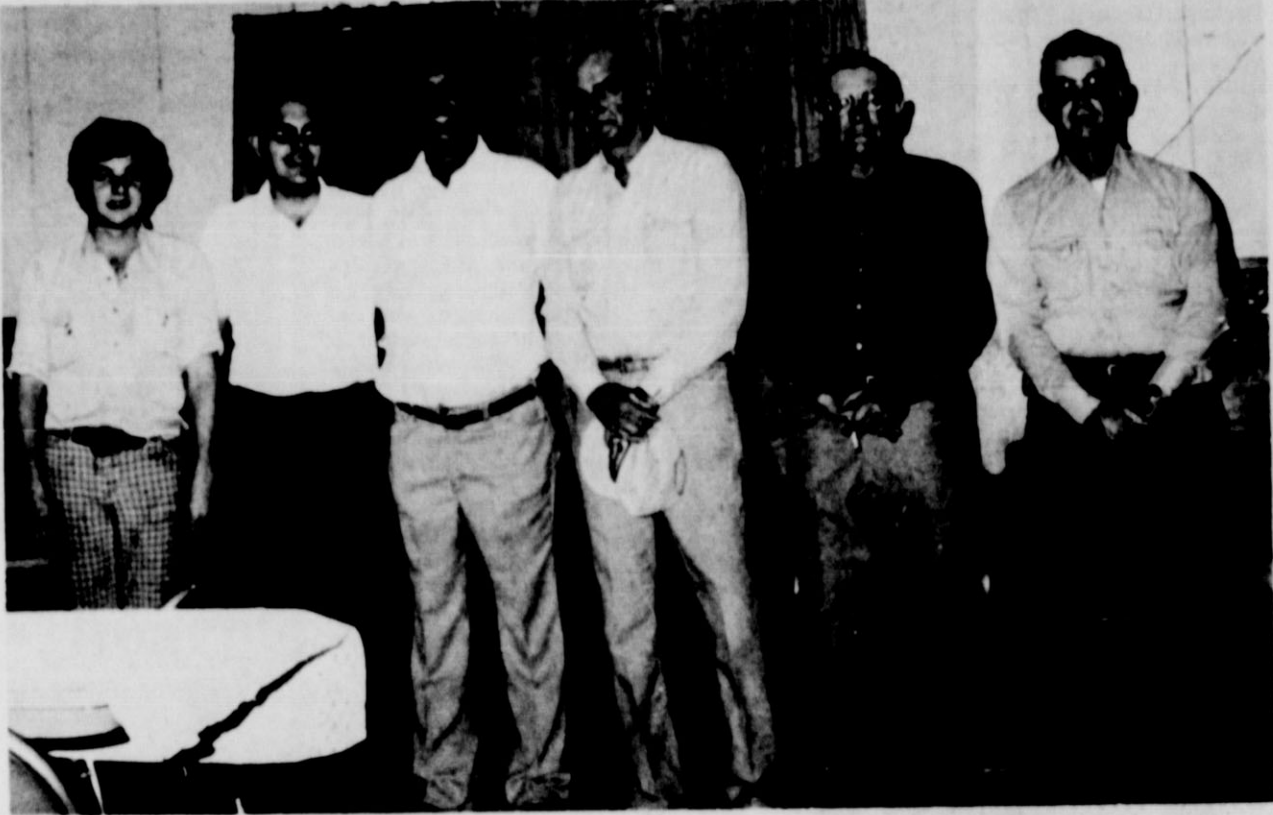

# Reopening Of Hospital Discussed

INTERESTED persons from every community in the county met Tuesday night in the district court room at the courthouse to discuss the possible reopening of the Motley General Hospital, and to hear the Motley County Hospital Board's explanation of recent developments in the Motley General Clinic situa-

tion. Approximately 75 persons attended.

J. M. (Sonny) Russell, president of the hospital board, gave a detailed report of the expenditures in connection with the operation of the clinic since its opening July 6. He also voiced the approval of the board with regard to reopening the hospital.

"We are in favor of having the hospital open for use, and have been working toward this end, although Dr. John Board, regional medical director for the Texas Health Resources Department tells us that there is no possibility of reopening the hospital."

The hospital closed in October of 1970 because, as stated by the Regional director of Health Education and Welfare (HEW), Mrs. Martha A. McSteen: "We regret to inform you that your facility does not meet the requirements for participation in the Health Insurance for the aged program (Title XVIII) of the Social Security Act."

The facility (former Stanley Hospital) had been completely renovated and equipped according to specifications of the Housing and Urban Development, and open house was held on June 14, 1970.

Projected income from the hospital, if reopened, was discussed, and Jimmy Irwin of Lubbock, a native of Matador, was introduced by Mr. Russell as having agreed to return to Matador in the capacity of X-ray and lab technician for the clinic which will relieve the pressure in that area. It was also explained that his wife is familiar with medicare and insurance forms and in other phases of medical procedures.

