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After Pearl Harbor

HOMEFRONT. By Winston M. Estes, Lippincott, \$10.

From 1941 to 1945, the United States was drawn together in a massive effort to fight a common enemy. It would be difficult to find anyone over the age of 6 in 1941 who cannot remember precisely what he or she was doing on December 7 when news of Pearl Harbor was announced. Those who remained at home did their part, however they were able, to help shorten the war and bring our servicemen home.

In his new novel, Winston Estes has set his story in a small town in Georgia, near Atlanta. The reader becomes part of the Alex Holly family, seeing first-hand how the war took possession of people's lives, and changed them forever. Son Paul Holly is drafted and sent to the European theater; his twin brother Perry, deaf since birth, and his unmarried sister, Suzie, move to Atlanta to take war-production jobs. Even the Holly's son-in-law, although involved in a governmental research project and therefore exempt, decides he must enlist. Alex works long hours at his job with the railroad, helping juggle ordnance and troop trains with regularly scheduled cars hopelessly overcrowded with servicemen and their families. His wife, Mamie, does volunteer work for the Red Cross and other war relief agencies, but she realizes her most important job is to "keep the home fires burning" until her family returns safely.

Mr. Estes describes the tempo of the times vividly;

how Army camps seemed to spring up overnight; how plants were converted from peacetime to war production, and how, as a result of the shortage of able-bodied men, large numbers of women were hired for the jobs never before held by women. The radio was the lifeline connecting people to faraway places with names they had never heard before, and could not pronounce. The American people, as did the Holly family, adjusted to the idea that life as they had known it before had dis-

appeared "for the duration." All the emotional impact of D-Day, the death of Roosevelt, and finally V-J Day are faithfully recreated. Since they have had no such national unity in their lifetime, young people today do not understand how their elders felt during the years of World War II; reading this story will provide an insight beyond that they find in history textbooks. For any reader, "Homefront" is a nostalgic trip through an unforgettable era. It has no four-letter words; in fact, it is a selection of the Christian Herald Family Bookshelf. Mr. Estes is a former Texan; all his other books have been set in Texas. A native of Quanah, he was honored with a reception

there when his first novel, "Another Part of the House," was published in April, 1970. HOMEFRONT, Another Part of the House, and other volumes available at the Matador Tribune.
