Turkey Shoot Saturday

A turkey shoot will be held Saturday, Oct. 30, starting at 1:30 p.m. in the Rifle Range (old bakery building) in Matador, according to an announcement by the Sharpshooters Rifle Club (NRA Affiliated), sponsors of the Motley County Junior Rifle Club.

Turkeys will be awarded for high score, lucky shot and Chinese Puzzle shots, it was announced by President Jesse Perkins. There will be divisions for men, women, high school students and grade school students in the high score contests.

Tickets are currently being sold at \$1.00 each, for a 12 gauge pump shotgun. The winner does not have to be present to win the shotgun, but a turkey will also be given at the shoot, with the winner required to be present.

"Only 22 cal. rifles without telescopic sights can be used," Perkins said. "Bring your own, or use one furnished by the Rifle Club."

Preceding the program however, W. F. (Bill) McCaghren, President of the Ex-students and Ex-Teachers Association presided at a business session for the election of new officers, and recognition of a new Homecoming Queen; the person who traveled the farthest to attend, and the earliest teacher.

Invocation was given by J. E. (Jake) Edwards, and the president extended a brief welcome to the assembly. Memorial eulogy by Forrest Campbell honored the deceased since last year, and a report of the nominating

committee was made by Mrs. Mike Hoyle (Virginia Edmondson).

Donna Williams Nelson of McMinnville, Oregon traveled the farthest (2000 miles, plus) to attend Homecoming. Mrs. John Hamilton (Josephine Moore), class of 1926 was elected Homecoming Queen, and Mr. McCaghren, also of the class of 1926, was elected Homecoming King, the first time since 1962, when Bundy Campbell was elected King.

Also recognized and presented with a corsage was Tribune publisher Lila (Mrs. Douglas) Meador, for support and publicity given the Ex-Student-Teachers Association.

Mrs. R. E. Donovan (Hazel Walton) was presented a gift of appreciation from President McCaghren for her long and efficient tenure as secretary of the association.

The new slate of officers was as follows: Debbie Smallwood Haralson, President; Larry Bostick, Vice-President and Hazel Donovan, Secretary-treasurer. Hold-over directors are Kate Thompson Hurt, Carolyn Thrasher Rose, Earlyne Jameson, and Bill McCaghren. New directors are Debra Garrison Scott, Kenneth Thompson, Jesse Perkins and Gale Stafford.

J. M. (Sonny) Russell narrated the program which revealed events from early school days to the present. Vivian Estes Jacobs sang "Try To Remember," as the theme for this year's Homecoming. Various skits depicted the decades from 1911 when the first class graduated from the old brick school building, and a more detailed report of the program will follow in a subsequent issue of the Tribune.

The Motley County Matadors raised their 1976 district record to 4-1 with their Homecoming victory over the Valley Patriots Friday night on Burleson Field. The game ended with the score of 19-0. Friday night's game was the last home game of the 1976 season.

Before the action started, football captains Craig Christian, Pat Smith, Micky Hurt and Louis Shorter crowned Dana Dillard as Football Sweetheart and presented her with a bouquet of roses. Dana is involved in many school activities and is now serving as President of the Pep Club. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bennie D. Dillard of Roaring Springs.

The fans received a nice surprise during Halftime activities when the cheer-

leaders presented a ponpon routine and the entire pep club presented a drill in recognition of the Homecoming executive committee, who were all called onto the football field, introduced and commended for their fine

work in making this Homecoming a success.

Also, Mrs. John Smith of Dumont was announced as winner of the C. B. Radio which was given away during halftime by the V.F.W. members.

An 103-yard return of an intercepted pass by Grant Johnson provided all the points necessary for the Motley County Matadors to blank the Valley Patriots.

Johnson's theft in the opening quarter turned a possible Patriot score into a solid 6 points for the hosts and started the Matadors

toward their seventh win of the season against only one loss.

The Matadors rode 318 rushing yards to the win. Valley's ground attack accounted for 199 yards as its record dropped to 4-4.

Motley County increased its lead in the second quarter when Jerry Lee broke free at the Valley 48-yard line. Mickey Hurt added the point after.

Later in the same period, Louis Shorter scored from 2 yards out to finish the game's scoring.

Lee led the Matadors ground attack, gaining 143 yards. Teammate Craig Christian added 105 yards.

Motley will travel to Happy Friday night to meet the Happy Cowboys in their last district game of the season. Game time will be at 7:30.

Summary

DOMESTIC POLICY

ABORTION: Opposes abortion and euthanasia.

AGRICULTURE: Return farming to the free enterprise system by a phased withdrawal of government interventions.

BUSINESS: Stop government harassment of legitimate business operations by abolishing unnecessary regulatory agencies and bureaus; get the government out of all commercial enterprises; make metric conversion entirely voluntary.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT: Restore the death penalty for crimes of violence and for treason.

CONSUMER PROTECTION: Government should be limited to safeguarding against health hazards and fraud; let the buyers make their own choices.

CRIME: Tighten paroles; limit discretionary sentencing; keep the federal government out of local police affairs; no furloughs for felons; no plea bargaining.