Some estimates are that it will take from six months to 18 months to reopen the hospital. One of the requirements is that it be fully staffed. The building is considered adequate, according to views expressed by Mr. Irwin, who has been in charge of X-ray and lab work in hospitals the past 14 years, and is presently working at both St. Mary's and Lubbock Osteopath Hospital in Lubbock.

From his nine years of experience in the same field, Sut Braselton, a member of the hospital board, explained further steps which would be necessary in this direction.

Dr. Y Hoang Do was present and again expressed his position. He confirmed his agreement to stay until the first of the year "if the hospital is in operation by that time, or assured of being opened." He said that he is not optimistic about recruiting other doctors to the area.

Stymied by the obvious red tape required by governmental agencies, and the necessity to meet the requirements for Medicare and Medicaid, one concerned person asked, "Tell us what we can do to help." Mr. Russell's reply was to write every government official from your representative to your congressman, urging immediate consideration of the need. He said that the board has hired someone to try to work through the red tape for application to reopen the hospital.

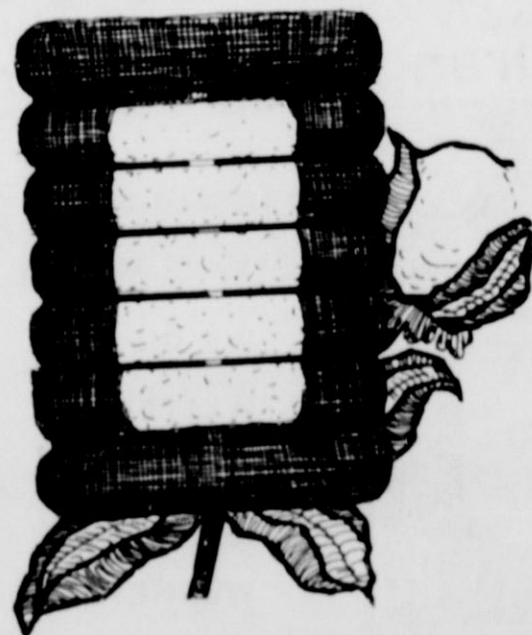

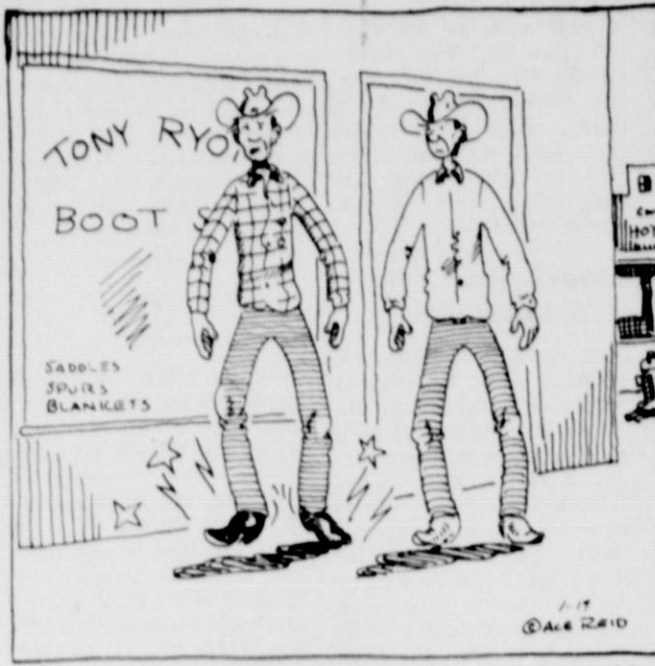

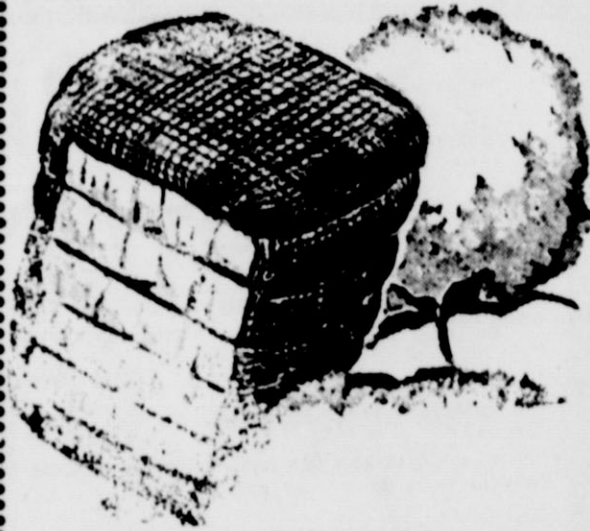
