent, it is a good idea not to graze before 10 a.m., since nitrate accumulates in the plant at night and does not change to protein forms until sufficient light has been received.

Drought may cause nitrate accumulation under conditions where leaves wilt or roll during the day, but take sufficient water during the night to regain vigor. Grazing of plants in drought stress should therefore

proceed with caution. Nitrate accumulation in plants may occur under certain conditions on soils that have not been recently fertilized.

I have a material that may be placed on plants to determine if they are safe to graze. If you would like this test made, let me know. Three fields have been tested lately, and no accumulation of nitrate showed to be present. No losses on these fields have been reported.

MARKETING HOGS

Before hauling hogs to market, consider the following items. A load of hogs in transit has little chance to cool off. By avoiding excitement and overheating while loading and sorting ahead of time, excessive shrink and transit deaths can be reduced. Also, cover the trailer or bed of truck with a tarp if animals are to be hauled more than a few miles. Remove straw bedding and substitute sand or sawdust, wetting it if the temperature is above 75 degrees. Sprinkle ani-

mals after they are loaded and check load often to see that hogs aren't getting too hot. Finally, keep moving, stopping only when necessary, and then park in the shade.

Remember, when you get hot, you can roll up your shirt sleeves, get into a breeze or shade and take a drink of water. A load of hogs in transit can't take advantage of these simple procedures.

WHEAT INCOME INCREASED

Work by the Agricultural Experiment Stations is helping to increase the income of wheat farmers. Crockett, Tascosa and Caddo wheat have produced an average test weight ranging from 2 to 4 pounds per bu. greater than varieties grown 10 to 20 years ago. This means \$3 additional return for each 100 bu. These varieties have also proved desirable due to their non-shattering characteristic. Tascosa has repeatedly withstood severe hail storms with less damage than other commercial varieties.

4-H CLUB WORK OFFERS VARIETY OF PROJECTS

4-H Club meetings will start again in September. This a voluntary organization of boys and girls who will be 9 or older before Jan. 1, 1965, who are interested in learning more about agriculture or home economics. Many other subjects, such as

For The People

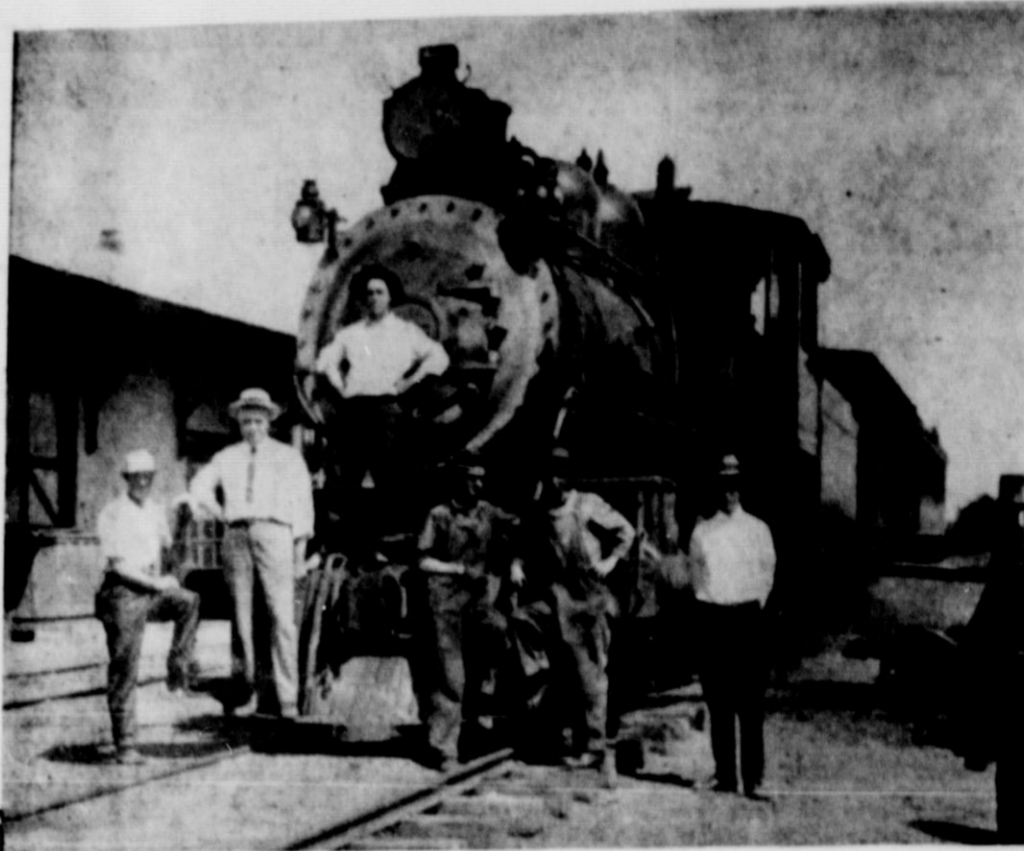
IT IS NOT surprising to hear from the banks of the Potomac that "some Texas Congressmen are upset" by efforts of Lt. Gov. Preston Smith to assure the people of Texas the best possible Congressional representation under the latest redistricting edict of the U. S. Supreme Court.

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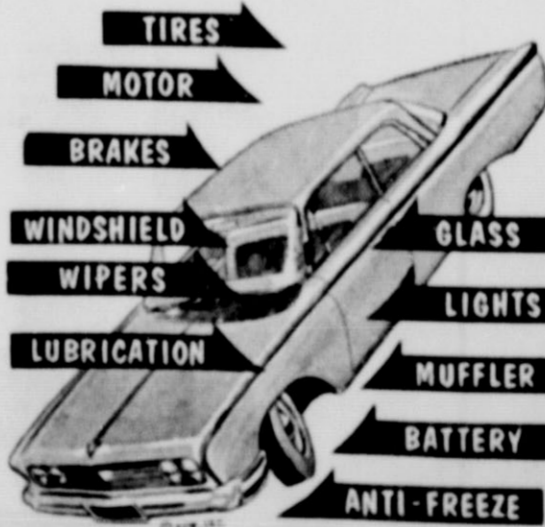

If an employee's yearly wage amounts to \$150 or more or if he works on 20 or more days during the year on a time basis, the farmer is required by law to report the worker's earnings for social security purposes.
Farmers who hire a crew leader to furnish and pay a crew of workers on his farm, should re-

member to keep a record of the crew leader's permanent address, name, and employer identification number.

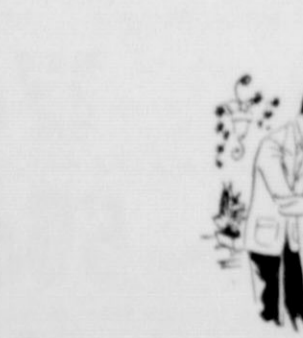