CHILD CARE: No federal day care centers; no child advocates.

DRUG ABUSE: Stiffer penalties on suppliers and pushers.

EDUCATION: Remove the federal government entirely from interference with local schools; end forced busing.

ELECTIONS: No federal funding of candidates or parties.

ENERGY POLICY: Remove price controls on oil and gas; encourage private development of nuclear and solar power.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION: All regulations pertaining to protection of the environment must be enactments of state legislatures, not fiat of a federal bureau.

EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT: Oppose or repeal ratification.

EXECUTIVE ORDERS: Repeal authority for executive or bureaucratic edicts.

FEDERAL JUDICIARY: Impose Congressional curbs on the jurisdiction of federal courts.

The American Party should not be confused with the American Independent Party.

The American Party was originally called "The American Independent Party" in the early 1960s. George Wallace ran for president in 1964 as its presidential candidate. In 1968 the name was changed to "The American Party," and Mr. Wallace ran again.

In 1972, with Wallace rejoining the Democrats, John Schmitz ran for president and those still favoring Wallace split to form an "American Independent Party," which in 1976 became "The American Independent Party." Lester Maddox was chosen as their presidential candidate for '76.

The remaining American Party chose Tom Anderson as its presidential candidate. This is the party whose platform we present in this issue.

GUN CONTROL: Uphold the Constitutional right of citizens to keep and bear arms; oppose in any form registration and/or regulation of guns, ammunition, or their owners; impose heavy mandatory state penalties for crimes committed with a gun.

HEALTH CARE: No government interference in the doctor-patient relationship; encourage private medical insurance programs; allow freedom of choice in health care; no involuntary mass medication; no socialized medicine.

ILLEGAL ALIENS: Identify and deal appropriately with all illegal aliens.

INFLATION: Halt deficit spending and fractional reserve credit which cause inflation; abolish the Federal Reserve System.

LABOR: Ensure local control of local unions; prohibit use of pension or dues funds for political purposes; make union membership voluntary.

LAND USE: No form of federal control of private land under any guise.

NATIONAL SECURITY: Apprehend and punish to the limit all those guilty of espionage, subversion, sabotage or sedition; impose the death penalty for treason.

OPEN HOUSING: The sale of any property must be a voluntary

transaction by both buyer and seller.

PUBLIC MORALITY: No federal interference with state or local obscenity or pornography laws.

QUOTAS: Qualifications for admissions, hirings or promotions should be based on merit only.

REGIONAL GOVERNMENT: Abolish federally sponsored regional governments; forbid the authority of appointed officials to supersede that of elected officials in the same jurisdiction.

REVENUE SHARING: Reduce federal taxes and leave money home, thus avoiding federal control and reducing waste.

SOCIAL SECURITY: Fund the system soundly or phase it out; encourage private retirement plans; remove all earnings limitations.

TAXES: Reduce taxes by limiting the function of government to its legitimate sphere of preventing violence and fraud; investigate the large tax-exempt foundations; repeal the graduated income tax and replace it with a uniform tax.

UNEMPLOYMENT: Establish a free market for jobs and wage rates which will produce maximum employment of free men.

WELFARE: Get the federal government entirely out of welfare.

FOREIGN POLICY

COMMUNIST NATIONS: No recognition of the legitimacy of Communist slave states; discontinue all trade and commerce with countries which do not allow emigration of its citizens.

DETENTE: Discontinue at once the policy of appeasement called detente.

FOREIGN AID: Abolish foreign aid.

HEMISPHERIC DEFENSE: Reassert and enforce the Monroe Doctrine; give all legitimate aid to Cubans' aspirations for freedom.

IMPORTS: No imports from countries which employ slave labor.

MIDDLE EAST: Pursue America's true interests in the Middle East and throughout the world without orienting U.S. policy to the interests of any foreign nation.

MILITARY STRENGTH: Make the U.S. defense establishment second to none.

OFFSHORE RESOURCES: Enforce exclusive American claims to offshore oil, gas and fishing rights to a distance of 200 miles.

PANAMA CANAL: Keep and exercise full sovereignty over the Canal Zone.

SECRET DIPLOMACY: Refuse to honor any international agreements not made public and ratified by the U.S. Senate.

STATE DEPARTMENT: Investigate the State Department for loyalty and security risks and remove them forthwith.

TREATY LAW: No provision of any treaty or Executive Agreement may take precedence over provisions of the U.S. Constitution.

UNITED NATIONS: Withdraw from the insolvent, unstable Communist-dominated UN at once and from every other organization which infringes the sovereignty of the United States.

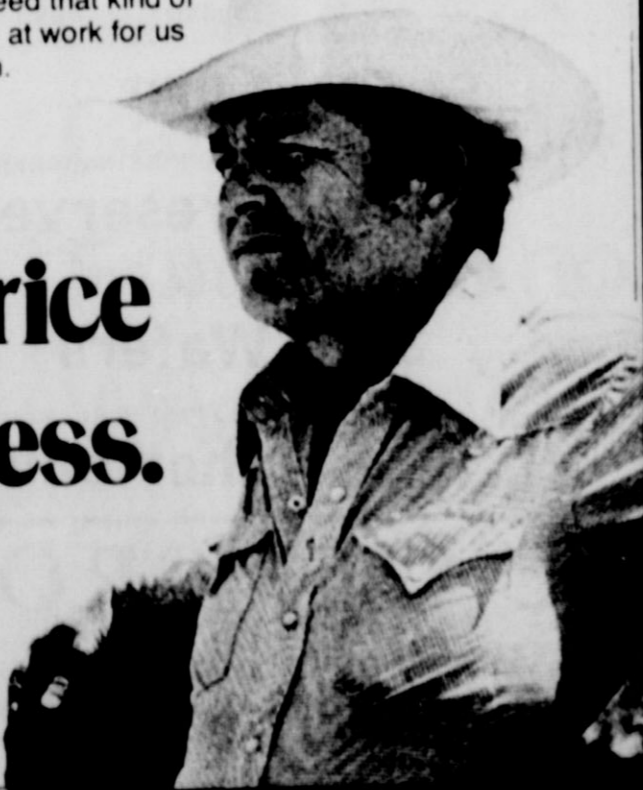

Dr. Robert Barrow Is Awarded Grant

Dr. Robert Edward Barrow, assistant professor of physiology and biophysics at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston has been awarded a \$16,915 March of Dimes clinical research grant for 2 years according to Dr. Edward N. Brandt Jr. of the University of Texas Medical Branch and Joseph F. Nee, president of The National Foundation of the March of Dimes.

Dr. Barrow will test a way to identify newborn babies destined to develop respiratory distress syndrome (RDS) usually called hyaline membrane disease. RDS causes 30 to 40 per cent of all newborn deaths in the U.S. taking the heaviest toll among premature infants. Existing treatments are often ineffective and carry some risk in themselves. Inability to detect RDS early or to predict its severity contribute to the difficulty in saving babies from this acute life threatening condition. Dr. Barrow's study is based on the concept that RDS is caused by the immature lung's lack of substances (surfactants) needed to keep tiny air tubes and sacs (bronchioles and alveoli) from collapsing, much as detergent keeps water bubbles expanded.

He believes that while healthy newborns tend to inhale more rapidly than they exhale, babies in early stages of RDS do the opposite. The alveoli may resist expansion during inhaling or contract more quickly than normal during exhaling or both. He will investigate this theory by measuring in-out breathing flow-rates in premature and term newborns, comparing his findings to subsequent occurrences and severity of RDS. If successful, this study may help in early identification of RDS prone infants leading to earlier treatment and better chance of survival.

Dr. Barrow is the husband of Dr. Nancy Traweck Barrow who is a second year resident doctor of the American Bicentennial at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

luncheon at noon, with each person attending bringing a salad. A study and training period for officers of the local churches will be the schedule for the afternoon.

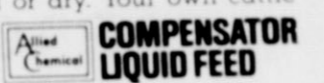

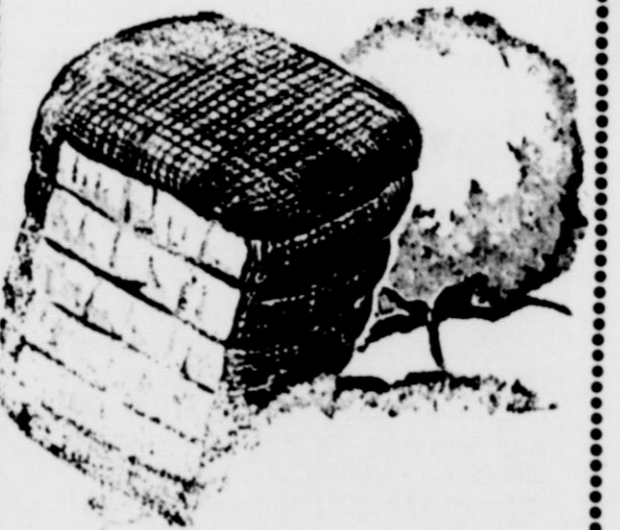

Beef Price Ceiling. Bentsen opposed Nixon's beef price ceiling, successfully fought for exemption for Texas cattle buyers and voted against controls.

Grains and Oilseeds. Bentsen vocally opposed the Administration's export embargos and introduced legislation to create a process to avoid the controls in the future.

Beef and Dairy Imports. Bentsen has repeatedly called for restrictions on the increasing imports of beef and dairy products and has introduced legislation to reduce imports.

Cotton. Bentsen has supported higher loan and target prices, strongly opposed cotton export controls and stood up against the payment limitations.

Agricultural Research. Bentsen launched a two-year effort to reverse the decline in Ag research funding and is credited with an \$11 million increase.

Federal Land Use Planning. Bentsen is fighting against the bill his Republican opponent has authored — the Steelman-Udall Land Use Planning Act.

Federal Permits. Bentsen fought to protect farmers and ranchers from bureaucratic red tape in making ponds and landfills.

Personal Experience. Bentsen understands the problems of the farmer and rancher; he has personally engaged in row crop, cattle and citrus production.
